

GO Sound-off

TO THE EDITOR:

I would like to compliment you, your staff and all those who contribute to the Gazette. The publication is especially important to those who can't make the Civic Club meeting as often as we would like. It serves as our only communication link and provides interesting and sometimes invaluable information on activities and concerns throughout the area.

In reading Volume 19, No. 3, I note that some residents are still pushing the "plan" for a traffic project that has been more heavily opposed than supported throughout the neighborhood, particularly among those in Section One. However, as one who understood the "planners" concerns, I was happy to see some relief provided through the speed hump program, which I suggested from the beginning. There is little doubt that it will reduce the traffic flow and slow down those who continue to use streets such as W. 34th for a thruway to Shepherd and Yale streets. Perhaps more stop signs at our intersections would help too. There is, however, no room for the re-emergence of the "plan" that closed off or makes oneway streets in Section One and (for example) results in the re-routing of traffic currently using W34th over to W32nd. Please, let's not try to solve a problem for one street by dumping it onto another. That plan is just not going to work in the best interest of Section One, and again will certainly be opposed to the fullest extent possible. In addition, it would be a waste of taxpayer funds to do the work of that unfair plan. Any viable, new traffic plan, if it is needed in the future, should never remedy a problem to the benefit of one and the detriment of another.

The traffic project being proposed is for Section 1A (West of N. Shepherd - between 610 feeder road and W34th Street). The plan includes a street closure on Randall Street and an exit only on W30th @ N. Shepherd. Once the application is approved by the City, a public meeting will be held to gather public comments. Section 1 is currently having speed humps installed on W34th Street. There are no plans at this time to reactivate the traffic plan for Section 1. Editor

RECYCLING TIPS

When you bring your recyclables to the Garden Oaks recycling site on the second Saturday of each month, please try to follow these tips. They make the work much easier for the recycling volunteers.

1) Only send plastics with number 1 or 2 stamped on them. Look for the recycling triangle on the plastic and check the number inside the triangle. All plastic other than 1 or 2 has to be hand sorted and thrown away. Our recycling vendor can only recycle 1's and 2's.

2) Don't send plastic bags. Our vendor cannot recycle plastic bags. However, Kroger's on 43rd has a bin near the courtesy booth where plastic bags are accepted.

3) Rinse out bottles. Anything you don't rinse will stink at your house between drop off days as well as pose a major nuisance to the recycling volunteers.

4) Take the lids off bottles. This saves an extra sorting step at the recycling site.

5) Keep your recylables sorted. Since we have to sort material for our recycling vendor, the site volunteers have to sort through any mixed bags that sometimes have newspaper, glass and cans all mixed together. Keeping the glass sorted is also safer, as that one bottle in the bag of newspapers might get missed and break in the newspaper bin. The less sorting, the more time the volunteers have to help unload cars.

6) Take your newspapers out of the plastic bags. The recycling vendor cannot take plastic mixed in with the newspaper. so the volunteers have to take the plastic bags out. Tying newspaper in bundles or storing in brown paper bags is fine, but please take the plastic out.

Lot's of people changing roles this year... Some calling it quits from burnout, others from new opportunities or new challenges. Deborah Cartwright, our program chair, is moving to Austin. She began coordinating our speakers in January '94 and is a big reason why attendance is up at our civic club meetings. Best of luck in Austin Deborah. Terry Jeanes, real estate agent extraordinaire and former civic club president, is our new program chairperson. In another change, an opportunity advertised last month, Misty Jones has volunteered to head Beautification. Misty is very capable and I know she'll bring a lot of energy to this new role. She replaces Carla Hoyer who is taking a lead role in the Montessori program.

Denise Epstein and Warren Walden retired from the Section 1 Constable Program and handed their duties to Angela Dixon and Kim McMath. Thank you all for stepping up to a position with real responsibility and one that requires more than a fair share of effort. Warren did a great job helping out this last year, boosting the number of supporters. And a giant thank you to Denise for carrying a heavy load for four years. Her hard work made the constable program possible and kept it on track during some very thin times.

And speaking of the Constable Patrol... The Section 1 Constable program is supported by 50% of the houses in Sections 1 & 1A. That's not right and there is no excuse. Every house in those Sections benefits from the program and each dwelling should pay its fair share. Doing so would lower costs for all or increase the number of patrol hours we could purchase. If you haven't joined, please reconsider your decision and join now. And if you're not going to join, please call Angela and let her know why.

