Garden Oaks is an upwardly mobile neighborhood in northwest Houston. It is also the name found on an elementary school located in the heart of the neighborhood. As part of that neighborhood, we at Garden Oaks Elementary accept and eagerly welcome the challenge to improve our school. We also welcome the assistance to help meet this challenge that has so generously been offered by the Garden Oaks community. We have set very specific goals in student achievement for this school year.

We will improve student scores on the two major tests given by the State of Texas. Our goals are to meet the District goals of 90% passing TAAS and 80% passing NAPT within five years. This incorporates projected increases of up to 8 percent in the number of students passing for grades 3, 4, and 5 during this school year. The faculty, staff, administration, parents, and the community have accepted this challenge in the form of our Multi-Year School Improvement Plan.

But even more than test scores, we accept the challenge to make our school a place where all students will have very positive learning experiences: a place where we all work together to improve both teaching and learning. In 1992-1993, we will ensure that all our students experience a full, complete, and active life right now, so that their futures will be the best possible.

We make this pledge with the full understanding that when many of our students first come to us, they are not necessarily at the same level of "readiness" for school. They do not come to us with the same experiences or the same abilities. We vow, however, to be "ready" for all our students when they come. To do this, it will take the cooperation of the community working with the parents and the school. We celebrate and value our students' differences, for this is what makes every day at our school a valued learning experience in real life.

Last year, a School Improvement Team composed of teachers, parents, and community representatives formulated our School Improvement Plan. The Team included these specific strategies for community involvement: The school community will:

- communicate their concerns to the Shared Decision Making Committee (SDMC) through issue Forums.
- serve as representatives on the SDMC and Standing Committees for Instruction, School Climate, and School Budget.
- host a community-sponsored inservice for parents and residents to learn how to assist students in editing their writing.
- display student writing, math, science, and history projects at monthly Civic Club meetings.
- provide at least one set of literature for each grade level as determined by the Standing Committee on Instruction.
- publicize all school events in the Garden Oaks *Gazette*.
- participate in a structured Open House at the beginning of the year so that information on curriculum and school climate may be communicated.
- appoint an educational liaison with the Civic Club to report on school progress and volunteer opportunities.

Our Shared Decision Making Committee (SDMC) members for 1992-93 include two Community Representatives, Anita Scherer and Denise Sherwood, two parents and community residents, Sara Burns and Melanie Ogren, six teachers, Lillian Brown, Cecilia Gabrysch, Lottie Harvey, Patsy Klahn, Jane Minter, and Brenda Stratton, and the Principal, Eugenia Daniels. Any community resident, parent, or teacher may bring concerns or suggestions that affect our school improvement effort to the SDMC through Issue Forums. An Issue Forum may be organized by contacting the school (695-0475) and Informing Mrs. Daniels of your interest. A member of the SDMC will meet with you to assist you in organizing a meeting to discuss the issue, research possible solutions, and make recommendations. Meeting dates and minutes for all SDMC meetings will be posted at Garden Oaks Baptist Church, St. Matthews Methodist Church, and in the Main

Office at Garden Oaks Elementary. Dates will also be included on the Garden Oaks *Gazette* monthly calendar.

Garden Oaks Elementary is proud to be a part of this neighborhood. We hope to keep lines of communication open, and we invite community involvement in our school. Any resident is welcome to visit us at any time. By working together we will see significant improvements in our community school.

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
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Neighborhood Views


