PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

June's meeting is coming up on us very quickly and our expected guest, IHOP, is not prepared to meet with us and present their revised plan. That's probably fine with most of the neighbors because, with few exceptions, most of the people I speak with, in and out of Section One, do not want a restaurant in the neighborhood. We had another good meeting last month. HPD Officer Gonzalez stepped in for Kim Ogg, the Mayor's Gang Task Force Leader, and gave a very credible presentation on gang activity in the city, and what we can do to curtail it. Most of that concerns shutting down communications- erasing or painting over the graffitti which marks territory and conveys threats. Making our presence visible through GOCOP or the Constable Program helps a lot too. If you see graffitti contact Captain DeFoor at the North Shepherd Substation- the city will provide paint and parollees to remove it.

Speaking of the North Shepherd Substation... we may still lose it! If this nearby station is closed police response time will be significantly impacted. Letters and phone complaints to the Mayor and the Police Chief have brought the situation to their attention. However, more letters are needed. I NEED YOUR HELP! My letter alone, as president or private citizen, is not enough. Our letters together can keep the substation near our neighborhood open. Please join me in writing letters to the Mayor, District A Councilwoman Helen Huey, and the At-Large Councilmembers. All of these city officials can be reached at: P.O. Box 1562, Houston, TX 77251. This issue is very important to the long term viability of our neighborhood.

In July and August we will not have regular Civic Club meetings. Our July meeting falls on the 4th and we're having a parade! Details in this and next month's *Gazette*. Call the indefatigible Janice Walden at 869-6534 to help out and be part of this unique experience!

I'm sure that our patrollers know exactly who I am referring to, but for anyone who doesn't know, it's **V.D. and LaVerne Kelley**. The **Kelleys** have devotedly patrolled two hours every week for over four years.

It is certainly wonderful when you can ask for someone to volunteer their time and they respond in a way that makes it seem as though they would be happy as can be to help in whatever way is needed. This is the attitude reflected by the **Kelleys**,...not just sometimes, but always! The last item at April's Civic Club meeting was a brainstorm and quick discussion of the pro's and con's of the IHOP proposal made during the March meeting. It was clear from the comments and the overwhelming number of negative responses that the majority of residents attending the meeting did not consider an IHOP in the neighborhood to be in their best interest. The comments as recorded are listed below.

Pro:

- IHOP would look better than the unmaintained lot
- · Caters to families
- Serves no alcohol and will not encourage that element

Con:

- Increased traffic
- Sets a precedent for other businesses in the neighborhood
- Big sign (300 sq. ft. on 45 ft. pole) visible from within neighborhood
- Parking lot lights may shine into the neighborhood
- Possible 24 hour restaurant
- Late night traffic
- · Overflow parking will go into neighborhood
- Doesn't look better than the unmaintained lot
- We will lose trees
- Encroaches on the neighborhood
- House values will decline
- Truck traffic and noise from trucks supplying the restaurant
- Once deeded commercial it is always commercial and we have no control once restrictions are changed
- Traffic control plan may be reversed (proposal would close 30th to inbound traffic behind IHOP entrance)
- Increased crime with 24 hour restaurant

WHEN: Second Saturday of the month from 8 to 11 a.m. **WHERE:** Drop-off at the Garden Oaks Theater parking lot

WHAT AND HOW:

Aluminum Cans: Non-magnetic, RINSED.

NON-FERROUS METALS: Items such as copper, brass, and aluminum. No refrigerators, dishwashers or other appliances.

GLASS: Separated into clear and colored glass; RINSED AND CLEANED; NO LIDS; Labels can be left on; NO PLATE GLASS;

NEWSPAPERS: Bundled or placed in paper grocery bags; no plastic bags please. **COMPUTER PAPER:** Bundled, boxed or placed in paper bags; no carbon inserts, no

binding, and no staples.

WHITE LEDGER: Bond paper bundled, boxed or placed in paper bags; NO glossy junk mail, NCR (No Carbon Required) paper, or telephone books, no binding

BROWN PAPER GROCERY BAGS are also recyclable so use them whenever you can. **PLASTICS:** Milk jugs and plastic soft drink bottles rinsed and cleaned.

