This month I write to those of you who regularly attend civic club meetings, hoping that those of you who do not, will also lend an ear.

Our meetings are attended month after month by a small, reliable core of regulars. Obviously, I am glad that those of you who come regularly do so. On the other hand,

other hand, the work that gets done by our civic club is done predominately by those people who show up at our meet-

our meetings, so low attendance means fewer people amongst whom we can divide responsibilities. Low attendance is an endemic problem, I know, but worth addressing nonetheless.

The first time I attended a meeting, I sat in the back and listened to people I did not know talk to each other about projects that were, at best, only vaguely familiar to me, and everyone seemed to be on a friendly, first-name basis with each other. I felt like an outsider looking in on a neighborhood clique.

Now that I am president, I find myself doing the same things that made me feel left out as a newcomer. I am surrounded by friends and neighbors, most of whom I know now because they come regularly, and I enjoy the camaraderie of the meetings. That camaraderie is good and should not change. It makes the first Tuesday of each month a pleasure as opposed to a chore. The question to address, however, is how do we make new neighbors (or old

> neighbors who do not regularly attend civic club meetings) feel at home in our midst?

One good idea is to bring and introduce a neighbor (a tip of the hat to Jane Ann

Roberts for the idea). As president, I can recognize newcomers during a meeting. But it would be even better to have a new member briefly introduced by another member.

Other ideas are welcome and I hope to hear from you. If new neighbors have moved in, bring them to the next meeting and introduce them to us (or to me if you'd prefer I made the introduction). Or look for an unfamiliar face at the next meeting and introduce yourself. Let's make newcomers feel welcome. (Newcomers, BIG HINT: if you have been thinking about checking out the meetings, the April 1st meeting will be a good one to try).

### **Civic Club Meeting Minutes**

President Bennett Bartlett opened the meeting at 7:10 p.m. on March 4, 1997. Officers present: Bennett Bartlett, Craig Lee, Sheila Briones, and Andrea Spiering. Residents: 34. Copies of the meeting agenda, annual budget and March *Gazette* were available. A motion to accept the minutes of the February meeting as published in the *Gazette* was made and passed by acclamation. The position of *Gazette* Advertising Director is still vacant.

**Treasurer's Report.** We currently have \$23,431 in the Garden Oaks accounts.

**Vice-President's Report.** Of Garden Oaks residents, 17% have joined the Civic Club for a total of \$4,879 this year. The Welcoming Packet Project was discussed.

**Beautification.** Brenda de Alba discussed the City's Matching Grant Program. Beautification of the Garden Oaks Boulevard esplanade is under development for submission to the city. Repair of bricks in the Art Park is currently underway. Brenda brought up the possibility of bartering for help with the Garden Oaks greenspaces - free advertising for landscapers donating time and manpower, etc. This was approved by acclamation.

**GO-COP.** There were four incidents in January including two in Section 1. We are down to about 12 volunteers; help would be welcome. Two of the GO-COP signs are missing. If anyone knows of their whereabouts, please call.



## **Additional Speed Humps Announced**

These streets will have speed humps installed by the end of June: Lawrence Street (between 30th and 34th)

33rd Street (between Yale and Lawrence)

41st Street (between Shepherd and Sue Barnett)

41st Street (between Sue Barnett and Alba)

42nd Street (between Shepherd and Sue Barnett)

Sue Barnett (between 38th and 43rd)

Sue Barnett (between 43rd and Alba)

The purpose of speed humps is to slow the traffic in our neighborhood. Speed humps have been installed on portions of Alba, 34th, and 38th streets in Garden Oaks.

Any resident can initiate a request for speed humps to be installed on his or her street. The city evaluates requests for speed humps twice a year; the next deadline for the submission of requests is July 1, 1997.

### **City Completes Section 1A NTP Application**

In late 1995 the City of Houston reactivated the Neighborhood Traffic Project (NTP). NTP requires the preparation of detailed traffic plan proposals. During 1994, Garden Oaks was involved in a highly publicized process of traffic plan preparation including petitions.

