Home Tour Update



Thanks, Neighbor!



Beautification Report

The next meeting of the Beautification Committee will be held at **7:30 p.m., Thursday, March 28** at 407 W. 34th Street. For those of you who missed the February meeting, don't fret - we didn't have a February meeting.

The 43rd Street esplanade is still at the top of our priority list, but we have other topics to discuss as well. **Saturday, April 20** has been designated as Garden Oaks Clean-Up Day, so we need to draw up a list of cleaning projects to be tackled. We'll talk about the status of our efforts to bring the Garden Oaks Boulevard irrigation system into compliance with City of Houston requirements, as well as revealing the latest chapter in the ongoing saga of the Community Garden relocation project.

If all goes well, we should have the first phase of the 43rd Street esplanade improvement completed by the time Home Tour rolls around. Even though the first phase only represents about one-fourth of the total development plan, it should make a dramatic improvement in the appearance of the esplanade. As this is being written we have received City approval to install our water meter and Austin Bridge Co. has provided us with fill dirt from the highway improvement (?) project on N. Shepherd. Now things can really get moving!

Please try to contribute a few hours on April 20 to help clean up the neighborhood. If a bunch of us pitch in, we can make a lot of progress in surprisingly little time. Look elsewhere in the *Gazette* for details on when and where we'll be meeting.

The Police Department has monthly meetings for those of us involved in the area COP programs. They are called PIP (Positive Interaction Program) meetings. It is at those meetings that we obtain our monthly Crimewatch figures. They have various programs relevant to COP. Anyone in our group may attend these meetings. They are held at the new county courthouse on N. Shepherd, on the third Thursday of the month at 7:30 p.m. At February's meeting I obtained the crime statistics for all of 1990. Below I list the figures for the whole city, for the North Shepherd Sub Station, and for the smaller area, 3B30, that encompasses Garden Oaks. This area known as 3B30 is bounded by 610, White Oak Bayou, Pinemont, and Shepherd, but includes our Section 1.

Thus, 3B30 has about 6% of the crimes answered by the N. Shepherd Sub Station and less than 1% of the total crimes in the city. We can be proud of these figures, but we must keep up our patrol hours to keep down our crime. Call me with your questions, comments, and suggestions at **688-3237.**



A NEW LOOK FOR AN OLD CHAIR

Reupholstering a favorite chair or sofa cannot only beautify and update a plain room, it can help create that special look you desire. Before taking on this project, have an expert make sure the item is worth redoing. If he gives the go ahead, it's then time to choose your fabric.

Fabric selection should be based on a few important points. First, consider its durability. Will the item be getting a lot of use? Size is a factor because most upholstery weight fabrics are 54" wide—if not they may have to be run sideways. Patterns, such as large florals or scenics, may be centered as "cameos" in each cushion, using more yardage than usual. Soil resistance is very important. If the fabric you choose has not been pretreated with a soil retardant, ask to have it treated, it's worth the small extra cost!

Now let's consider the style of the furniture. Perhaps it doesn't complement your other furnishings. Here is where a knowledgeable craftsman can perform wonders! A skirt can be replaced by an upholstered front rail and legs. An arm can be heavily padded for a rounded look, or lightly padded for a sleeker look. Individual cushions can be changed to slab seats (one long cushion). Backs can also be restyled into one-piece construction, three pillows or loose cushions. Button tufting, jumbo or regular welting, shirring, ruffles and skirts can be added or eliminated to add interest or determine style.

The original construction and shape of the piece will be the determining factor as to what can be accomplished. Once it is finished, your "new" chair or sofa will be a prized possession for years to come!

From the Garden by Jan Koenig

Now that your tomato plants are settled nicely in the ground, it's time to think about dealing with the inevitable difficulties that crop up (no pun intended). Tomatoes suffer from three basic types of problems - disease, weather conditions, and insects. There isn't much you can do about weather conditions, except to make your plants as strong as possible, but we do have ways of combating diseases and insects.

The easiest way to rid your tomato plants of whatever happens to be bothering them is to use hard chemicals. Benomyl, diazinon, malathion, and a multitude of other fungicides and insecticides are "approved" for use on vegetables. But all of these pose some risk to people handling them or consuming them. Chemical agents also tend to act indiscriminately. Bees, birds, and other beneficial critters are just as apt to be poisoned as are the bugs you're trying to kill.

Fortunately, organic products are available to control virtually all of the would-be villains in our gardens. Now, organic doesn't necessarily mean risk-free, but it does mean less risk to humans and other desirable living creatures.

If your problem is aphids (which sap plants of strength and transmit diseases), first try knocking them off with a fairly hard spray of water from your garden hose. This will work as a permanent control if you have the time to do it every few days. Spraying them with insecticidal soap is the next step up. Ordinary dish soap will not work. These two treatments will take care of most aphid problems. Encouraging ladybugs to come to your garden helps as well, since ladybugs in their larval stage gorge themselves on aphids. More stubborn insects can be controlled with pyrethrum or rotenone. These naturally occurring insecticides require a bit more care,

but they are still far safer than comparable chemical controls.