Sound abatement wall along 610: The state has no plans to erect a sound abatement wall in the period of their next planning horizon. Well... Let's just say they don't have plans yet. With your help and coordinated effort on all our parts we can make ourselves heard where we need to be heard. That apparently is with our state representatives and in Austin. We need a champion for this cause- please contact me if you are willing to undertake this effort.

Our speed humps are here! I like them. But then again, I drive slowly through the neighborhood anyway.

Last, but not least, Graham Park. Work began recently in Graham Park and several phone calls to me rapidly made it clear that the park plans developed in discussions between Garden Oaks and the City Department of Public Works weren't being followed. Two big concerns were flooding in the park, where roughly 1/3 to 1/2 of the park is under water after moderate rains, and the location of the playground too close to the street. Why we never received a set of plans from the city baffles me and despite many calls to the city over the last year nothing happened until Ann Spiering contacted Barbara in Helen Huey's office. Within two days Ann had a meeting with Public Works and Gilbane, the contractor, and the plans are being changed to make this a functional park. Please contact Ann at 862-6138, she is the point person for Graham Park. And yet another thank you to Helen Huey's office, and Barbara in particular, for breaking through the logjam we too often face when dealing with local government.

FAMILIES COUNT AT GARDEN OAKS

Garden Oaks Elementary School is one of three schools in Harris County chosen to host the Families Count in Harris County program. The program will offer services and resources to families within their own community. The program guidelines are flexible enough to allow the staff to respond to the unique needs of the community.

Families Count in Harris County is staffed by a full-time Family Resource Coordinator and a full-time Home Based Therapist. With the help and cooperation of other agencies in Harris County the Center will offer Parent education classes and support groups, family and child recreational opportunities, children's skill building groups, tutoring services, and the services of a Disabilities Specialist.

The success of the program will depend upon the participation of the residents and businesses in the Garden Oaks area. If you would like to know more about the program or if you would like to volunteer your time and your talent please contact Patricia Miller (699-1016).

Families Count in Harris County was developed by the Harris County Collaboration for Family Preservation and is partially funded with a grant from the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Service and administered by DePelchin Children's Center.

They explained that law abiding citizens are often not aware of the lengths the criminal will go to in breaking the law, particularly smuggling. These customs officers were instrumental in opening our eyes on how and what is going on in the world of crime as it relates to their job. There was also a demonstration by a drug sniffing dog. The dogs are able to search for drugs and cut down on the time spent. For instance, if a person had to check out a car, it might take a couple of hours. A dog could cover it in about five minutes.

One of my last official acts was presenting the very attractive GO Cop jacket to Dennis and Cathy Spar who have patrolled 100 hours. I hope they enjoy wearing them as much and Jinny and I have. Thank you so much, Dennis and Cathy for your concern for safety and security of our neighborhood.

I am also happy to set up a HPD helicopter ride for Johnny Murphy. Johnny has patrolled, been a base station and repaired C.B. radios for three years. Seeing Houston from 1,000 feet is quite a sight. Enjoy yourself, Johnny, and thanks for being an important part of GO Cop.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone in Garden Oaks for their cooperation in making the COP a valuable part of the community. Also those who without their help, the "Gazebo" could not have been completed.

CONSTABLE PROGRAM UPDATE -

NEW CONSTABLE PATROL SECURITY DIRECTOR

The Constable Patrol Security Director is now Angela Dickson at 802-0817, 3114 Lawrence. The Constable Program provides service to Sections 1 and 1A due to the hard work of the former director, Denise Epstein and many others who walked the streets to gainparticipation in order to afford the program. If you see Denise, please thank her for her four years of hard work to keep this program going!

In case there is any confusion, the Constable Program, which is active in Garden Oaks Sections 1&1A only is not to be confused with Citizens on Patrol, also referred to as GO COP or COP. Citizens on Patrol is a wonderful volunteer program that serves all of Garden Oaks.

In March's *Gazette*, a miscommunication occurred which made it appear that the Constable Program applied to all of Garden Oaks rather than Sections 1&1A only. The Constable Program is paid for by residents in these sections and was started June 1, 1992 after a bad year of crime statistics in these Sections. Some residents, with Denise Epstein at the helm, decided it was time to fight back and block walked all homes in Sections 1&1A in order to gain financial backing for the program. Crime statistics in these sections showed and continue to show great improvement over pre-Constable days.

