Civic Club Business Membership Program Dian Austin, Committee Chair

To better involve our neighborhood business partners with the Garden Oaks community, the Garden Oaks Civic Club (GOCC) has developed a Business Membership Program, starting in 2021. Neighborhood businesses are invited to join. To date, nine neighborhood businesses have joined the program.

A GOCC Business Membership will give a business owner more access and exposure to the residents who live in the Garden Oaks community. A Business Membership is \$250 annually from January to December.

Benefits include:

- A monthly listing in the Garden Oaks Gazette newsletter.
- A visible listing on the gardenoaks.org website, with a link to the Business Member's website, if desired. Members will be listed in the order in which they join, not alphabetically, so it pays to be amongst the first! Listings will be visible for the full year of membership.
- Inclusion of the Business Member's marketing materials in the GOCC hard-copy **Welcome Packets** delivered to new residents quarterly.
- Frequent mention on **social media**, including our Garden Oaks Instagram account (@gardenoakshouston). If you have a community event or celebration you'd like to promote, we'd be happy to help.
- First-hand knowledge of upcoming neighborhood events and potential sponsorship opportunities (ex: volunteer workdays in the pocket parks, any neighborhood fundraisers, etc.) and first dibs on any involvement therein.

The GOCC funds the beautification and maintenance of all our area greenspaces, including tree trimming, planting, mowing, weeding, mulching, and keeping the irrigation systems running. The GOCC also pays for the publication of our monthly newsletter, maintains the Garden Oaks website, and serves as a contact point for city and community affairs. Business membership funds will help the Garden Oaks Civic Club continue its community support and involvement, while also raising the profile of the various Business Members.

Business Memberships will not have voting privileges, per our by-laws, but we will encourage and welcome Business Members to attend our monthly Civic Club meetings (when we resume meetings in person). Business Members will be recognized at each meeting.



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Garden Oaks Civic Club Meeting Minutes Adam Pryor, Secretary

November 17, 2020

Location: Zoom Online Meeting

Tonya Knauth, GOCC President, called the meeting to order at 7:01 pm. The meeting was held remotely via Zoom due to COVID precautions.

Business Meeting

Guest speaker Heather Cook from the City of Houston discussed Deed Restriction Enforcement. She referenced a few places to view deed restrictions: real property records maintained by the Harris County Clerk (201 Caroline St.), within documents received at closing on the sale of the property, or on the gardenoaks.org website. She also mentioned deed restrictions may only be enforced by certain entities: a property owner in the subdivision, your HOA or civic club, or the county attorney. Tonya noted that GOCC is specifically prevented from enforcing deed restrictions by its bylaws.

Heather mentioned that for the City to investigate a potential deed restriction violation, a complaint must be filed. Complaints can filed by calling the Deed Restriction Hotline at (832) 393-6333, emailing drcomplaints@houstontx.gov or visiting www.houstontx.gov. She walked through the enforcement process in a presentation that will be shared via GOCC social media platforms.

Guest speaker Joally Canales, the community outreach liaison for the Kinder Institute, spoke about the availability of a COVID survey at registry.rice.edu/covid19 to help measure the local social and economic impact for the Greater Houston area. The link to the survey will also be posted via GOCC social media.

Treasurer's Report

Jeff Martin reported less cash in the Constable account this year versus 2019 as a result of less donations this year compared to expenditures, while the general GOCC account is up \$4,000 over this point last year. GOCC has taken in an additional \$10,000 this year for beautification

while Civic Club revenues remain at a similar level to last year. If anyone would like copies of the current financials, email treasurer@gardenoaks.org.

Committee Reports

Constable Program: Terry Jeanes reported that the 2021 fundraising campaign has begun as of October. She mentioned that 2020 individual contributions were over \$80,000. She noted that there has been an increase in crime incidents with the reduction to only one deputy, mentioning two incidents occurring last week. She also noted two children recently being hit on bicycles in recent months and is working with the Constables to examine putting in stop signs at some of those high-risk locations.

