

A new year brings Garden Oaks a new Civic Club President. Having lived in Garden Oaks for almost 22 years and raised two children, I'm well aware of the Civic Club's role in our neighborhood. For many years the Club's volunteers have provided excellent leadership to make Garden Oaks a fine community. I've got some big shoes to fill, but I'm looking forward to the challenge. I am very glad and relieved that the majority of officers and other key volunteers are returning for 1995. I had a chance to meet with them just after being elected and was very impressed with their knowledge, enthusiasm and dedication, but it was their desire to really make a difference that stood out the most.

Through the years the torch gets passed from person to person, group to group. The one constant...they are all volunteers. But before they become volunteers, they become Civic Club members. It has been suggested that increasing our Club's number of members will be my greatest challenge. Increased membership is the answer to more participation and more revenue. NEIGHBORHOOD TRAFFIC PROJECT UPDATE

Section One between Shepherd and Yale, and Section One west of Shepherd: A majority of the homeowners of Section One between Shepherd and Yale have approved their section's petition. In addition, a majority of the residents of Section One west of Shepherd have approved their section's petition.

The City of Houston has indicated that the next step is for temporary traffic devices to be installed in these sections. The purpose of the temporary traffic devices is to evaluate the effectiveness of the proposed traffic management plans and to identify any necessary changes to the proposed plans that need to be made prior to construction of the permanent traffic devices. The City has stated that the installation of the temporary devices will begin in late February at the earliest (a specific date has not been determined).

The temporary traffic devices (exit only, entrance only, etc.) to be deployed in locations according to the proposed traffic management plans as temporary traffic devices will be in place for an approximate three to six month evaluation period. It should be noted that the temporary traffic devices will not be as attractive in appearance as the permanent traffic

The proposed traffic management plans were prepared by traffic engineer consultants assigned by the City of Houston, together with input from the residents of Garden Oaks. Public meetings to solicit comment from Garden Oaks residents concerning specific traffic management proposals were conducted in February and April of 1994. It was explained in the public meetings that all streets in our neighborhood will remain two-way streets. Subsequently, petitions were initiated to obtain resident/homeowner approval of the proposed traffic management plans.

The goal of the proposed plans is to effectively manage through-traffic in Garden Oaks by making physical changes in accordance with current city guidelines, on Garden Oaks neighborhood streets which alter traffic circulation routes and/or reduce speeding without preventing public and emergency vehicle access to Garden Oaks or diverting traffic through another neighborhood.

Preface. I wanted to preface this article by my wonderful neighbor, **Margaret Hesse**, in order to tell you a little bit about our spotlight person of the month. He is not a long-time resident of Garden Oaks, (as a matter of fact he's only been here about five months), nor is he a native Texan. To be exact, he is not even American, he is German,...and as part of the Foreign Exchange Student Program he has come to the States to learn more about our culture. I think he came to the right place! He is living with our good friends John and "Margie" Hesse, and this is their story...

THEY'RE NOT JUST FOR BREAKFAST ANYMORE

Pancakes, of course. Since Rudolf came to live with us for a year, we've been having pancakes for dinner about once a month. The way he makes them, they are a little more like crepes than our American pancakes are. Usually, he fills them with shredded Gouda cheese and folds them in half. We've tried them plain, with maple syrup, with ham and cheese, with American cheese and with cheddar. Our Danish friend and neighbor even suggested ice cream, the way they are eaten in Denmark. Naturally, we tried that idea immediately! They seem to be delicious no matter how you slice them or how you fill them.

So you may ask, "How did Rudolf enter the picture?" Well, sometime last July my husband and I were looking at the paper when we came across an ad asking for families to become "guest families" to host foreign exchange students. It seemed like a good idea, so we called. About one month later we had a 16-year-old young man from Staig, Germany living in our extra room. Our own two children were excited about this new addition to the family too.

Rudolf has brought lots of new interests to our family and hightened our awareness concerning existing activities. He has a particular interest in fossils and he is a wonderful cook. Of all the things he loves about America, he says he enjoys all the freedom we have here in the States. "You can go anywhere and do almost anything," Rudolf exclaims. It's not exactly like that in his small hometown in Germany. In his village of a population of 500 there is only one restaurant. Imagine his excitement to find out about all-you-can-eat buffets! He is also amazed at how friendly and open people are here in the States.


When asked why he wanted to participate in the Foreign Exchange Student Program, Rudolf said other Germans had told him about America and it sounded so good he couldn't pass up the opportunity. "How else could I see America for free!" he added.

For us, Rudolf has opened our eyes to many new ways of thinking and new ways of doing things that go way beyond having pancakes for dinner. Plus, we've become a lot more sure of, proud of, and happy with the way we do things as Americans. Here in Garden Oaks and in America as a whole, there are so many things and so many good people for us to be thankful

for. Rudolf has helped us see and recognize so much.

In return, we have tried to help him see a few things too. A trip to Miller Outdoor Theatre proved exciting for Rudolf, as they don't have any free outdoor theaters in his hometown. He has also experienced real Texas barbeques, where the whole meal is cooked in the smoker, Astroworld, the Water Wall, allyou-can-eat buffets, baked potatoes, front yards, great neighbors,

an American Christmas, Thanksgiving on our family's farm in Missouri, downtown skyscrapers at night, Trick-or-Treating, live classical music, computer games, and on and on. When watching Rudolf's reaction to these things we realize we've gotten something else from him. We learned how much fun it is to have someone new to share with you all the things that you already love. Many times, new and exciting things to Rudolf are things that we have long taken for granted. Not anymore!

So the next time you are in a nearby grocery store and hear a polite young voice with a German accent asking for Gouda cheese, it will be pretty safe to assume that it's Rudolf. Please introduce yourself to Rudy and give him a big Garden Oaks welcome. He is here to experience what America is really like, and Garden Oaks is a great place for that! And oh, by the way, it would also be perfectly acceptable for you to ask him for his pancake recipe.

GERMAN COOKIE RECIPE

from Rudolf Schusteritsch 200 - 250 grams powdered sugar 200 grams very finely grated nuts of any kind 5 egg whites

- Beat the egg whites till you can turn the bowl over without them dropping out.
- Mix in the powdered sugar.
- Mix in the nuts.
- Drop by teaspoons onto a greased cookie sheet.
- It looks nice to decorate them with awhole nut.
- Bake at 350 degrees till light brown.

Crime Statistics for October, 1994 were as follows: one burglary and one auto theft. Statistics for November, 1994 include one rape, one assault and two burglaries. One of these burglaries was in Section 1, while the rest of this activity took place in Sections 2, 3, 4 and 5.

Many thanks goes to our diligent patrollers who are out each and every month. Currently we are down to eight regular patrollers trying to protect the 1500 homes in our neighborhood. Those interested in helping out with the effort to keep crime down in our area are encouraged to get involved in the GO-COPS Program. We do need more help.

In addition to the GO-COPS Program, there is yet another way for Garden Oaks residents to get involved and find out what is going on in the city and in our area. The Positive Interaction Program (P.I.P.) is open to those wishing to attend. This program offers us the opportunity to comingle with Houston Police Department officers. I have been attending these meetings lately and must admit that I've been quite amazed to find out about all the criminal activity that goes on around us. District 3 literature is usually available at these meetings containing Garden Oaks crime statistics. For those interested in attending, the meetings are held at St. Matthews Church off Shepherd and 43rd/Crosstimbers at 7 p.m. the third Thursday of every month. It is suggested that you go to the north side of the church to park and enter.
