Nominating Committee Seeks Volunteers for GOCC Positions

The Nominating Committee, consisting of Ed de Alba, Terry Jeanes and Tom Stell, is seeking a few good volunteers to serve as 1998 officers for the Garden Oaks Civic Club. Terms begin January 1 and end on December 31, 1998. The slate of officers will be presented for membership approval at the November 4th Civic Club meeting, to be held at 7 p.m., Garden Oaks Baptist Church.

Anyone interested in running for a position must be a dues paying member of the Civic Club. Other duties and responsibilities for each position are as follows:

President - the principal executive officer, who supervises and controls all business & affairs of the Civic Club. Presides at monthly meetings of the members and Board of Directors. Signs, with the Secretary, any deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, correspondence, etc. Visible representative for any scheduled special events sponsored by the Civic Club. Fields phone calls from residents. Writes a monthly column for the Garden Oaks Gazette. Time spent/month fulfilling duties: 4 - 8 hours.

Vice President, Membership - in the absence of President will perform duties of the President. Responsible for the recruitment of new members and keeping records of new members. Monitors sign-in process at monthly meetings. Performs other duties as assigned by the President or Board of Directors. Time spent/month fulfilling duties: 4 - 6 hours.

Vice President, Gazette Editor - Responsible for the publication of the Gazette, membership monthly newsletter. Time spent per month fulfilling duties: 8 - 10 hours.

Treasurer - Responsible for all funds and securities. Receives and give receipts for monies due and payable. Deposits all monies. Gives monthly Treasurer's Report at Civic Club meetings. Time spent/month fulfilling duties: 4 - 6 hours.

Secretary - Keeps the minutes of the monthly meetings of the members (to be published in the Gazette) and of the Board of Directors in one or more books provided for that purpose. Gives all notices in accordance with the provisions of the bylaws. Custodian of the Civic Club records and the seal. Time spent per month fulfilling duties: 4 - 6 hours.

As you can seen, the time spent on each of these positions per month is very minimal. President's Message

Elections, Elections. Tuesday. November 4th is Election Day. GO VOTE! Then come to the civic club meeting and help us elect the new civic club officers. We will have a new mayor and a new District A representative. This will be an important year for our civic club to reassert its presence as a political force. Those interested in running for a slot on the civic club, are asked to contact the members of the Nominating Committee, Terry Jeanes, 680-8550; Ed de Alba, 694-5934; or Tom Stell, 850-1440. Our DRU Officers. The officers who represent the "beat" encompassing Garden Oaks have had various complications arise on the evenings when they were scheduled to speak to us. They are going to try again, so with any luck they will be at our November meeting. Eleemosynary Efforts. I am concerned with a trend taken by the civic club at the last meeting (admittedly because of my own efforts) and I want to look at it before we continue.

A year or two ago, parents from Garden Oaks decided that our local elementary school should have a science lab. In collaboration with the school, they set about to design, build, and then donate a science "Exploritorium" to Garden Oaks Elementary. In an effort to raise funds, they approached various groups and potential corporate sponsors, including our civic club. Our civic club voted to give \$1,000 to the project.

Last spring, the Home Tour committee found itself perilously low on volunteers only a week before the Home Tour. The committee contacted the Board of "Friends of Montessori" (FOM) - a nonprofit organization that raises funds to help support a stateapproved Montessori program at Garden Oaks Elementary - and offered 20% of the profits from the Home Tour to FOM if they could come up with volunteers. FOM came through. The donation required civic club approval. When it was moved that we donate the 20% to FOM to reward their

efforts, someone suggested that we give 10% to FOM and 10% to Garden Oaks Elementary. A motion to that effect passed, and while I applaud the spirit of egalitarianism, I found the idea of an unsolicited, unrestricted, charitable donation disquieting as a precedent for our civic club.

This past meeting, we followed that precedent. In response to a solicitation from St. Rose of Lima Elementary, we voted to donate an equivalent of 10% to that school. This vote troubles me. Let me first say that I know at least two children at that school. and I am particularly fond of them. I suspect that many other children from Garden Oaks also attend St. Rose. Nevertheless, it is a private, sectarian institution. The majority of the school's students probably are not from Garden Oaks: the majority of the students at Garden Oaks Elementary are. St. Rose does not have to take Garden Oaks area children, Garden Oaks Elementary does. If St. Rose needs additional funds, it can raise tuition. Garden Oaks is at the mercy of community-approved tax increases (or lack thereof) and the HISD bureaucracy. Others have questioned (to me at least) where this trends ends. There are Methodist and Baptist day care programs in Garden Oaks that take many of our children. They, too, are short of funds.

Our eleemosynary (fancy word for "charitable" I used just to get your attention) spirit is good. We voted to help a school in need, and I'm proud of our actions. I do suggest, however, that in the future we consider a set of guidelines, or at least a process for considering donations. See you November 4th.



