Beautification Pam Parks

Our pocket parks, like our yards, took a hit during the "Valentine's Day Chill". Most of our plantings did pretty well because of the long-standing practice of selecting plants for our climate and location. We also managed to protect six irrigation systems from serious damage. Short work days are getting booked for each of the parks to remove what won't recover. Watch for work day signs posted in the parks if you would like to volunteer with us. These work days will be for a few hours on Saturday mornings starting at 9:00.

In March/April, we will have our mowing service switch out mowing for other tasks. The idea is to keep up with trash removal for the parks that need it and to give us some flexibility to deal with some bigger chores. We plan a stump removal at the Rose Garden, removal of freeze damaged plant material at Gazebo Park, and clearing the drainage culverts on the school side of Sue Barnett where leaf litter has caused street flooding.

Park by Park Updates

Rose Garden – Trees got some much-needed pruning in late February. Ella Sailors, senior at the Energy Institute H.S., will be doing a class project to design, build, and install a Rain Garden. Her garden will be located at the small island located at the east end of the Rose Garden.

Friendship Garden – A work day was completed in March, and the park will soon have a completely reworked set of valves for its irrigation system.

Triangle Park – The area continues to recover from the rework of Alba, which over steepened the area along Alba. We are watching for erosion and anticipating the need for installing landscape blocks.

Gazebo Park – The park got most of its attention on the drawing board. The city's planned drainage project on Sue Barnett included a sidewalk on the park. The Civic Club is seeking a waiver for the sidewalk on the east side

of the street but also has made a proposal to substitute a permeable pavement on the park if the waiver is denied. One of our Gazebo Park Captains, Ahren Lacey, has recently moved north to Shepherd Park Plaza. Ahren did a great job for us but did manage to escape before finding us his replacement!

Art Park – The installation of wild flowers on the hillock is coming along quite nicely. Before the big chill a number of early bloomers had already made an appearance. Keep your eye out for new blossoms here.

Randall Berm and the Esplanade on W 43rd near Ella – They also have plantings of wildflowers. The Berm planting is several months further along than the one on W 43rd which had to be replanted in March.

Garden Oaks Blvd Esplanade – There is a new signal box at Shepherd. Now that the wrecked box has been replaced, we have been removing some old photinias and other volunteer shrubs from around the box in preparation for a mini mural. The students at GOMM will be participating in the mural design.

Entrance Signs at ten locations in the neighborhood are in various stages of disrepair. The Rose Garden entrance sign is currently in the worst shape and will be first up for attention. We are looking at changing up some of the trim detail to reduce the need for maintenance.

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GOMM Milestones and Celebrations Lindsey Pollock, Ed.D., Principal, Garden Oaks Montessori

During the past year, we have been inundated with difficulties. I thought we might all enjoy a look at the tremendous milestones we have achieved at Garden Oaks over the past 13 years! In the words of Dr. Montessori, "We shall walk together on this path of life, for all things are part of the universe and are connected with each other to form one whole unity." —*To Educate the Human Potential.* We have grown together and have accomplished so much since 2008 when I arrived at Garden Oaks that summer! Here are some celebrations for our school and community:

2008 - 2009: We had 405 students enrolled and were on the HISD list for possible closure. We were a traditional campus with a small Montessori program, a school within a school model.

2009 - 2010: We worked to market the school to our neighborhood and added the Environmental Science emphasis to bring our school faculty together. Our enrollment jumped to 500. We improved the campus security and installed the fence around the school playground/Spark Park. HISD announced that Garden Oaks would become an all - Montessori campus and we worked on the MSAP grant. We worked with the National Tennis Association to install the Quick Start Tennis Court.

2010 - 2011: The MSAP grant provided us \$3M to convert to an all - Montessori campus. Truckloads of furniture and materials arrived for our new classrooms, while our teachers and staff attended credentialing courses. Together, parents, students and staff set up class after class.

2010 - 2014: Slow transition to all Montessori. Each year we added more Montessori classes and discontinued traditional classes. During this time, we were twice recognized as a Magnet School of Distinction by the Magnet Schools of America.

2012: Bond Election – 2 years of planning sessions started for Garden Oaks, leading to the \$30M construction project to add 65,000 square feet and completely renovate all remaining existing spaces.

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2013: Recognized by the Human Rights Campaign with the Leadership Award for work implementing Welcoming Schools to embrace our LGBTQ families and students. Our work campus-wide became a national exemplar for Social Justice.

