Nostalgia Question: Can anyone remember when mothers told their children not to play in the street? That must have been some old fashioned thinking. I now hear at meetings and read in the *Gazette* where mothers want and encourage their children to play in the street.

I also hear and read that 34th Street has traffic. Since 34th Street was a major thoroughfare connecting two other very major thoroughfares, I am not surprised. 34th Street is narrow without curbs or sidewalks so cars and people make a bad mix. The answer is very simple, widen 34th street, install curbs and install sidewalks. The cars can use the street, people and animals can use the sidewalk.

La La Land or Never Never Land west of Houston, where there is no traffic, no crime and the children and buffalo roam freely and unsupervised all day and night must certainly be a wonderful place.

Unknown to almost everyone in section one is a secret the traffic committee never bothered to reveal. The plan from its very inception was invalid and could not be accepted by the city. Although many people in very high places tried to help, city council, traffic and transportation, city legal department, alas, the poor thing just could not get off the ground.

I live on one of the coveted interior streets of section one which has no traffic where children do play in the street along with dogs, cats, skaters, walkers, joggers, baby carriages, and who knows what else. The reason I bought a house on an interior street was a no brainer. Common sense told me that a major thoroughfare like 34th street would have more traffic.

The Neighborhood Traffic Project (NTP) Ordinance does not allow NTP projects to be constructed on designated major thoroughfares. In November, 1994, the Garden Oaks Civic Club Traffic Committee requested pre-submittal materials for the

proposed traffic management plan for Garden Oaks Section One. This request was denied and a recommendation made that this application not be submitted to city council for approval until after the major thoroughfare plan had been officially changed to delete the subject reach of W. 34th Street. City Council approved the removal of W. 34th Street from the major thoroughfare plan in 1996.

MINUTES OF GARDEN OAKS CIVIC CLUB MEETING MAY 7, 1996

President Ed de Alba called the meeting to order at 7 p.m.

Ed thanked Craig Lee, Vice President, for presiding over the April meeting. He also mentioned the Mark Neff and Re/Max Metro beautification challenge. So far, \$170 of the needed \$500 in matching funds has been raised. The deadline is May 31. The minutes from the April meeting, as published in the *Gazette*, were adopted by the membership.

Treasurer's Report Ray Housely reported that the Constable program had \$838 at the end of the fiscal year, received \$5,350 and paid out \$3,208. This leaves a current balance of \$2,908. The G.O.C.C. balance is approximately \$23,000. This includes \$6,200 in memberships and program funds collected this year.

President's Report Ed de Alba mentioned the neighborhood service workshop meeting scheduled for May 18 at the Valley Oaks Elem. School.

He also spoke about the new recycling center opening at 5565 Kirkpatrick Blvd. It will take used motor oil, wood waste, etc. The Q-Lube stores are offering kits to recycle used oil filters.

Laura Morgan has volunteered to run the Garden Oaks home tour. Ed suggested that the garden club wants to have a garden tour at the same time. Volunteers will decide on a spring or fall tour schedule.

Angela Dickson has offered to coordinate the 4th of July celebration. Volunteers should contact her.

There will be no formal civic club meetings in July or August. The 4th of July and National Night Out events will be held instead. Anyone planning a party or other event for National Night Out should let Carl Waters know about it so Garden Oaks can be recognized for participation.

Vice President's Report

Craig Lee had nothing new to report.

Alex Martinez complimented Lynn Sievers for her job on the minutes and thanked everyone for contributing articles for the *Gazette*. He also reminded everyone of the deadline being the 10th of each month.

Educational Liaison Report Jane Ann Roberts spoke about the "Families Count" program. Garden Oaks Elementary School is one of three to get grant money for in-home counseling, immunizations, etc. The program, affiliated with the DePelchin Home, has sponsored Fun Days in the Park, an ice cream social and a Cinco de Mayo celebration so far, and along with the PTA, wants to be included in the 4th of July party. She also talked about the May HISD bond election, urging people to vote for the proposal. Next, she mentioned that the Market Day program, a fund raiser for the PTA of from \$200-\$600 per month, will no longer be offered in the Houston area. She finished by thanking the volunteers helping with the new Montessori classroom and thanked Helen Huey for her support of the neighborhood and the Montessori program.

Parks Report Ann Spiering reported that the Graham Park basic plans are now revised to the committee's satisfaction and that the improvements to the park should be completed by August. The playground equipment will be similar to that in the park at Yale and 12th Street. Details on fencing, drainage, number of benches, etc. are still being discussed. Ann thanked Helen Huey and Barbara in Helen's office for all their effort and persistence on behalf of this project. Finally, she mentioned that the American Legion park on Alba has been refurbished recently, with new parking, play equipment, ball diamond improvements and new trees.

Constable Report Warren Walden reported that Officer Dick Mathias will be out for three to four months following hip surgery. Yvonne Wilson will be patrolling 40 hours per week in his absence. Officer Mathias spoke to the group and said he was looking forward to coming back soon.

Sound Wall Larry Davenport will spearhead the sound wall project. Alex Martinez reported he received a reply on the form letter that was sent to the State about the wall. Concerned people need to get together and eventually get help from the city council,

etc. to effect a change in the state policy of no walls without major freeway improvement work.

There was no response for calls for new and old business.

May Speaker Councilwoman Helen Huey spoke to the membership. She recognized the efforts of Officer Mathias. Then, she said that HPD will maintain a patrol beat station at the North Shepherd substation after the new station opens on West Montgomery later this month. HPD has asked if we (Garden Oaks and Shepherd Park) would accept a "storefront" station in the area bounded by Ella, 43rd and Shepherd. She said that no relocation will happen that we don't know about. Ms. Huey mentioned that the city will have a balanced budget with no tax or fee increases this year. Houston is continuing to target specific neighborhood nuisance problems (dangerous buildings, drug use, prostitution, gambling, etc.) with the "FAST" unit, or Forfeiture Abatement Support Team. The Northwest area is leading the way in business relocation and showing steady sales tax and new housing/remodeling permits growth. Ed de Alba asked about the speed hump program. Ms. Huey said that the traffic and transportation departments are responsive if changes need to be made. The neighborhood traffic project is due to come out of city legal review in the next few weeks and if approved, a public meeting will be held. Further questions were asked about green spaces, halfway houses, etc. Lowered speed limits, recent graffiti incidents, curbside recycling, neighborhood zoning possibilities and litter were discussed.

Refreshments were provided by Terry Jeanes and Re/Max Metro Realtors.

The meeting was adjourned at 9 p.m. by President de Alba.
