LOCAL CHARM

The 43rd Street and Sue Barnett Art Park has been the subject of a lot of work over the last 5 years. This pocket park was essentially a vacant piece of City property virtually unnoticed by passersby. Then one day a small group of Garden Oaks residents became interested in improving the appearance of the area. This interest manifested into a rather large undertaking that was coordinated by the Beautification Committee then under Marion Mabry's direction. The project has evolved considerably. The City has deeded the property to our neighborhood and improvements continue to this day under Carla Hoyer's direction as money and time become available.

G.O. resident and Beautification member Anne Kilgore has been instrumental in the development of the park. In the initial planning stages Anne spearheaded a xeriscape approach to the landscaping. Xeriscaping is a popular landscaping method that emphasizes low water use plants that are native to the climactic and topographical area of proposed plantings. City municipalities particularly favor this approach to conserve City funded water. After adding berms, gardens, monumental art and many plants over the years, the Committee felt an attractive seating area would inspire walkers and neighbors to hang out. Although Anne was heavily involved in attaining a Masters degree in Applied Mathematics from Rice University, she volunteered to design and build a brick seating area that features several gardens and a future drinking fountain. Anne shopped hard for the materials, contracted the workers and supervised the construction of the project.

If you see her working over there, give her a friendly wave and a smile to thank her for all the hard work. It is through the collaboration of motivated neighbors like Anne and many other residents that continually donate time and money to projects like these that our community benefits. Who says that you can't make a difference! This neighbor of ours has certainly left a positive mark on Garden Oaks for generations to come by helping create this beautiful space for everyone to enjoy. NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY NEWS

We would like to make Garden Oaks residents aware that over Thanksgiving weekend we were burglarized while we were out of town.

We believe the suspect is the same fellow Warren caught in our backyard a week earlier on Thursday afternoon around 2 p.m., November 17. On that occasion, the young man had knocked at our front door, and when no one answered, he went around to the backside of the house, and Warren found him near the bedroom window. He had a black bicycle, was wearing black or dark jeans, and a black-hooded sweatshirt. He was black, between the ages of 17 and 24, around 5'10" in height, of muscular build, and had a short haircut.

November 25, the day following Thanksgiving, around noon to 12:15 p.m., Lucy Stautberg (two doors west of us) heard a bang in our backyard. About 40 minutes later while she and her husband were mowing their front yard, Lucy saw a black fellow of the same description walk down our driveway and toward Yale with a white sack over his shoulder. He was wearing white pants and a dark long-sleeved shirt. He disappeared in the warehouse complex across Yale. The burglar had entered through our bedroom window, ransacked the bedroom, and had gone through the part of the house where the blinds were down, taking small quick-sell items including our TV and VCR.

That night when we returned home, the Constable responded to our call within 3 minutes. Yet, earlier that afternoon, despite Lucy's four calls to HPD, it took over an hour for Houston police to respond.

PLEASE KNOW THAT YOU DO NOT HAVE TO BE A MEMBER OF THE CONSTABLE'S SECTION ONE SAFETY PROGRAM TO CALL FOR THEIR HELP!!

The program is set up expressly for crimes like this, and anyone in Section One is entitled to the Constable's assistance. They will respond immediately!

Our gut feeling is that this burglar will try our neighborhood again. If we are alert, like Lucy was, he can be deterred. He may come to your front door or he may be walking down the street.

If you see someone matching this description, please call the Constable. Officer Dick Matthias or the officer on duty will

check it out immediately.

We are grateful for neighbors like Lucy who look out for one another. As we face the rest of the holidays, our hope is that none of our neighbors have to go though what we have been through this past Thanksgiving. 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A REAL HUMMER IN GARDEN OAKS

If you look across the street from the Garden Oaks Elementary School, you'll see a parked vehicle that looks more suited for the desert than the comfort of our neighborhood. If you think you've seen it in the desert, you're right, because the look of this boxy, 4×4 all-terrain vehicle made it's show on television screens around the world during the Persian Gulf war. It's the Hummer, the civilian kin to the military's HUMVEE, and it's not owned by a general, but by Attorney Russ Waddell who moved to Garden Oaks in July with his wife, Casey.



Although Russ mostly handles personal injury cases, he claims he hasn't had to defend any clients by rolling up the courthouse steps in his Hummer - which could easily climb the throne of justice downtown. The Hummer climbs a 22-inch step with ease, and in terms of a smooth ride on rough terrain, is the luxury vehicle for weekend warriors. When Russ took me for a ride, we rolled through a ditch and around a nearby vacant lot with amazing buoyancy, thanks to the Hummer's 16-inch ground clearance, and it's wide and squatty frame. That frame configuration also provides for a very roomy interior.

Although Russ' Hummer is equipped with two air conditioners, he says the white, aluminum-clad vehicle is so cool in the summer that he could go without using the A/C. Other features are the 12,000-pound capacity winch, a 9,000-pound towing capacity, and a Central Tire Inflation System which inflates or deflates tires according to terrain.

Russ first got hooked on all-terrain vehicles years ago while serving as a Geologist's Assistant out in New Mexico and Arizona. But, in a city of flat terrain and asphalt, why own a Hummer? "It's the idea of knowing I can go anywhere, anytime," says Russ. This summer he drove it to Wyoming. When park rangers got a gander at the vehicle they wished they had, they quickly enlisted Russ' help in re-locating remote bear traps in the Tetons.

In a Hummer, there's also a feeling of invincibility, even if you are only driving through the window at Taco Cabana. On our ride, Russ unwittingly drove through a stop sign. But, then again, he is an attorney.

However enduring, popular, and pricey the comparative Land Rover, a Hummer may outlive it: the HUMVEE has an average military life of 12 years. That means a Hummer may last 15-20 years. For Russ, it's well worth the price tag. And, as he heads off to the mountains at Taos this winter, price is the last thing he'll be thinking about.

BEAUTIFICATION

Also I need to thank Suzanne Debien for supporting my efforts. She is always enthusiastic and never critical.