Garden Oaks Civic Club Minutes

Bennett opened the meeting at 7:05 p.m. on Tuesday, October 7th. Officers in attendance: Bennett Bartlett, Craig Lee, Sheila Briones. Business section of meeting was shortened to allow candidates for District A seat to speak; no candidates are endorsed by this civic club.

Committee Reports

Board of GOCC. Bennett noted that the Board of Directors (officers) would hold a final meeting before the end of term. Ideas welcomed. Treasurer. No report given. It was noted that we have about \$135 towards the \$500 Jeanes' beautification challenge.

GO Caroling. Tom Stell announced that the group selected Tina Sabuco as coordinator. Soliciting volunteers. Caroling is done door-to-door in December seeking predominately baby goods; diapers, formula, wet wipes, etc., for charity nursery.

Home & Garden Tour 1998. Judi Morawski will head the 1998 Garden Oaks Home & Garden Tour Committee. Next meeting date is Wednesday, October 15th. Committee looking for volunteers.

Citizens on Patrol. Carl Waters announced that crime was down. Additionally, with help of the DRU, the people who were stealing mail in our neighborhood (and several others) were recently apprehended in a hotel room. They were a Nigerian group apparently looking for credit cards. Garden Club. Next meeting scheduled October 9th at Smith & Hawken. Beautification. Contract with the city is official, and we will be receiving \$4,999 for the Esplanade Project. The Beautification Committee won one of the Houston Proud Partners awards given by the Mayor's office for the Esplanade project. Given only one free ticket to the award's luncheon, but a representative from the mayor's office was in attendance and offered to provide a second free ticket so that both de Alba's, committee chairs, could attend. Pictures of the esplanade project will be prominently displayed at the awards luncheon.

New Business

Exxon. Bennett reported on the meeting between Exxon representatives (4), officers of the civic club (4), and two members of the board of trustees. Exxon stated that they WILL NOT sell alcoholic beverages, but WOULD NOT sign a letter to that effect. The belief (under the recommendation of lawyer members and friends) is that Exxon would not risk violating our deed restrictions. No fast food drive-thru window is planned. Exxon financially committed to joining both the civic club and the Section One Constable Program.

Old Business

Mayoral Candidates Forum. Terry Jeanes announced that the Forum, co-sponsored by GO Civic Club, will be held October 20 in the Garden Oaks Baptist Church. Editor of *The Leader* will be the moderator. Nominating Committee. Terry Jeanes, Ed de Alba and Tom Stell will serve on Nominating Committee. A slate of candidates will be presented at November civic club meeting.

St. Rose of Lima School. Bennett read excerpts from a letter from St. Rose requesting a donation toward their science program. A motion was passed to donate \$838 to St. Rose for scientific equipment, matching the recent gift to Garden Oaks Montessori Program. In return, the civic club expects help from St. Rose parents on the 1998 Home Tour. Meeting adjourned at 7:40 p.m. Refreshments provided by Terry Jeanes.



Tip Leads to Arrest of Mail Thieves

GO-COP would like to congratulate the HPD Differential Response Team (DRT). Their actions lead up to the arrest of three individuals who were stealing from mail trucks in the neighborhood and around the city. According to HPD North Division Commander Captain Jerry DeFoor, the information obtained by the DRT was so hot that HPD and postal inspectors were able to raid the gang's hotel room while they were still sorting through the trays of stolen mail. If you are missing any expected packages, renewed credit cards or other mail, contact the postal service as they are still trying find all the victims.

I continue to receive complaints from residents regarding speeders. A recent complaint came from a Section 4 resident who was pushing her two-week old child in her stroller in the area of Althea and W. 41st. A speeding red car almost ran them down as the car shot through the curve going westbound on Althea from W. 41st. The driver was identified as a young male with short hair,

possibly Hispanic, with several occupants in back of the car. If you know someone fitting this description please ask them to slow down in our neighborhood.

As it has around the city, crime in Garden Oaks is on the decline. For August there was only one crime reported to HPD, an auto theft occurring on August 26 at 9:00 p.m. in the 900 block of W. 41st. One resident in the 800 block of W. 42nd stopped a man from stealing three bicycles from her back yard. The potential thief was driving a brown and white pick-up truck. Once confronted, the man left.

In August, GO-COP patrollers and bases logged a total of 82.25 hours. This month the spotlight shines on a husband and wife team, Dennis and Cathy Spar. The Spars have been patrolling since 1992, and each have accumulated 153 hours of patrol time. The Spars recently took a sabbatical from the patrol program to remodel their home, and we can't wait until they are back on the streets patrolling. Thank you both for your outstanding efforts keeping Garden Oaks safe.


