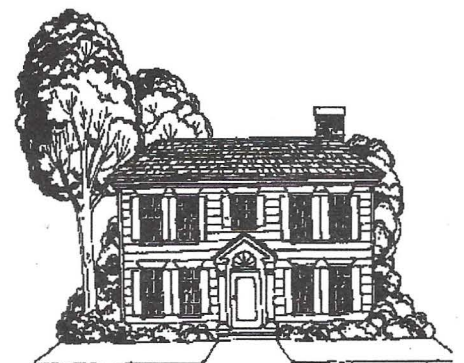

Constable Program Update

Funding and Fees Due

The constable program for Sections 1 and 1/A is not fully funded through our year-end of May 31, 1997. The program needs your help!

If you paid in two installments and have not yet sent in the second payment of \$100, please do so immediately. If you paid last year, please continue to support the program and send in the \$200 which was invoiced last May for the current 1996-97 year.

If you are a new resident in Section 1 or 1/A, consider joining. The fee for January 1, 1997 - May 31, 1997 is prorated at \$85.00

If you have lived here for a while and never joined before, consider joining now. You will help reduce the individual cost and receive additional benefits. You are already benefiting because the neighborhood is safer and property resale values are higher due to this program.

If 75% of our homes in Sections 1 and 1/A joined, our fee would be \$125 versus \$215 for the upcoming year. Our current participation is 50%. Help out by sharing the cost of this program.

Submit your payment using the Constable Program payment coupon in the *Gazette*. Make checks payable to the Garden Oaks Civic Club.

Civic Club Meeting Minutes

President Bennett Bartlett opened the meeting at 7:10 p.m. on January 7. A motion to accept the minutes of the December meeting as published in the *Gazette* was made and passed by acclamation. Lynne Sievers resigned as secretary as of February. Her replacement will be elected or appointed per the provisions in the bylaws.

Committee Reports

Beautification. The De Albas will spearhead the committee. The Art Park cleanup was successful. Extra bricks are now stored off-site. Residents on Azalea arranged to have the beds cleaned and trees trimmed. Six Garden Oaks Plaza and six Garden Oaks volunteers spread mulch. Important to spruce up the green spaces prior to the Home Tour in April. A volunteer meeting will be held February 12.

Budget. Budget needs to be published in the February *Gazette* for a March meeting vote. Deadline for 1997 requests is January 13.

GO COP. The Kelleys and Lee Newham were thanked for their hard work. Five crimes reported in November. One patroller, Wayne Armstrong, passed away after a short struggle with cancer. Volunteers are needed for afternoon base station work.

Home Tour. Letters sent to homeowners. Responses coming in.

Exxon. Board of Trustees rejected the application due to the deed restriction on alcohol sales. Angela Dickson commented on the makeup of the Exxon committee because only one member resided in Section 1.

Programs. Board of Trustees will be the program at the February meeting. Suggestions for 1997 were solicited. Possibilities include Constable's anticrime, drugs, etc. and a gardening speaker. Contact Terry Jeanes with more suggestions.

Constable. Angela Dickson said the HPD crime statistics aren't always accurate. Will get statistics on Sections 1 and 1A from Constable. Program is not fully funded through the year. Need more participation. In 1996 there were three burglaries, one theft, one trespassing, two assaults (one domestic), and one vandalized car. Most crimes in November and December.

Education. Jane Ann Roberts reported that Principal Daniels underwent kidney and pancreas transplant last week. Montessori Board positions available. President's slot is open, and some board terms have expired. Contact Trish Murphy at 688-4008. Valentine's night fund-raiser discussed. Tickets are \$30 each or \$50 per couple.

Graham Park. The park should be finished by February 1st. Contact Andrea Spiering to report anything in bad repair.

Recycling. Charlie Dickson reported that recycling will continue as is until further notice. Program is less profitable. The city might provide bins, and curbside pickup may happen. Paper bins are at GO Elementary, St. Rose, and Garden Oaks Baptist Church.

Sound Wall. Craig Lee volunteered to work on sound wall. A letter to state and federal representatives was discussed.

New Business

A motion was made and carried that the Garden Club, as a joint sponsor of the Home Tour, will receive 20% of the profits.

The issue of raising dues next year was discussed. Also discussed was how to increase the number of residents participating in community activities, how to get deed restrictions changed, and how to let people know where the money goes.

Meeting adjourned at 8:30 p.m. Refreshments provided by Terry Jeanes and ReMax Metro Realtors.

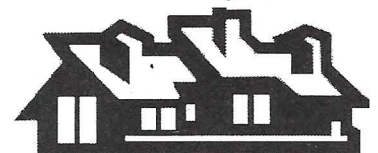


