INTERNATIONAL HOUSE OF PANCAKES UPDATE



FROM THE EDITOR...

I thought I'd take the opportunity this month to share with you some neighborhood history that I was fortunate enough to have been given when my husband Chris and I moved into Garden Oaks. This article is taken from a move-in package we received some seven-and-a-half years ago. I hope that you enjoy it. I know that we did.

Garden Oaks began in the mind of a successful developer, Edward Lillo Crain. He came to Houston from Longview in the early twenties. In 1937, after building Southside Place and Sylvan Beach, he acquired the 750 acres which became Garden Oaks. He set out to build a "beautiful but inexpensive" community. He succeeded at doing this with some 1500 homes standing today.

Mr. Crain formed the Garden Oaks Company, along with Mr. Brace as his Vice President, and Mr. Carruth and Mr. Sushold as salesmen in offices on the corner of 39th St. and Shepherd. This was rural Houston with a dude ranch for a neighbor, an unpaved Shepherd (impassable in heavy rains), and a few stores. The new Minimax at 29th and Shepherd was a welcome addition. Before this wonderful convenience, shoppers had to catch the bus at 29th or drive the new roads.

By 1941, the majority of homes in Sections I, II, and III were sold. The school was billed as the most modern facility in the South. The Garden Oaks Company had moved to more lavish quarters in a colonial style mansion on the corner of Garden Oaks Blvd. and Shepherd Drive. The building housed Mr. Crain, Mr. Brace, the two salesmen, and two architects (one of whom was B.W. Crain, Jr., nephew to the President). The building boasted great conference rooms, sales offices, and a genuine dial front room size vault which evidenced the company's prosperity.

Mrs. Ella Sutherland was hired in 1941 as a bookkeeper. She was a widow who had been looking for work for three-and-a-half years. Katie Randall, Mr. Crain's secretary and a friend of her family, suggested Mrs. Sutherland for a temporary assignment. After a month, Mr. Brace offered Sutherland \$100 a month to make the position permanent. A forty year deal was struck that April 7, 1941.

Mrs. Sutherland's memories of the hectic development of Section IV are quite colorful. Section IV was a wartime development. Freezes on building material meant that houses not begun by a certain date could not be finished. Mr. Crain opened his own mill, lumber yard (Edloe Lumber), and warehouses so that he could finish his homes. Construction went on day and night; as many as ten homes at a time were started. Mrs. Sutherland recalls the bookkeeping worries as billing on so many houses poured into her office.

The section was successfully completed. Young couples flowed into this area. Most paid only \$195 with a mortgage of \$2500 and a 31 year lease on the lot. The lot prices were guaranteed at \$750, and many a lot were still being leased into the 1970s.

Section V was completed when the Garden Oaks Company's Vice President, Brace, and salesman, Carruth, formed Brace and Carruth Builders and purchased the remaining lots for speculative building. As builders, they carried on the tradition of quality construction for the average man.

Garden Oaks Village was a complex of small duplexes on individual lots where Carters Grove Apartments now stand. The village, designated Section VI, became a motor hotel for a while until rerouting of highway traffic again made rentals more feasible.

Mr. Crain lived in Garden Oaks Village for a while in a specially remodeled two unit place until his death in 1950. During the primary development of Garden Oaks, he lived in a pink stucco estate on 25 acres just west of Yale and south of Crosstimbers.

Mr. Brace was actually the only principal of the Garden Oaks Company to live in Garden Oaks. His lovely home, complete with modern sleeping porches, is still a showpiece at 737 W. 43rd Street. The gracious style of the Brace home has endured for more than 45 years.

When the Garden Oaks Company disbanded, the responsibility of deed restriction enforcement was passed on to a group of homeowners selected to serve on the first Garden Oaks Board of Trustees. For 30 years these members and their successors have done their job so well that Garden Oaks has been modeled after by many newer developments. In 1981, the last of the original Board of Trustee members retired from service on the board.

When other areas are undergoing sudden revival in these nostalgic times, Garden Oaks stands quietly in its survival, remaining today much as Edward Lillo Crain had planned.

CONSTABLE PATROL UPDATE

The home is currently undergoing remodeling. Janet had just come to check on the building site when she saw a black male pass in front of the front window going toward the backdoor inside the house. As she returned to her car, Forster noticed a Constable vehicle patrolling and flagged down Deputy, Dick Matthias. Matthias called for back up, entered the house, went out the backdoor and found the suspect hiding behind the back gate. The suspect was taken into custody and charged with burglary of a habitat. The man, in his late 40s, had been seen in the neighborhood before. No bond was posted, as the burglar was out on parole for other theft convictions.

