From The President...

Security is still a major concern in Garden Oaks. Although we are a relatively safe community, far too many are losing our cars, our personal property, and our feeling of personal security. During our now famous NINJA burglar crisis, many excellent plans were formulated to combat crime in our neighborhood. Unfortunately none of them were carried out completely. Many yards are still dark at night (mine included). No new street lights have been collected for. No resident directory has been distributed.

A nearby community responded to their fears during the same crisis by forming a Citizens on Patrol program. Shepherd Forest now has one of the most well organized such programs in our city. They have measurably reduced the crime statistics in their neighborhood. As I speak to civic organizations in Northwest Houston, I am steadily more impressed with the effectiveness of such groups. The Houston Police Department will provide the training and the majority of the equipment to establish such a program. These are not vigilante groups (Rambo need not apply), but are merely citizens acting as the "eyes and ears" of the police. Weapons are not allowed, nor are confrontations with any suspected perpetrators. In fact, the majority of the volunteers are often women and senior citizens. The patrolling volunteer reports any suspicious activity to the base station volunteer who calls the police to intercede. Logs are kept of license plates of strange

cars and descriptions of strange persons. Then if any crime is committed, that information is relayed to HPD for investigation. Most of our surrounding communities now use this type of security and the police department advises that it is the most effective form of security available.

In a conversation with a nearby civic club officer recently, he noted another advantage. He said that the patrolling volunteers often noticed deed restriction violations early, enabling their board to contact violators quickly. This usually makes getting voluntary compliance easier. He said that it was comforting to see neighbors "cruising" the neighborhood and that he himself enjoyed his patrolling time as it enabled him to really enjoy the beautiful homes in his community.

Think about this project. It will need a chairman with good organizational skills, and it will take volunteer hours by many residents. I certainly think we can do it. Shepherd Forest, Timbergrove, Forest Pines and many others are willing to advise us on their successful experiences. As one civic club I met with said "We are mad as Hell and aren't going to take it any more!" Anybody out there mad as Hell? Just call me Mr./Ms. Chairperson and we'll take it from there.


1990 Home Tour Cancelled

The Home Tour Committee has made the difficult decision to cancel plans for the 1990 Garden Oaks Home Tour. In the spirit of always wanting to put "our best foot forward" we acquiesced to the killer combination of December freezes and Texas Highway construction. Although the committee previewed some excellent homes and had received commitments for a great deal of commercial participation, it was decided that Garden Oaks simply couldn't look its best by April 22nd.

The safety factor of circulating our shuttles as well as the traditional bicycle and private vehicular traffic between the sections seemed questionable at best. Furthermore, many homeowners who had preliminarily offered their houses withdrew for this year following the devastating effects of the unprecedented Christmas freezes. Fortunately, none of the homeowners contacted for this year have ruled out participating in 1991.

Our Garden Oaks Home Tour was established on May 7, 1978. For a few years we held an annual Spring Tour. When houses became difficult to secure, we began holding tours on alternate years. Christmas Tours were held for a while (quite successfully) until 1985 when the elimination of the "Texas Blue Laws" created a severe shortage of leisure hours on Sunday during the Christmas holidays. The committee still believes that Garden Oaks has an adequate selection of homes to produce an annual tour (our previews surely proved that this year) and plan to continue that tradition.

The Home Tour Committee will continue organizational efforts for the 1991 Tour. Some innovative promotional ideas for the upcoming Tour may be premiered this Christmas. Look for notices of future committee meetings and join this exciting venture.







Have you ever taken a good look at the dirt in your yard? If you have, you've probably noticed that the character of the soil can vary dramatically from one part of your yard to another. The soil by the sidewalk or the driveway has probably become so compacted that it may be hard to tell where the concrete stops and the lawn starts. On the other hand, the soil beneath a tree in a relatively undisturbed corner might resemble something more like coffee grounds or heavy cake crumbs - particularly if you haven't raked the leaves from that spot in a few years.

We pay a lot of attention to the quality of the soil in the community garden. After all, it's important to feed and care for the soil so that it in turn can nourish the plants.

Our present garden location is situated on a six inch bed of oyster shells with an inch or two of topsoil cover.Apparently, this area was either the original parking lot or the foundation of the old school buildings. With this as a base, we were forced to bring in soil from elsewhere. Even though we purchased high quality soil to fill in the beds initially, we have still managed to significantly improve its fertility over the past year.

The most important step we have taken to improve our soil has been to use organic fertilizers. Traditional chemical fertilizers provide the basic nutrients for the plants - but they do nothing for the soil. In fact, chemical fertilizers tend to upset the natural balance of things in the soil, which in turn makes life miserable for some of the valuable organisms which make their home there (for example, earthworms).

Instead of chemicals, we use a combination of cottonseed meal, bone meal, and granite sand to provide the basic nutrients for the plants. these ingredients supply the same nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium as chemical fertilizers, but with some additional benefits and without the harmful effects.

Organic fertilizers add texture to the soil, helping it to regulate the retention of water in much the same way that added fiber in our diet helps to regulate our digestive processes. Soil that is high in organic matter allows excess water to drain so that the roots of the plants can breathe, while acting like a sponge to hold more water during dry periods.

Natural fertilizers also encourage the growth of microorganisms. These tiny creatures inhabit fertile soil by the billions, performing functions which help the plants to utilize nutrients and regulating the populations of the relatively uncommon pests in the soil. Organic fertilizers stay put in the soil. Chemical fertilizers tend to leach out eventually making their way into the water system. Once there, they upset the natural balance and cause a multitude of problems, which our tax dollars then pay to fix.

By "going organic" we have helped our garden soil stay healthy and happy. The beds are so loose that you can easily dig down 6-8 inches with your fingers. That's great for kids like me who really enjoy getting our hands dirty. Why not come find out for yourself. See you at the garden!