The Contract we have calls for 40 hours a week as mentioned in the March article. Our assigned deputy is Deputy Constable Dick Matthias. His hours are scattered over 24 hour days, seven days a week on a random schedule. In addition, we have three deputies who spend time patrolling at different times of the day and week. These deputies do so of their own good will and are not included in our financial contract. The Constable Program is available to Sections 1&1A on a 24 hour basis. Those who join receive phone stickers with the central phone number and can call if there is any concern and a deputy will be dispatched and respond immediately.

There are many perks of having Deputy Constable Dick Matthias. He works to know everyone in the neighborhood. He knows which cars belong and which don't. He even knows your pet and if lost, returns your loved one home immediately. As a member of the Constable Program, you can have your alarm set to call the Constable phone number rather than HPD.



MINUTES OF THE GARDEN OAKS CIVIC CLUB MEETING

March 5, 1996

President Ed DeAlba presided.

Candidates for State Representative, District 138 spoke to the group and participated in a lively question and answer session about topics including concealed weapons, education, crime, neighborhood safety, property taxes, truancy and where does lotto money go. Candidates present were Democratic incumbent Ken Yarbrough, Garden Oaks resident Democrat David Jones and Candlelight resident Republican Dwayne Bohac.

Candidates for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, Position 1. Incumbent Dale Gorczynski and candidate Sergio Trevino also spoke at the meeting.

GO-COP: Bill and Ginny Chastain were recognized for their work on the GO-COP citizens patrol. For a retirement memento, he was presented a plaque inscribed "To Bill Chastain, Chief GO-COP Thanks for making our neighborhood a safer and better place to live. The people of Garden Oaks." Ginny Chastain was presented a \$100 Home Depot gift certificate.

Carl and Leslie Waters are taking over responsibility for heading up GO-COPs. They need both volunteer patrollers and someone to do base work during the daytime. Carl can be reached at 864-1992.

Topics for future meetings: Susan Garnat, a financial planner opening a business in Garden Oaks, will speak. on April 2. On May 6, Councilwoman Helen Huey will be the speaker.

National Night Out: Will be held on August 6 this year. Please let Carl Waters know about your neighborhood party plans so he can coordinate activities and report them in the newsletter.

Traffic Plan - Rob Walker reported that the Section 1A traffic plan has been submitted to the city. A copy of the plans, which includes a street closing on Randall and an exit only on 30th, is available from the civic club. There are still city review, public meetings and temporary device stages to go before the plan is in place.

The first speed humps have been installed on Alba between 42nd and 43rd and between 43rd and Azalea. More are planned for 41st, Sue Barnett and 34th streets. Alex Martinez cautioned against applying for speed humps prematurely, and possibly not qualifying with city standards thus being penalized for 3 years before allowing to reapply.

Sound abatement wall: The state has no plans for a wall within the next ten years. A bill was passed in the Texas legislature reducing funs for roads with single passenger cars - if a multiple occupant vehicle project is initiated, there will be more funding for sound walls.

Signs: A contest for sign designs was discussed. Ann Spiering made the motion and Warren Walden seconded the motion for a vote which passed. The subject was reopened for more discussion when lower than anticipated repair costs to existing signs was brought up. The contest issue is tabled for now while repairs are investigated further.

Meeting Notification Signs: Bill Chastain needs someone to take over placing the five signs (go up Sunday and come down Wednesday to announce meetings.

Constable - Warren Walden, Assistant Security Director and Denise Epstein, Security Director, are stepping down. Charlie and Angela Dickson will be the new Directors in charge of negotiating the constable contracts and Kim McMath will take over from Warren the membership and dues responsibilities. The program has roughly 50% participation this year and is currently financially sound. New enrollees will provide a start for next year.

Treasurers report: Ray Housely reported that the Garden Oaks Civic Club account has \$19,100 with an additional \$3,900 for the constable program.

GO 2000: The committee is working on visions for better schools in the neighborhood to solve the problem of families moving out of Garden Oaks for better schools. The district office at Waltrip H.S. wants parental participation to build a better feeder pattern of schools.

Parks: Graham Park rehabilitation work has started. Chain link fences around the tennis court, etc. have been removed. The city has not revealed all its plans for the park yet. Ed DeAlba will call the city again for more information about the plans.

Deed Restrictions: The trustees have reported several violations to the city. The city attorneys have not given a status report yet.

Beautification: Mark Neff has presented another challenge to the citizens of Garden Oaks.