She thanked Plonk! for the drive thru Sunday Biscuit event that helped raised funds for the Constable program. She noted the need for helpers on the fundraising front and said she can work with people based on any time available and interest levels. Please email constable@gardenoaks.org if interested.

Beautification: Pam Parks mentioned holding several volunteer work days in the pocket parks. She noted that

the funds raised will likely not be used within the year but underscored that the funds specifically donated to certain parks will be used for those parks in 2021.

Pam motioned to spend \$350 of general beautification funds on planting wildflowers at Art Park, Esplanade on 43rd & Apollo, and at the Randall Berm. Additionally, she motioned for spending \$350 of these funds on the repair and reinstallation of a neighborhood sign downed by flooding this year. Both motions carried and passed.

GardenOaks.org Website: Pam Parks reported no major updates at this time.

Citizen Patrol: Tonya Knauth reported (on behalf of Mark Saranie) that the Citizen Patrol is still ongoing and looking for volunteers. If anyone is interested in volunteering, submissions should be sent to gocop@gardenoaks.org.

Membership: Dian Austin reported the year ended with 261 Civic Club members and 245 Constable program contributors. She noted that there is now a streamlined one-page combo membership form to make the experience easier. Dian raffled a gift card to Greater Heights Brewing; congratulations to Terry Jeanes!



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Gazette: Joe Muscara reported that the deadline for all *Gazette* articles is Tuesday December 15th. Please email all submissions to gazette@gardenoaks.org.

Social Media: John Alvar asked members of the Civic Club to funnel neighborhood information or events to him via the Houston_GO Facebook group or @gardenoakshouston on Instagram. He also mentioned that a Facebook Messenger group will be set up to help better facilitate these requests.

Government Affairs / GO CIP: Tonya Knauth reported she attended virtual meetings on the Golf & Sue Barnett portions of the drainage project in September and October. The Golf project will go forward in Fall 2021, and the Sue Barnett project has not yet been scheduled. An additional new project has come up to resurface parts of Section 1; details are still forthcoming and can be found at gardenoaks.org.

Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet: Tonya Knauth (standing in for Dr. Pollock) reported that they are in the application process and deadlines are soon approaching. Old Business: None was raised.

New Business: Tonya motioned to amend the by-laws to allow GOCC to hold valid online virtual meetings when necessary. The motion was approved. Tonya will publish the amended by-laws.

Tonya also mentioned the Officer elections will be held at the December 1 meeting. Both Jeff Martin and Adam Pryor will be stepping down. The nomination committee has nominated Beth Jackson for the position of Secretary and Paul Vincent for the position of Treasurer.

The next GOCC meeting will be Tuesday, December 1st, 7 pm to elect new officers. The 2021 budget will not be approved at the December meeting, but rather at the January meeting.

Terry Jeanes reported that December 9 & 10 is planned for the Santa & Mrs. Claus event at the Gazebo, pending the COVID situation at the time. Updates will be posted on social media so stay tuned!

The meeting was adjourned at 8:32 pm.

Tonya mentioned an ongoing discussion with local politicians about amending the racial language in our current deed restrictions and potential legislation to update the process. She will provide updates as available. Terry Jeanes announced that the visit with Santa at Gazebo Park will not take place this year due to virus concerns. 

Happy 2021 everyone! I hope your holidays were filled with as much joy as possible, and that the 2020 roller coaster has glided to a calm halt for all.

This is a good time to reflect on the safety of our families, our homes, etc., and how we might change some of our habits in protecting what we value. Very preventable crimes, like car break ins, are the easiest to address. Before you exit your vehicle, simply put everything out of sight, even that charging cable most of us keep plugged into the lighter plug and left in plain view. The more temptations that are out of sight, the higher the probability your vehicle will be passed by, as long as the doors are locked.

