CIVIC CLUB MEETING - IHOP REPRESENTATIVES TO ATTEND

The next Garden Oaks Civic Club meeting will be held at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, March 7, at the Garden Oaks Baptist Church, 3206 North Shepherd. It will be an important meeting so please plan to be there. We will be discussing the issue of whether or not the citizens of Garden Oaks approve or disapprove of the idea of an International House of Pancakes (IHOP) Restaurant being built in our area. If you would like to have a say in this matter it is necessary for you to attend this March meeting.

IHOP, with the approval of the Garden Oaks Civic Club, would like to build a restaurant to serve the Garden Oaks, Heights area.

The planned site is to be located on property East of (behind) Conn's Appliance Store at Shepherd and the Loop 610 frontage road.

IHOP Representatives are coming in from Dallas to attend our March 7 meeting and explain the **IHOP** operation, their plans for this location and to answer any questions. Because these representatives are from out-of-town, it is paramount that anyone with concerns about this issue be at the meeting to participate in the discussion.

Please plan to attend and remind your neighbors to be there for this **IHOP** presentation.

CIVIC INVOLVEMENT - Gazebo Tribute

What started out as the dream of **Earl Dragics** has expanded into a neighborhood project. Dragics has long wanted to erect a gazebo in one of Garden Oaks' pocket parks to commemorate members of his family. Now, for a donation of \$50, any Garden Oaks resident may have the name of a loved one honored or memorialized on a permanent fixture at the gazebo.

Dragics has made the Garden Oaks community an offer to improve the appearance of our neighborhood. He is willing to donate \$2,000 toward a gazebo displaying a plaque in memory of his late wife Lenore, son Earl, Jr., and grandson Jason. Builder, Harry James, has been contacted and is willing to construct the gazebo. The intended site of this structure preferred by Dragics is in the small pocket park at 42nd St. and Sue Barnett. This site could be a point of numerous activities, including a location for Santa Claus during our Christmas celebration.

In order to accomplish this goal, it is necessary to raise about \$2,000 more. This is an opportunity for all civic-minded residents to contribute to the beautification of our neighborhood, while tributing someone they love. The **deadline for contributions is May 1, 1995**. Over the years, G.O. as well as the other surrounding neighborhoods have established and maintained a close working relationship with the officers at the North Shepherd Station. It would certainly be a shame to see this North Shepherd Station close completely. In an effort to continue enjoying the results of having police officers so close by, I urge you to express your wishes to the Mayor and our City Council Members to keep this facility open in some capacity. As G.O. residents we are represented by District A Councilwoman, Helen Huey. If this issue is important to you, please write a letter to all City Council members and the Mayor expressing your concerns and requests.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

On February 2, Alex Martinez resigned as President of the Civic Club for personal reasons. Faced with the prospect of a leaderless organization I agreed to stand for President and was elected by affirmation at the February 7 Civic Club meeting. At that same time I resigned as Treasurer and Ray Housley was elected in my place.

Our City Council Representative, Helen Huey, gave a remarkably well prepared and thorough presentation on just about every issue of importance to our community. She told us about new city laws to protect the integrity of the neighborhood, listed improvements made under Neighborhoods to Standards, and described changes in the Traffic Control Program. And she did it before the largest crowd anyone can remember at a Civic Club meeting.

Bill Chastain, co-chair of Citizens-on-Patrol, honored three members of our community, Helen Hawkins, Patsy Gantt, and David Bell, for patrolling 100 hours. The jackets presented to them are only tokens of the debt our community owes them. Their efforts on our behalf have reduced crime by roughly 80% since the inception of the program.

All of the GO-COP volunteers deserve our praise and support. Please assist their good works by helping match Mark Neff's "GO-COP Challenge". Funds for this program are important but volunteers willing to donate a few hours a month are in even shorter supply.

And now a very different topic. It has been brought to our attention that the International House of Pancakes (IHOP) wants to talk with us about placing one of their restaurants in the neighborhood. The planned location is the three empty lots directly behind Conn's along the 610 feeder. Few additional details are known at this time, but IHOP representatives from California will meet with the Board of Trustees on February 27 or 28. I have asked IHOP to present their plans to the Civic Club at our next meeting on March 7. I encourage you to attend—it will be an important meeting. We'll let you know if plans change.

