ICAN'T BELIEVE IT HAPPENED!! Well, it did. I was burglarized April 8th at 3:15 in the afternoon. They broke in my dining room window and had time to take my VCR and TV, but that was all, thanks to Freddie, the Highwayman! Freddie saw a suspicious truck backed into my driveway and decided to investigate. He realized someone was inside and immediately called the G.O. C.O.P. base station on his CB radio. Laverne Kelley was on call and took the report of a burglary in progress at the corner of Gardenia and Apollo. Freddie then called HPD. The burglars knew they had been had and fled quickly, just as G.O. C.O.P. and HPD arrived. Freddie got a partial license number and a description of the vehicle and men. Woody and Lucille Mehrkam, Johnny Murphy, V.D. Kelley, and Freddie were at my house within seconds after the call was received. Thank you, FREDDIE and G.O. C.O.P. for your quick response and group effort in conjunction with HPD. Those burglars were run out of our neighborhood like scared rabbits! Let's hope they pass that along to their friends and family!

It's a shame my house was broken into. It is a shame when any house is broken into, but it proves two points - First, we need our neighbors watching for us when we are at work or out of town and we need to watch for them also. And secondly, G.O. C.O.P. works - it works well. Our base stations and patrollers are trained, ready, alert, and willing to go the extra mile. When I pulled in my drive at 3:30, there were three G.O. C.O.P. patrol trucks, a yard full of people, and an HPD blue and white with one more on the way to assist. Anyone who saw this crowd KNEW we care about our safety and our neighborhood and we don't take it lightly when we are violated.

G.O. C.O.P. is useful and vital to our neighborhood safety. I am grateful for the quick action and cooperation shown by this real life incident. It made for a good exercise and proved we do make a difference!

We had 185 hours patrolling for March with two incidents reported by patrollers to HPD. (My incident will be in the April figures.) Trish



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
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Constable Patrol Report

Plans are progressing to put a fulltime Deputy Constable on the streets of Section 1 & 1A. Organizers of the program reported in mid-April that about 180 residents have pledged financial support, but about 20-30 more are necessary to get the program started.

Work with the Precinct 1 Constable's Office already has reaped rewards. It is responsible for the additional stop signs on 30th and 34th Streets, and Deputy Constables have been visible patrolling streets and ticketing speeders. A Deputy also apprehended a gun-toting youth spotted at Graham Park.

Constable Jack Abercia answered questions about the program at a neighborhood meeting held March 24. Those attending also heard the security director from a Precinct 5 neighborhood describe how the patrol has drastically cut their crime rate.

Mike Slaughter, a Section 1 resident, has agreed to serve as the security director of the Section 1 & 1A Patrol. Mike will be the primary liaison between the neighborhood and the Constable's Office. He also will coordinate activities with the Garden Oaks Citizens on Patrol (C.O.P.) to provide the broadest possible coverage.



Handy Tips For a Green Earth The Drain Maintenance Ingredients:

1/2 cup baking soda 3 cups boiling water Pour the baking soda down the drain and follow with the boiling water. Let the baking soda and boiling water gurgle and bubble for a while before rinsing with hot tap water.

The Natural Chrome Cleaner

Ingredients:

3 tablespoons baking soda, enough for a paste The abrasive cleaning power of the baking soda on spots is very effective. Once the chrome is cleaned, rinse well with warm water.

Oven Cleaner

Ingredients:

baking soda water a squirt or two of liquid

soap

Sprinke water generously over the bottom of the oven, then cover the grime with baking soda. Sprinkle some more water on top of the baking soda. If you let it sit overnight you can effortlessly wipe up the grease the next morning. When you have cleaned up all the mess dab a little bit of recommended vegetable-oil-based soap on a sponge and wash the sides, top, and inside of the door, as well as any grease or baking soda residue on the bottom. GLASS: Separated into clear and colored glass; RINSED and CLEANED; NO LIDS; Labels can be left on; NO PLATE GLASS!; No plastic bags, please.

NEWSPAPERS: Bundled or placed in paper grocery bags; No plastic bags please.

COMPUTER PAPER: Bundled, boxed or placed in paper bags; No carbon inserts, no binding, no staples.

WHITE LEDGER: Bond paper bundled, boxed or placed in paper bags; NO glossy junk mail, NCR (No Carbon

Required) paper, or telephone books, no binding. **BROWN PAPER GROCERY BAGS** are also recyclable so use them whenever you can.

NO PLASTICS

Please follow these guidelines to make the recycling pick-up more efficient and pleasant. Cleaning glass containers and rinsing empty aluminum cans cuts down on the odor and mess. If you don't remove the lids or separate the glass, we have to and it slows the process down.