The purpose of the NTP is to reduce or better manage the problem of cut-through traffic in residential neighborhoods by installing devices which physically change existing neighborhood streets. These devices are designed to alter the traffic circulation routes within the neighborhood without preventing public and emergency vehicle access to the neighborhood or causing traffic to be diverted through other residential streets. Examples of these devices include 911 emergency access only devices such as a street closure and entry/exit-only devices.

Following the reactivation of NTP, Garden Oaks Section 1A resident Rod Walker submitted the NTP application including petition documents for Section 1A to the city in February 1996. The NTP application for Section 1A calls for the closure of Randall Street at Durham and that an exit-only device be placed on 30th Street at Durham.

The city's legal department completed the review of the NTP application for Section 1A in the fall of 1996, and the city has indicated that the necessary traffic study of the area has recently been completed. The next steps involve a meeting with the Section 1A traffic committee headed up by Rod Walker to share the results of the traffic study. Then a public meeting will be scheduled.

The NTP application for Garden Oaks Section 1 has not been submitted to the city and remains on hold pending additional installations and experience with speed humps.

# Because we have faith that the last ten people will join for the 1996-97, we are planning for the 1997-98 program year which is June 1, 1997 through May 31, 1998.

All residents will be mailed an invoice in late April or early May. Last year block captains hand delivered invoices which saved mailing costs and allowed us to update the database of residents.

After serving as the Constable Security Director for a year, I recommend that more people are needed to run the program. Accordingly, a five member Steering Committee has been proposed to allow individual focus on the different aspects of the program:

*Membership Director* - works with the block captains to make sure all residents are aware of the program and are invited to join.

**Constable Security Director** - interfaces with the Constable Office, administers the contract, maintains interaction with the deputy.

Administrative Director - works with volunteers for invoice mailouts and distribution of information.

**Communications Coordinator** - writes Gazette articles and any special communications.

**Database Coordinator** - keeps up with list of residents, phone numbers, and payments. Receives checks from participants and passes them on to civic club treasurer for deposit.

If you are interested in serving on the Constable Program Steering Committee for the 1997-98 program year, let me know in early April. Working on this committee will be very rewarding and with the new division of responsibilities should not be overwhelming.

In January the Houston Police Department reported four crimes in our neighborhood: three burglaries and one burglary of a motor vehicle. The burglaries occurred on Jan. 4, 10:00 a.m. in the 900 block of West 42nd; Jan. 16, 8:00 a.m. in the 700 block of Sue Barnett; and Jan. 30, 9:30 a.m. in the 200 block of West 30th. The burglary of a motor vehicle also occurred in the 200 block of West 30th on Jan. 30, 9:00 p.m.

Our patrollers and base station operators logged 72.25 hours in January.

We are bringing back the Patroller of the Month Award. This month Bill and Mary Hines are being honored for the many hours of hard work beginning last summer. The pair have logged as many as 36 hours in a single month completing 139 hours of - patrolling in 1996.

Bill and Mary are long time residents of Garden Oaks. They rebuilt their house in the 700 block of Sue Barnett a few years ago. Bill retired after 35 years in the Federal Aviation Administration. After retiring Bill and Mary served as local election judges for the precinct located at the Garden Oaks Elementary School. Longtime patrollers V. ### **38th Street Sewer Project Meets Mandates**

What about all the mess on 38th Street? According to the city, this is part of the Greater Houston Wastewater Program (GHWP), otherwise known as the Central West 1 Relief Sewer Project, No. 4462-1.

The purpose of the project is to control wastewater overflows that occur during heavy rainfall by providing increased capacity during wet weather. The project is part of a major program that is improving Houston's wastewater collection system to meet state and federal mandates.

Other streets being affected are Crosstimbers, Castor, Neyland, E. 43rd, Cortlandt, E. 38th, and Wakefield.

Residents on 38th will be happy to know that under the terms of the city's agreement with the contractor, all driveways, ditches, and grassy areas will be restored to its previous condition,


