
More Deed Restriction Books Available

President's Message

Volunteers are the backbone of this community. Each officer of the Civic Club, each Board of Trustee member, and each committee member is a volunteer. Every volunteer gives a piece of themselves every time he/she takes the time to help a neighbor, clean a park, or lend a hand. Each of us has something special, unique to that individual, to give to our neighborhood.

Every one has the same goal- to make Garden Oaks a better place to live. I may not do things exactly as you would, and you may not do things exactly as I would. But the strength of the neighborhood is allowing each of us to contribute in our own way. A different way of doing things may even turn out to be a better way.

I am convinced that this neighborhood has the talent and resources necessary to achieve anything we put our minds to. This is evident in the ambitious projects and programs that we have already completed or are underway. Several committees could not function without the vast resources volunteers provide.

Some volunteer work is evident, but a lot happens behind the scenes. The second Saturday of the month recycling volunteers spend 4 hours collecting, sorting, and delivering recyclable materials. What you don't see are the Recycle Saturday organizers spending an additional 4-6 hours/month arranging for crews, equipment, special pick-ups, and vendors. Citizens-On-Patrol volunteers spend 2-4 hours/month patrolling the neighborhood to deter crime and to report suspicious activities. Behind the scenes record keepers and schedulers spend a total of 10 hours/month keeping the program going. The Gazette editors spend approximately 40-60 hours/month collecting, writing, and editing news items and columns, organizing the layout, assuring quality control and soliciting, billing from advertisers. Volunteers are also the reason for the successes of the Home Tour and Membership Drive. Home Tour volunteers spend 15-30 hours/month each for the three months before the Home Tour planning, organizing and soliciting donations for this spectacular event. The day of the Tour, many volunteers lent a hand by being docents, concessionaires, ticket takers, etc. Volunteers

Beautification projects. The planning, are also responsible for the successfulresources and inspiration donated by those who care is evident by the beautiful pocket parks. These are just a few of the areas where Garden Oaks has benefitted from the generosity of volunteers. All volunteers are a special breed of people who make things happen whether you donate two hours or ten hours, labor, or ideas.

Beautification Report

The next meeting of the Beautification Committee will be held on Wednesday, April 24, at 7:30 p.m. at 407 W. 34th Street. Everyone is welcome.

Your beautification dollars are at work! Check out the new landscaping on the esplanade at W. 43rd St. and Sue Barnett. Despite the rain, the project has moved along on schedule and under budget (just barely). When more funds are available, we have plans for further development at the site.

The Community Garden will move to the new location on Alba just north of Sue Barnett on May 18. Anyone interested in helping with the move should show up at the old location on the grounds of the Garden Oaks Elementary School at 8:30 a.m. Go ahead and come on by even if you happen to oversleep. We can use all the help we can get. Bring your shovel and/or pick-up truck if you've got one.



Garden Oaks is full of trees - tall. straight pines, native pecans, lush southern magnolias, prolific sweet gum, and (of course) oak trees of every shape and size. But Garden Oaks doesn't have enough fruit trees. I'm not sure why, but fruit trees just don't get the attention they deserve around here.

It's not as if fruit trees are a lot of trouble. They're not. Your average peach tree doesn't take any more effort than your typical tomato plant. But unlike tomato plants, the peach tree will live for fifteen or twenty years. Every year the peach tree will be covered for one or two weeks in early spring with showy, pink blossoms. The peach tree provides shade and habitat for birds and squirrels. And best of all are the peaches over its life span one peach tree can produce literally hundreds of pounds of succulent fruit.

Peaches aren't the only fruit that grows here either. Houstonians can enjoy home grown apples, pears, apricots, nectarines, plums, bananas, and persimmons. If you are willing to go to a little more trouble, you can even grow citrus fruits here too. I've eaten luscious satsumas straight off a tree in the southwest part of town. In fact, I know one fellow who has over 130 different varieties of fruit trees in his yard, and his yard is smaller than your average lot in Garden Oaks!