GARDENING TIPS:

- Now is the time to feed camellias, hibiscus, roses, and crape myrtles. Use a systemic fertilizer with insecticide if pests are a problem.
- Mulching becomes more important as the heat sets in. Maintain at least a two inch thickness of mulch to keep the soil cool and retain moisture. Finish planting summer vegetables such as okra, peppers, and beans. Start planning your fall garden now.
- Do not fertilize newly set out trees or shrubs until after they have started to grow, and then only very lightly the first year.
- When buying plants, the biggest is not always the best, especially with bare rooted plants. The medium to small sizes usually become established faster and will become effective in the landscape much quicker than the larger sizes.
- Wait until after flowering before pruning spring-flowering shrubs such as quince, azaleas and forsythia.
- When pruning shrubs, follow these steps: a) prune out any dead or damaged branches first, b) thin out by removing about 1/3 of the canes or stems at ground level, removing the oldest canes only, c) shape the rest of the plant, but do not cut everything back to the same height.

HOUSTON HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION DAY PROGRAM

HELP PROTECT OUR DRINKING WATER AND ENVIRONMENT BY PROPERLY DISPOSING OF HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE...

The City of Houston, through the Department of Health and Human Services is sponsoring a Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day Program for residents of Northwest and North Central Houston.

The collection will take place on Saturday, June 17, 1995, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Solid Waste Management Northwest Transfer Station located at 14400 Sommermeyer (just south of Hempstead Hwy., between Campbell and Gessner).

Residents may bring such products as paint, lawn and garden chemicals, car batteries, and used motor oil to the collection site. Waste from commercial businesses or facilities will not be allowed. Only waste generated from household users will be accepted. All collected items will be recycled, reused or disposed of in an environmentally safe manner.

For more information about this event or the proper disposal of and less toxic alternatives to household hazardous wastes, please contact the Household Hazardous Waste Information Line at 247-8589.

Tips on Material Preparation for HH Hazardous Waste Collection Day

- 1)Maximum container size per item is one gallon. Do not mix different or unknown materials together;
- 2) Any empty containers and/or containers with dried out paint may be disposed of in your hh trash;
- 3)Bring materials in their original containers, if possible. Every effort should be made to identify material. If you do not know what it is, mark it "unknown;"
- 4) When transporting, place in trunk area away from the driver and/or passengers;
- 5)If containers are leaking, pack in a larger container and use an absorbent material such as kitty litter to soak up leaks; and
- 6) For long term storage, store in a cool dry place. Many chemicals, especially those in cardboard packing can absorb moisture.

These days, it is good to know neighbors are looking out for your safety! Bill and Ginny Chastain take this good deed one step further than just looking out for the people next door. They guard the whole neighborhood as - THE PROTECTORS OF GARDEN OAKS!

Bill and his lovely wife Ginny are in charge of the Garden Oaks Civic Club's CitizensonPatrol (COP) Program. Both have devoted a considerable amount of time and effort to make Garden Oaks a secure neighborhood. They route and schedule patrols for volunteers to drive through the streets of Garden Oaks and report any unusual activity that is of a suspicious nature and might involve criminal activity.

"Participation in COP is very low, but expectation is very high," said Bill. "There are

four base stations in Garden Oaks and we need 32 volunteers, but we have only eight volunteers who patrol regularly. Two patrollers ride together on each route and keep in contact by CB radio. If there is a problem we call HPD immediately," Bill explained. The Chastains instituted the "Patroller of the Month" award to show appreciation for individuals who volunteer above and beyond the call of duty.

Bill and Ginny are well known at the Houston Police Department for their participation in the Positive Interaction Program (PIP) for the North Shepherd South Community, which meets every month at St. Matthew's United Methodist Church on North Shepherd. Both recently graduated from the Civilian Police Academy and are now in the alumni association, which helps the police department in its various programs. Bill has ridden with police on their car patrols and looks forward to participating in a soon to be scheduled HPD helicopter patrol.

WHEN? - Second Saturday of every month from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. In case of bad weather, it will be postponed to the third Saturday and signs will be posted at the site.

Congratulations residents! You answered the emergency call to fulfill the 1994-95 contract which expires May 30, 1995. We reached our financial goals and covered the shortfall. Thanks!

The new 1995-96 contract will be renewed. Two points of note: 1) if you haven't sent in your check for the coming contract year, please do so now. Make checks payable to: Garden Oaks Civic Club and memo it Constable Program; and 2) To cover both last year's and this year's inflationary increases, the Constable's contract with us has gone up 5%.

- 2. Four installment payments of \$55.00 each. One payment in June, one in July, one in August, and the final payment in September for a total of \$220.00.

As mentioned at the May Civic Club meeting, the former annual fee of \$180.00 will be honored by all those who have paid in full before June 1, 1995. Thereafter, the new rate applies.

Unfortunately, due to the number of residents who did not fulfill their final payment on the quarterly plan, we are no longer able to offer payment throughout the year. If this new policy causes hardship, please call Warren Walden 869-6534 to work out a different plan.
