President's Skinny

Last month the Garden Oaks Civic Club joined the Houston Homeowners Association, a group of neighborhood and civic associations around town. The HHA is working to keep neighborhoods informed as developments occur concerning the new zoning ordinance. One of the main concerns of this group is that many of the committee heads of the Zoning and Planning Commission are real estate developers who <u>may not</u> <u>always have homeowners interests in</u> <u>mind.</u>

Many things are happening with the zoning ordinance that could affect our neighborhood. Some of the issues being discussed include:

HOME-BASED BUSINESSES -What kind of businesses would be allowed in residential neighborhoods? The current criteria is the four NOs: no employees, no signs, no odors or noise, and no off-street parking. Will the City continue to enforce deed restrictions prohibiting home-based businesses in neighborhoods like Garden Oaks?

IN-HOME DAY CARES -Should they be permitted? Should there be limits on the number of children? Should there be distance requirements to limit the number of in-home day care on a street?

COMMERCIAL BUFFER ZONES -How much of a buffer zone should there be between residential and commercial areas? What kind of buffer zone is adequate? It is important to keep informed on the development of the ordinance pertaining to commercial buffer zones, especially those who live close to Ella, Shepherd and Yale.

Other areas being discussed include height restrictions, fencing, spacing requirements for group homes, and setbacks. It is important to note that neighborhoods like Garden Oaks could have stricter restrictions than the rest of Houston because the deed restrictions would still be enforceable. However, it is still important to keep informed on zoning developments because it will affect areas immediately around us.

I am looking for someone who would be interested in being the alternate representative to the HHA for the Civic Club. If you are interested, please call me. Also if enough people are interested, a small committee could be formed to develop positions on some of these issues for Garden Oaks. Think about it, the future of our neighborhood and the immediate areas depend on a strong enforceable zoning policy.

Can You See The Light?

The City of Houston has recently negotiated an agreement with Houston Lighting and Power Company to reduce the cost of upgrading street lighting. This will greatly reduce the cost to homeowners and civic clubs to convert residential area lights from mercury vapor to high-pressure sodium which provides <u>three times</u> greater illumination. Homeowners used to have to pay for three years of operation and maintenance costs per light which was a significant cost. Now only one year of operation cost is required and this may also be reduced.

Some believe that street lights are a major tool in reducing crime in residential areas. A survey printed in the January 1992 *Gazette* to determine what capital projects the Garden Oaks neighborhood wanted resulted in several Garden Oaks residents requesting additional or upgraded lighting on their streets.

Does Garden Oaks want to take advantage of this opportunity now? Please let your views be known by returning the following form to Anita Scherer, 4223 Apollo, 77018 by September 10. Once it is determined whether this project would be generally supported by Garden Oaks, additional information on costs and scheduling will be provided to allow the neighborhood a final decision as to whether or not this is something Garden Oaks would want and support.

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

Does Garden Oaks Want Sidewalks or What?

Mayor Lanier's neighborhood revitalization program includes the installation of sidewalks around neighborhood schools for school children walking to and from school. As many of you already know, Garden Oaks Elementary was targeted as one of those schools to receive sidewalks, if the school and neighborhood approve. According to the Capital Projects Department at the City of Houston, four-foot concrete sidewalks are planned where feasible. In areas where existing trees or ditches would not allow this, an asphalt pathway is planned. Gutters and curbs are not included in this plan.

This project is in the tentative stage right now. The streets tentatively chosen for these improvements are the 800 and 700 blocks of 41st Street, 700 block of Garden Oaks Blvd., 700 block of 38th Street, 700 block of Sue Barnett, Wakefield and Sara Rose. There will be no assessment to the homeowners living on these streets.

The question remains as to whether or not residents on these streets want sidewalks. If you live on the affected streets, please call my recorder at 956-7809 by September 4 and leave your name, the block you live on, and whether or not you want a sidewalk on your block. If this polling indicates that the neighborhood just won't support sidewalks on these streets, a letter from the Garden Oaks Civic Club will be written to the City of Houston requesting that Garden Oaks be removed from this project list. The Civic Club will continue to keep residents informed of the status of this project.





The Houston Association of REALTORS reported 3,216 properties that were sold in August, down 10.2 % from 3,581 sales in August of 1991. "I think we are seeing a healthy, steady market," said Beth Wolff, president of H.A.R. Sales in August were slowed somewhat by the impact of Hurricane Andrew and the Republican National Convention, she said. August is traditionally the stongest month of the year for home sales.
