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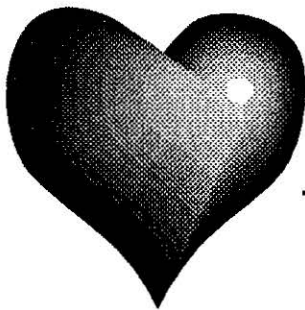

Notes From the Garden

Sometimes it's nice to know that you're a part of a bigger picture. That's how I feel about the community garden right now. While we're struggling to get permission to move our garden, the community garden program as a whole is flourishing. New gardens are springing up, old gardens are expanding, and recognition in the community is growing by leaps and bounds.

Our garden was established as a part of the Interfaith Hunger Coalition - Community Garden Program. The Interfaith Hunger Coalition is itself a part of Houston Metropolitan Ministries. The Community Garden Program (CGP) came into being about four years ago, with one volunteer coordinator, no full-time staff, and no gardens. The initial plan was to use community gardens as a way to help the hungry people in our city better feed themselves.

Today, there are over thirty gardens in the program, spread out from League City to Sugarland to Spring. The gardens range in size from one small raised bed to the equivalent of a small farm. While the mission of the Community Garden Program has expanded, the primary goal is still the same. In 1990, community gardens produced over 100,000 servings of fresh, safe produce, three times the total production in 1989. We could very easily double the 1990 results in the coming year.

The sponsorship of the gardens in the CGP are as diverse as the population of Houston. Several of the gardens are sponsored by ecumenical organizations in different parts of the city. Others have been established by individual churches. Ours is the only one operated by a civic club. We have gardens associated with shelters for abused children and a garden supported by a hospice for AIDS patients. A few gardens have

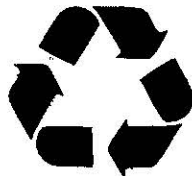
been formed independently of any group by individuals with enough drive to make it happen by themselves.

Today I attended a meeting of representatives from all the gardens around the city, and I found myself invigorated by the spirit of enthusiasm and dedication. We had all shared common problems - lack of sufficient manpower, frustration brought on by delays of one sort or another, crop failures, etc. But we also all shared a sense of excitement about what we were doing. Gardeners are much more interested in talking about what went right than what went wrong. One bumper crop is worth a dozen disappointments.

The experience reminded me that our difficulties this year are temporary. Not only will we see our garden grow again, (soon, I hope), we'll see it grow bigger and better than it did before. Believe it or not, we planted the first seeds in the Garden Oaks Community Garden over two years ago. We've learned from our trials and tribulations, as well as from our successes over the past two years. We also have the benefit of the experiences of thirty other gardens.

The Community Garden Program is making a significant dent in an even more significant problem. We can all be proud to be part of it. See you at the garden!

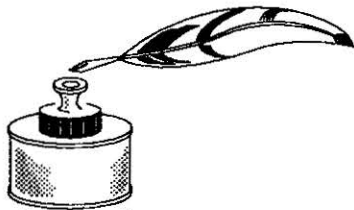
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Editor's Notes...

Now that the holidays are over and it has finally quit raining, we need to turn our attention to something very important: Citizens On Patrol. When we first began our program last August we logged 129.5 hours of patrol time. In December, just 4 months later, we logged only 66! We expected a drop due to the holidays, but November was only slightly higher. Our program has proven itself in these few months with significantly lower crime statistics. **Let's not stop now!** The 'bad guys' are always watching, and when they see that we don't patrol anymore they'll be back. We also have to keep in mind that we must patrol a **minimum of 62 hours each month** or the police will take back the equipment and our program will end.

Please read the article by Joan Fudge in the Readers' Forum column. No one ever expects crime to happen to them, especially in broad daylight. But, as Joan can attest, **it does happen.**

At our first training session, 83 people signed up to patrol. Many of those people have yet to patrol even once. 107 people have taken COP T-Shirts, donated by Suzanne Debien and intended for active volunteers. Right now we are all receiving the benefits of the work done by a handful of volunteers. Won't you give a little of your time to this very important and very easy effort to fight crime? Just call any of the COP numbers on the back page, or call me for more information. Do it now, and avoid becoming the next victim.

DECORATING TIPS... PICTURE THIS

Does driving nails into your walls make you nervous? Do you and your spouse disagree on the proper height? A common mistake is made when a tall man hangs a picture at his standing eye level. If the objects hung on the wall are usually viewed from a sitting position, they should be hung at the seated person's eye level. Also, never place objects so low above a chair or sofa that they will be bumped if someone leans back; allow eight to twelve inches.

It's a good idea when arranging objects on a wall to first tape sheets of paper of the exact dimension of what you plan to hang, to the wall. This will allow you to move them around until you have achieved the best arrangement. Then it is easy to mark the spot for the hanger.