TRAFFIC PROJECT UPDATE

We have recently received word from the City of Houston that they are making changes in the procedures associated with the current neighborhood traffic project ordinance.

Until these changes are complete, the City will be unable to proceed with the planning or installing of any temporary devices in our neighborhood. They anticipate final ordinance revisions to be presented to City Council in September.

The City will adopt a revised ordinance. This does not mean that we are starting over, it simply means that as soon as they make up their minds they will get back with us on how we can proceed.

In the meantime, speed humps have become an available option. Details regarding this new speed hump program and request procedures can be obtained from the City at the following address:



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GO-COP REPORT

by Bill Chastain CRIME STATS ARE UP FOR THE MONTH OF APRIL. There seemed to be an increase in crime for the month of April. There was one assault, two burglaries, one burglary of a motor vehicle and three auto thefts.

We have some new patrollers who will be watching out for Garden Oaks, and as is evident from our April crime stats, new patrollers are very much needed.

In the past we have had a few people undergo the necessary HPD training to assist as Citizens on Patrol (COP) and never actually spend any time on patrol. We've also had several people patrol for a short time and then inadvertently drop out. This "drop-out" syndrome is a symptom of burnout. It is always hoped that this drop-out is temporary and that the patrollers will return, however, the return rate has been consistently low.

Responsibility for helping to keep our neighborhood safe is much harder when it falls on the shoulders of a small number of regular volunteer patrollers representing Garden Oaks. There is an old saying, "many hands make light work." This is our goal,...to spread the load over many shoulders to make the load lighter on each individual.

Our **Patrollers for the month of June are Dennis and Cathy Spar.** Garden Oaks will show its gratitude by treating them to a meal at the restaurant of their choice. Keep up the good work Dennis and Cathy. We appreciate your efforts!

The Positive Interaction Program meetings are on the third Thursday of every month at 7 p.m. at St. Matthews United Methodist Church. This organization, as many of you already know, is a liaison between law enforcement and civilians, so that each can gain a better understanding of the other. These meetings often feature something of interest to those in the community. The June 15 meeting featured a demonstration by the HPD Airport Division Explosive Detection Team on how the dogs find explosives.

GO-COP PARTICIPATION REQUIREMENTS - GET INVOLVED!! By Bill Chastain

It is a shame that some people feel the need to steal from others, rather than work for it. The expense that we go to to prevent ourselves from being victims of crime varies a great deal from person to person. Insurance, alarm systems, burglar bars, and the club are just a few of the tried methods for protecting ourselves and our property. There are two inexpensive ways that the community can contribute to this protection. One is to have a block captain system in combination with neighbors having each others phone numbers. The other is our GO-COP program. The patrollers that we have are doing a great job, but as we have said before, "we could use more help."

GO-COP is a volunteer group of Garden Oaks residents who patrol our streets in cars with CB radios and/or cellular phones. They are concerned with neighborhood safety. They want to provide a service for our neighbors,...a service that you can use and rely upon when you go on vacation, or to work, or simply to the grocery store. It is the signs on the sides of the cars that are patrolling our streets that tell thieves this area is watchful, making chances of getting away with a crime harder.

WHAT DOES IT TAKE TO BE A VOLUNTEER PATROLLER?

The following are the requirements as set by HPD:

• Fill out an application and return it.

• Attend either of the HPD required meetings held the second Thursday at 10 a.m. or the fourth Thursday at 7 p.m. at the Candlelight Park Club House at 1520 Candlelight Ln.

• Must travel in vehicle. Cannot patrol on foot or bicycle due to safety reasons.

• The COP Coordinator must know when you plan to attend the HPD training.

• No one will be allowed to patrol without having received HPD instruction.

• Trainees will be given a manual and then driven around in order to show the trainee what to expect.

• Anyone over 18 years of age that hasn't received instruction may still ride with someone who is certified.

WHAT'S IN THIS FOR YOU?

Hopefully what's in this for you is the satisfaction that you are the eyes and ears of the police department. You are pleased you are watching out not only for yourself, but also your neighbors. The realization that when you patrol you do not see anyone breaking in is a good sign.

• Once a month, one dependable patroller is chosen to receive a gift certificate for a restaurant of their choice.

• After ten hours of patrolling, you will receive a COP cap.

°After 25 hours you will receive a COP T-shirt.

°After 85 hours there is an 85 hour T-shirt. °When 100 hours is completed, you will receive a very nice COP jacket.

Note: Due to a shortage in patrollers, the last gift certificate to be handed out this year will be in August, unless we have some new volunteers soon.