The trick to growing fruit in Houston is planting the correct variety. Most fruit trees require several weeks of seriously cold weather to blossom and set fruit properly. Since we don't often experience those kinds of conditions here, it is absolutely crucial to find "low chill" varieties. If you're interested in growing fruit trees, you'll probably find it worth spending a few extra dollars to buy your plants at a premium quality nursery. Not only are they more likely to have a good selection of plants which are appropriate for Houston's climate, they also should have professional staff who can give you valuable advice. You might even try one of the nurseries in the area that specialize in trees.

If you don't think it is possible, just stop by the pocket park on W. 42nd at Sue Barnett. On the north end of the esplanade you'll find a Mid-Pride peach tree and a Dorsett Golden apple, both loaded with immature fruit. Our plans for the new community garden also include a miniature orchard of fifteen or twenty different varieties of fruit trees.

So the next time you're thinking about sprucing up your landscape, think about planting a tree. And as long as you're planting a tree, you might as well plant one that gives you flowers and fruit. See you at the garden!



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WINDOW DILEMMAS!!

The window is probably the most neglected feature when building a house. Some architects are concerned with having the windows balanced on the exterior walls, but give little care as to whether they are balanced inside a room.

Unfortunately, most of us have to deal with misplaced windows of different sizes and shapes within one room. Creative window treatments can solve this problem by turning your room from one of the oddly shaped windows to one of beautiful uniformity. Today, with so many different types of hardware and window treatments, misplaced windows are easy and fun to change.

If you have two sizes of windows on different walls, or perhaps in a large open area that serves more than one function (such as a living/dining room without a divider) the windows can be treated to appear the same height. For the most part, the treatments should be coordinated. By making them the same height, you will add uniformity to the rooms. If you also increase the window treatment to the ceiling line, you will create an atmosphere of height into the entire room.

Windows that are the same size, but have been placed at odd spacing on the same wall can be "adjusted" by creating a focal point of the entire wall. Using a wall-to-wall treatment of a valance and alternating draperies and sheers can return balance to the wall. The draperies may be tied back for an "hour glass" effect, or may be left as stationary panels or traversing, according to your needs and the style of the other furnishings.

Verticals, mini-blinds and pleated shades could be used in the same manner, either alone or in conjunction with draperies. Care must be taken to allow access to the windows for light and air flow.

GARDEN OAKS PARK PROPOSAL

A project of: The Garden Oaks and Garden Oaks Plaza Civic Clubs

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Conceived by the Garden Oaks Civic Club's Beautification Committee (responsible for the development and maintenance of parks and other common property within the subdivision), this project involves landscaping a one acre park at the corner of West Forty-third Street and Sue Barnett.

The park, a triangular-shaped tract in the northeast corner of the above mentioned intersection, is in an area naturally wooded with mature pine and oak trees. The aesthetic quality of the park greatly enhances the neighborhood and because of its age, this project is deemed necessary to assure that the park will retain its natural beauty for future enjoyment.

Another concern addressed in planning this project is the damage to the property caused by vehicles being parked during the day in shaded areas of the park. The landscape design being considered will include measures to keep vehicles out of the park.

COST

The landscape design for the park was chosen from several designs submitted by area landscaping companies. The design and proposal being considered can be executed for \$30,000.00, which includes the design fee and labor and materials for landscaping. The project has been divided into phases, and, if necessary, can be completed as funds become available over a period of time.

PROJECT FUNDING

The Garden Oaks Civic Club has allotted \$7,500.00 for improvements to the park, part of which will be applied to the above total project cost. Out of this amount, the club paid to have a colorful piece of sculpture (which it acquired through a loan agreement with the artist) moved to the park.

The balance of approximately \$25,000 for the project will be raised by committee members seeking donations from friends of the community, area residents and businesses. The balance needed to finance the first phase of the project is \$5,000, and the remaining two phases (\$10,000 each) will be completed as funds become available.

FRIENDS OF THE PARK

Each individual or company contributing to the park fund will be recognized appropriately according to the amount of contribution. Contributors will be acknowledged publicly via news media and at a park dedication ceremony. Memorial contributions will be acknowledged by letter and will be announced at the park dedication.
