

From the Garden

The new community garden is slowly beginning to emerge from the undergrowth (overgrowth?) at the old water tower site on Alba, just north of Sue Barnett. So far, our biggest accomplishment has been to disassemble the beds from the old location at the school and reassemble them at the new site. That may not sound like much, until you consider that each of the five, forty-foot-long beds was constructed of twenty-five landscape timbers and eight two-byfours, and that all of the pieces were permanently locked together with twelve-inch-long spikes. Moving those monsters was tough!

We wound up cutting each bed into two twenty-foot-long sections, and then moving five sections at a time on a big flatbed truck. Fortunately, I had some help. Unfortunately, most of the help came from outside of Garden Oaks. **Billy Scherer** and **Sammie Broadrick** donated their muscle-power, but no one else from the neighborhood made it over.


Our garden was the beneficiary of a donation of twenty-four fruit trees from Treesearch Farms. These are orphan trees, but they seem to be healthy orphans. When Treesearch culls their crops after the spring planting season, they are forced to either give away or throw away the trees that are not cosmetically attractive enough to hold over and sell the following year. We're thankful that they chose to give them to the Community Garden Program. We received a nice variety of trees (peaches, plums, apricots, nectarines, Asian pears, traditional pears, and a pretty, but lonely apple) most of which appear to be about two years old. I've planted them at the back end of the water tower site. After a couple of growing seasons and a bit of pruning, we should have a fine little orchard.

We ordered and received a big load of soil mix for the new beds, but each bed takes about thirty-five wheelbarrow loads of dirt, and as of yet I haven't had the time and energy (or the help) to move it. Our water meter was set a couple of months ago, and I've hooked up a system that will allow us to irrigate the orchard area in addition to the beds. Some work remains to be done, but the system as it exists now will keep the trees from dying of thirst.

It's been more than a little bit disappointing to have such a small amount of community involvement in the garden so far - but I haven't given up hope. I have a few ideas to try, but I'm wide open to suggestions from you neighbors out there about how we can increase participation. Happy Anniversary to Sammie and Carol Broadrick of Section 4, who will celebrate 22 years of marriage on August 4.



Interior Lifestyles Decorating KITCHEN DECORATING by Jane Warner

The kitchen is the center of family activity in almost every home. This means that the kitchen should not only be planned functionally, but should be given some priority when decorating your home.

Many kitchens are designed to maximize storage space. Take advantage of today's cabinets- they are better than ever! Place items close to where they are used most. If your cabinets have glass fronts, plan their use carefully. This is a great place for china, glasses or other items which create a stacked or organized look. If there aren't enough cabinets in your kitchen, consider adding an old cupboard or baker's rack. It will provide an interesting focal point and give you the extra space you need.

Wallcovering adds color and pattern to the room. Vinyl or vinyl coated paper is great for the kitchen. Today's wallcoverings are both washable and even scrubbable, making for easy cleanup. Furthermore, border papers are wonderful accents and can be put almost anywhere - at the ceiling and chairrail, around the windows and doors, even above the baseboard. Borders are great with coordinating wallpaper or on a painted wall. They are easy to put up and can add a lot of spark to a room for very little money.

Window treatments in the kitchen work area should be simple and out of the way. Pleated shades are an excellent choice because they won't absorb grease or dirt. Mini-blinds, vertical blinds and shutters are also good choices. You can add valances or top treatments for a complete look. Another super idea is to use laminated coordinating fabric for chair seats and a tablecloth.

Finally, for a special touch, bring some collectibles into your kitchen. You may choose china, antiques, photographs, needlepoint pieces, or anything you find interesting. Try to stay with the common theme. Just remember; reflect your own "taste" in your kitchen and your kitchen will truly reflect you.

Befriend Our Earth

Readers: This column is for you to voice facts about the environment and offer tips on how to save it.

This summer, make your motto "Don't Bag It". How many of you use a grass catcher on your lawn mower? It takes at least twice as long to mow your lawn, and then you have to fill up plastic garbage bags with the clippings and haul them to the street. A survey performed in Fort Worth last summer indicated that as much as 50% of the solid wastes in certain neighborhoods is comprised of yard waste!

Also last summer, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service started a "Don't Bag It" lawn care plan. The guidelines of the plan are as follows:

1. Mow your lawn every 5-6 days,

cutting only one third of the blade at a time.

2. Apply 1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 sq. ft. Half of the nitrogen should be slow release.

3. Provide an inch of water for your lawn once a week in the driest part of summer.

Following these guidelines will produce a healthy, self-fertilizing lawn, and will save you a lot of work, too!

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
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Man's Best Friends Readers:This new

Beautification Report

Most of you have probably noticed the change in appearance of the 43rd Street esplanade at Sue Barnett since the first stage of our landscaping and "landsculpting" project was completed. If you haven't seen it, take a few minutes to drive by and think about how it looked three or four months ago. The grass needs to fill in some more, but the overall aesthetic appeal of the park has improved dramatically. Take a special look at the antique roses that were planted in front of the statue and in the middle of the long side of the triangle they're going to be gorgeous when they mature a little bit!

We inadvertently created a drainage problem in the center of the park by adding the small hills, but the problem is manageable. We're already working on some possible low-cost solutions.

The city has committed to keeping the esplanade mowed, although we've had a delay in getting them to add it back to their schedule. Once they start, it should get mowed about once every three weeks. We have had to mow it a couple of times since the landscaping was completed, and I want to thank all of the folks who have helped out in keeping it under control. That park is almost an acre of land, so mowing it is no small chore.

The clean up day on July 6th was successful, but the clean up crew was way too small. We intend to have clean up days once a quarter, and I hope a few more of you will get out and help us next time around in early October. At least the weather should be a little cooler. We'll try to publicize it better as well. Jan Koenig

Let's Talk Trash

Several people have asked me to talk about our trash situation. It seems people are putting their trash out much too early, and it subsequently gets strewn about the neighborhood by dogs, cats, and other creatures, making quite a mess. I know about this firsthand. I always have to put my trash out the morning of trash day, Monday and Thursday. Some people say they don't have time for this, with rushing off to work. You might try this though: Have your trash all ready and waiting by the front door-inside-and when you leave in the morning it will only take a minute to carry it out to the curb. It works for me. Another problem occurs during holidays. People put their trash out, not realizing there will be no pickup, and then leave it out all weekend until the next pickup day. This happened over the Fourth of July and, in this heat, it became really rank. So, if you see that your trash is not going to be picked up, please take it back to your house until the next trash day. Finally, we are also having trouble with heavy trash day. Heavy trash is picked up at your curb on the third Tuesday of each month. Items should not be placed out until the Sunday before the Tuesday. The City will issue citations if violations are reported or cited by City personnel. After they have picked up, there will invariably be bits and pieces left. Please pick this up afterward. By following these guidelines, you will do your part to keep Garden Oaks looking beautiful.