Worms, including the fierce looking tomato horn worm, can be effectively managed with Bt, a bacterial toxin which affects only caterpillars. Bt is sold under the brand names Thuricide and Dipel and is available at most nurseries and garden supply stores.

Tomatoes in Houston often suffer from fungal diseases. Fungal diseases are the hardest to treat organically, but we still have options. Liquid copper or copper dust, which is sold as a control for black spot on roses, is an effective organic fungicide. Copper is helpful in battling mildew diseases, septoria leaf spot, and various forms of "rot".

Remember, the object of pest management is to **control** insects and other pathogens - not to eliminate them completely. A "kill-all" strategy creates imbalances which cause even bigger problems in your garden. So before you stock your garage with enough chemicals to start your own toxic waste dump, try "going organic". You might be surprised at how easy it is to grow healthy produce (and happy flowers) with less danger to yourself and to the rest of the environment. See you at the garden!




The newsprint was donated due to low prices being paid per pound. The glass had to be dumped because our buyer was not open. The figures for plastics are not yet available.

Befriend Our Earth

Readers: This column is for **you** to voice facts about the environment and offer tips on how to save it.

I always thought that using 'pure' white paper products was wise, since they don't have chemical dyes. Now I find out that the bleaching process that gives us 'pure' white paper also gives us poisons in our water.

Fortunately, there are alternatives. Now a few companies are producing recycled paper products. I have found a brand called C.A.R.E. -Consumer Action to Restore the Environment. These products are almost as white as the ones I used previously, but they are made from recycled paper in an environmentally friendly way, and they come in recycled packaging. I am also happy to report that they are no more expensive than popular brands of paper products.

Using recycled paper products is one easy way to make the Earth a better place for our children and grandchildren. Another easy way is to use canvas shopping bags. If you need to use paper or plastic at times. you can reuse them on your next trip to the store, or use them in other ways. You can also reuse plastic produce bags. When I unload my canvas bags, I put the produce bags back in them so they are ready for my next shopping expedition. Canvas bags are easier to carry and hold more too. I have found them to be perfect for bringing home my Blue Bell from Walgreens!

Let's all try to adapt in little ways and together we will make a BIG difference.

Nothing is ever easy; even with something as simple as the United States flag. Recently an issue has come to our attention as to whether or not the flags with the attached cards which were placed in the yards of Garden Oaks residents last month constitute advertising. The deed restrictions do not allow "signs, billboards, posters or advertising devices of any character" (except signs to sell or lease your house) to be erected on one's property without the express written consent of the Board of Trustees. Garden Oaks received much favorable publicity from the event, and the majority of the residents are happy and proud to display the flags in their yards. The flag in and of itself is not an advertisement or a sign. Nothing in the deed restrictions prevents a homeowner from flying the United States flag nor should it. However, when the flag is attached to an advertisement and used in conjunction with a publicity stunt, then it can be viewed as an advertising device. (Clearly, any billboards or signs erected in one's yard are not allowed. This would include any signs for a political candidate, as well as any patriotic messages.) Living in Garden Oaks you are afforded protections which help to maintain the integrity of the residential nature of our subdivision and thus protect property values. There are two opinions to this issue as there are with all deed restrictions. To protect from all the bad, sometimes you have to give up some of the good. Just because something is popular doesn't mean it should be allowed to break or bend the rules. This would make the protection invalid.

Whether you view the deed restrictions as protections or as barriers, the fact remains that Garden Oaks has them. The Board of Trustees has been entrusted as the guardian of the deed restrictions and has the legal authority to enforce them.

Get familiar with your deed restrictions. You, as the homeowner have a contract to maintain your property in accordance with these deed restrictions, so it is a good idea to know what is in them. Call your representative if you have any questions or if you want a copy of your section's deed restrictions. If you plan to make ANY improvements to your home, definitely call BEFORE you do it. It is much easier to change something in the planning phase than after time and money have been spent.

Patriotism or Self-Grandisement? The flag/advertisement that was placed in every yard in Garden Oaks by a local realtor poses some interesting questions, regardless of your stance on the Iraqi war. I was appalled that this realty company had wrapped their advertisement with the U.S. Flag under the guise of supporting the troops fighting for U.S. interests in the Middle East. Offended by the political and commercial nature of this advertising campaign, I immediately removed the flag/advertisement from my yard and returned it to the realtors. I instructed the employee behind the front desk to refrain from placing their advertising on my property. He told me that the card attached to the flag with his company name boldly printed on it was not an advertisement because it lacked their phone number.


Absurd, it gets worse. I later discovered that this company publicized this event on radio and television before it even happened, and that it was just a publicity stunt.

There is an old anecdote that goes something like this: "You can put earrings on a hog and it is still a hog".