Thank you for electing me as your President. If the first few meetings are any indication, this should be a very exciting year.

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT - MARC AND JANE ANN ROBERTS

South of the railroad tracks, in Section One of Garden Oaks, an invisible yellow brick road leads to a gray house with a red front door. It opens into the warm, inviting living room of the home that belongs to the Wizard of Garden Oaks and Dorothy.

Actually, the Wizard and Dorothy are Marc and Jane Ann Roberts, who are two of the most supportive and generous volunteers in Garden Oaks. In comparison to the Wizard of Oz, Marc has exhibited his technical, calm and sensible skills many times in his excellent performance as Chairman of the Neighborhood Traffic Program. Compared to Dorothy of Kansas, Jane Ann is kind, sweet, loyal, and tireless, as exhibited in her efforts to support a better education for the children of Garden Oaks. Together, they have donated thousands of hours volunteering for numerous neighborhood programs.

Jane Ann formed the "Roberts Volunteer Team" after meeting a lot of neighborhood residents at church activities. She started working with education groups that are active in the neighborhood schools. Her interest in education stems from her career as a middle school science teacher and a high school mathematics teacher in the Spring Independent School District. Although Jane Ann had retired from teaching for the sake of motherhood, she felt compelled to remain active in education.

Marc became very supportive of her civic efforts and soon joined in helping the neighborhood. He works as Manager of Human Resources Information Services for American General Corporation. Marc earned a bachelor of science degree in computer science from A&M University and a masters degree in business from the University of Texas, where Jane Ann also earned her degree in education with fields of study in biology and mathematics.

They married in 1982 and moved to Garden Oaks in 1987 because they were "looking for a unique house in a unique neighborhood." Both Marc and Jane Ann never lived in one home for very long, and they wanted a place to hang his "wizard hat" and her "red shoes" for many years to come. "I think this neighborhood has allowed Jane Ann to do a lot of the things she never did before. It allowed her to settle down and live the kind of life she committed to," said Marc. Jane Ann added, "So many of the residents are friendly and kind people who make Garden Oaks a great place to live."

Some of their commitments to the neighborhood have included helping with the Garden Oaks Home Tour, delivering Gazettes, working as Citizens-on-Patrol, assisting in the Constable Program, serving as block captains, working with the Recycling and Membership Programs and of course, the Montessori Program in Garden Oaks Elementary School and the Neighborhood Traffic Program. This past summer Jane Ann donated more than 300 hours to helping set up the Montessori Program, and now works many hours each week assisting in it.

Marc has spent endless hours working on plans for traffic control and proposals. He organized the program and conducted numerous meetings with residents so that they could be informed and voice their opinions. The informative articles in the Gazette about the program, the public meetings, the circulation of the petitions and the communication with city officials are a direct result of his efforts and the efforts of the many volunteers who work with him.

Home life at the Roberts household is centered around their two sons, six-year-old Chris and three-and-a-half Steven. There's no dog named Toto, but their two cocker spaniels Dusty and Lacy reign supreme. GARDEN OAKS ELEMENTARY MONTESSORI REGISTRATION BEGINS MARCH 1

Registration for new applicants for the 1995 - 96 Garden Oaks Elementary Montessori Program will begin March 1, 1995, on a first-come, first-serve basis. Limited positions are available. If your child is already in the Montessori Program, you **do not** need to register again. If you were on the waiting list for the 1994 - 95 program, you **do** need to register if you want to be considered for the 1995 - 96 program.

Acceptance into the program will be on a first-come, first-serve basis within ethnic age groupings. For the 1995 - 96 school year, enrollment in the Montessori Program will be 45% Hispanic, 41% White, 13% Black and 1% Other.

A new pre-primary (3,4, and 5-year-olds) Montessori class will open in the fall of 1995. There will be 22 children in this class. Additional spaces may be available in the other classes depending on attrition. Currently there are three Montessori classes at Garden Oaks one 3,4,5-preprimary and two 5,6, and 7-year-old classes.

You **must** register to be considered for the Montessori Program. Open enrollment will be March 1 through March 31, 1995 in the school office. Applications will **not** be accepted prior to March 1.