Another good rule is to keep the distance between pictures half the width of the frames. Do not crowd objects together. Also, give them anchors: A table placed below a large picture keeps it from looking lost. Objects on the table also help create balance.

Halls, bedrooms and walls above stairs are excellent places to display family pictures. Family pictures or individual portraits give entries that warm welcome feeling, greeting guests as they come into your home.

Varying the size, shape and texture in a grouping is always visually pleasing. Pretty round plates are nice among rectangular and square frames, for example. And a good rule of thumb when hanging a grouping above a sofa is to use an area three-fourths the width of the sofa.

Pictures can help add the finishing touches to your room. Just as you planned the rest of the room, a little picture planning will give you the "picture perfect" room you want.

The door was still slightly ajar, but being concerned about my little silky terrier Libbi, I took no precautions and walked in. Libbi was OK physically, but the house had been ransacked and robbed. My immediate feelings were mixtures of relief (that Libbi was OK), anger, fright, and hurt that someone could violate my property in such a heinous way.

Necessary precautions had been taken with double locks installed on the front door, as well as a lock on the storm door. So it took the thief/thieves ample time to chip and claw the safety bolt lock out of the door facing. **This was at the front door in broad daylight.**

With these thoughts in mind, I was eager to learn about the COP, attend the training session, and volunteer to patrol as a concerned citizen. Knowing that we have some caring neighbors out there patrolling has eased my mind somewhat when I have to leave my house. However, since our program was organized, our number of volunteers has gradually diminished. It has been proven that areas with COP programs have decreased crime.

Section II needs volunteers. We ask that you give only 2 hours of your time per month, one hour every other week, the equivalent of one TV movie per month. **Isn't your property worth it?** Only 24 hours per year? Call 692-8322 if you want to volunteer for COP in Section II.

Incidentally, I have replaced nothing that the thieves took so, if they come back, they will be disappointed. Thanks for listening.

Committees Offer Variety of Involvement

Get involved and help improve your neighborhood! Join a committee. There are several active committees in the Civic Club that need your talents.

The **Adopt-A-Park Committee** coordinates activities to improve and maintain Graham Park through Houston Proud. Such activities include painting the play equipment, and keeping the park neat and litter free. The **Beautification Committee**, which originated in 1986, started with three pilot projects with the idea of keeping Garden Oaks a beautiful place to live. The three pilot projects were the two newly designed entry signs into the neighborhood and a magical touch to the pocket park on Sue Barnett/Lamonte/42nd Street. Beautification has since funded the irrigation at Friendship Park (maintained exclusively by the Garden Oaks Garden Club) and started a three phase project on Garden Oaks Boulevard. Currently, the committee is working on plans to landscape the park on 43rd and Sue Barnett to highlight the art work installed at that location. The landscape will be designed with a xeriscape philosophy which utilizes native and regional plants which require low maintenance and minimal water consumption. The **Community Garden** activities have been incorporated into the Beautification Committee. The garden provides fresh produce to the Food Pantry of St. Matthew's United Methodist Church for distribution to Houston's needy. The Community Garden is currently located on the north side of Garden Oaks Elementary School, but plans are underway to move the garden to 4405 Alba. If you enjoy working in the dirt and want to see the fruits of your labor help those who need it most, volunteer to work in the garden. The next meeting of the Beautification

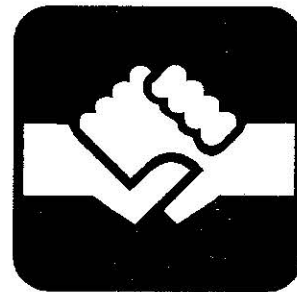

After looking at these statistics, you might be fooled into thinking that our area is relatively crime free. I think you must be made aware of the bigger picture. Garden Oaks lies within a larger crime area, approximately in the borders of the Hardy Toll Road, the 610 Loop, the Northwest Freeway and, to the north, Tidwell/Pinemont. In this larger area there were 230 auto thefts, 14 narcotics, 133 burglaries, 77 robberies, 4 rapes, 25 aggravated assaults, and 2 murder/manslaughters. This was just in the period from November 1 to November 30 (December stats aren't out yet) So crime is all around us, but our COP program helps keep it out of Garden Oaks.



Good Neighbors

Ms. Laura Garza, formerly of Garden Oaks, agreed to allow the Civic Club Recycling Committee to remove the carport from her property in the 1000 block of 43rd, since it violated the Section 5 Deed Restrictions. We deeply appreciate the spirit of cooperation and expression of care for our neighborhood reflected in this decision. We hope that this is the first of many voluntary compliances in Garden Oaks.