The same is true with your home. The less revealing packaging left on the side of the street and not in the recycling bin, the chance of being broken into is minimized. By the way, if you have excess recyclables, take them to the city recycling place up on N. Main just north of Crosstimbers. Just arm yourself with a recent light bill to prove you live in the area. K-12 PHASES

- Phase 1 (Sept 19, 2020 Nov 6, 2020) All qualified applications submitted during Phase I will be entered in a lottery or will be eligible for auditions at secondary fine arts programs. Rankings can be changed up to Nov. 6th.
- Phase 2 (Nov 7, 2020 Feb 26, 2021) All qualified *in-district* applicants will be considered on a space-available and will be placed on the offered list after Phase II closes. (These applications are not part of the lottery)
- Phase 3 (Feb 27, 2021 Onward) All qualified applicants that are currently NOT in HISD or out of district will be considered on a space-available and first-come-first-served basis. Tuition is required for OOD students accepted at SUS and Specialty Schools.

PreKindergarten - all PK seats are by lottery ONLY. There is no zone for PK.

• Applications are open September 19, 2020 – April 30, 2021 - Qualified in-district, TEA Eligible applications and tuition-based applications received by the deadline will be entered into the lottery.

- Rankings can be changed up to April 30, 2021.
- Notification day for all applications is May 20, 2021. Applications received after this date will be offered only by space available and in order of submission.
- If you qualify for the non-tuition PK program, you must upload requested documentation into the program no later than May 5, 2021. (Note, this is after the deadline of submission!)
- Tuition-based applications will be considered after June 3, 2021.

<u>Considering your zoned school - Garden Oaks</u> <u>Montessori</u>

The school zone for Garden Oaks Montessori is K-5. If you are considering GOMM for your K-5th grade child, please submit the online application. Although your application will be in the lottery, <u>this will reserve your</u> <u>seat for the upcoming school year, regardless of how</u> <u>you rank your selections.</u>

Zoned families of K-5 students are encouraged to apply even past the Phase 1 deadline. Applications received prior to January 22, 2021 will be given priority. Notification date for K-12 applicants is January 28, 2021. If you have completed the online application you will receive an email with enrollment information, document requests and timeline for submission.

There is no zone for PK in HISD.

If your child will be either 3 or 4 by September 1, 2021, and you are considering GOMM, you must complete the online application. (Please choose "Magnet/Vanguard", not "PK enrollment" for our program).

All PK applicants, who submit the application prior to April 30, 2021 will be notified of application status via USPS mail, email, and viewable online May 20, 2021 (offered or wait-listed).

Why Does My Furnace Blow Cold Air? Mitch Weigand

The winter months can bring some pretty cold temperatures, so the last thing you want is cold air blowing from the A/C registers in your home. While some common causes can be solved easily, other problems require the help of your A/C technician.

Check the thermostat

Make sure that your thermostat is set on "AUTO," not "ON." If your thermostat is set to "ON," the furnace blower will run nonstop even when your furnace isn't heating the air. When you switch it to "AUTO," the fan will only blow air while the furnace is running.

Check the ductwork

Go up into the attic and check your air ducts, the large flexible tubing that carries the heated air from your furnace to the registers throughout the house. Accidental damage, fluctuating temperatures, and advanced age can cause significant tears to develop. If these are large enough, the cold air in the attic can be sucked into the ducts and blown throughout your home.

Check the pilot light

If your older gas furnace blows cold air, the pilot light may have gone out. If you feel comfortable with doing this, just follow the manufacturer's instructions and re-light it. If the pilot light won't stay lit, it may need some maintenance by your technician. Sometimes the flame sensor needs to be cleaned or a malfunctioning circuit board or faulty igniter needs to be replaced.

Check the furnace air filter


What if the furnace blows hot air, then cold air, but then stops blowing air altogether? It's possible that your furnace has overheated. Its safety device, called a limit switch, turned the furnace burners off. The blower keeps blowing to cool the furnace down to a safe level.

A dirty air filter can cause the furnace to overheat, as it blocks airflow and causes the furnace to run so long that it overheats. Change the air filter. Don't ignore this issue; repeated overheating can damage the furnace's heat exchanger, which is expensive to replace.

Usually it's only a matter of time

Just as it takes a few seconds for hot water to arrive when you turn on your faucet, it's completely normal to experience a few moments of cold air before you'll feel any warmth coming out of the registers. Just give it time to work.