2014: Dr Pollock named an HISD Principal of the Year finalist.

2016 - 2019: Campus CONSTRUCTION!!! We moved every class to multiple locations during the course of the project while increasing enrollment on campus.

2017: We were the host school for the national Montessori for Social Justice conference. Waltrip HS provided the site. Members of the community and our PTO worked to welcome Montessorians from all over the country!

2018: Ms. Harlan was recognized as an HISD Teacher of the Year finalist.

2019: Pocket Prairie installation and Monarch Garden established on campus.

Fall 2020: We started the year with nearly 900 students. Today, we have 819 students enrolled and project that we will be fully enrolled again in the fall of 2021.

Fall 2020: We became the **FIRST Montessori ACCREDITED** public Montessori school in the State of TEXAS!!

2020: Honor Roll School of Distinction for closing achievement gaps in Science and Math.

We have many more celebrations ahead and look forward to the continued growth and successes of our program and our community! April 16th will be our PTO Un-Gala at the Wakefield Crowbar. Garden Oaks Civic Club Meeting Minutes

February 2, 2021 via Zoom

GOCC President Tonya Knauth called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm. The meeting was held remotely to adhere to ongoing pandemic protocols. Tonya noted that in place of a guest speaker this month, there would be a discussion around sidewalks in Garden Oaks.

The question at hand: Should the GOCC apply for a modification to the City of Houston's Capital Improvement Plan for drainage and pavement (phase 3) proposal for two sidewalks on Sue Barnett in support of limiting the sidewalk to only one side of Sue Barnett from W. 43rd south to W. 38th? A 2014 survey conducted by the GOCC to gauge support for sidewalks gave residents and property owners an opportunity to voice input to the City of Houston on the rebuilding of Alba and Golf specifically regarding sidewalks. The proposed plans can be viewed online at https:// www.gardenoaks.org/gocc-home/neighborhood-info/ streetwork/.

The January 2021 meeting minutes were approved.

Returning to the sidewalk issue, discussion ensued with speakers registered in the chat. Vic Seghers suggested filing a formal modification application with the City in favor of one sidewalk, not two, along Sue Barnett between 43rd and 38th. Eric Thibodeaux spoke out in favor of one sidewalk, preferably on the west side of Sue Barnett. Jeff Martin spoke out as a proponent of sidewalks, as did Chris Lindsay. Others noted that most of Garden Oaks does not have sidewalks and wondered if this would disrupt the overall look of the neighborhood.

Vic Seghers made a motion to file a formal application and pay the requisite fee up to \$1,500 to modify the proposed Gardens Oaks phase 3 drainage and paving project to include only a single sidewalk on the west side of Sue Barnett Drive. Terry Jeanes seconded the motion. After discussion, the motion passed. Continuing, Pam Parks noted that potential sidewalks on the east side of Sue Barnett would have an impact on the Gazebo Park, specifically the crepe myrtle trees lining the street. She suggested an alternative of a crushed gravel surface instead of paved concrete, running behind the crepe myrtle trees along Sue Barnett through the park. Discussion followed with a close examination of the existing plans. Tonya offered to contact the City for clarification on the current designs for Gazebo Park and report back at a subsequent GOCC meeting.

Treasurer's Report

Paul Vincent said GOCC is transferring bank accounts from Wells Fargo to Frost Bank on Shepherd, a business member of GOCC. Current financials will be published in the *Gazette*, and thus far in 2021 we are tracking well with the previous year's contributions. The constable collections and *Gazette* advertising are down a bit, but all other areas are trending to budget.

Committee Reports

Constable Program: Terry Jeanes said the Constable program has 239 paid supporters, up from 194 in January. She encouraged residents to pay their annual membership online, and she put out a call for volunteers to help manage the program.

Beautification: Pam Parks said we will be getting a minimural, funded by the City, at the signal box at GO Boulevard and N. Shepherd. The Alba entrance sign has been repaired and reinstalled. Tree work will continue at the Rose Garden and Friendship Garden in February.

GardenOaks.org: The 2021 neighborhood survey has 80 responses thus far. Pam Parks asked for feedback as it provides direction for activities of GOCC in the current year. The survey window closes on February 21st, and Pam hopes to report results at the March or April meeting.

GO Citizens Patrol: In Mark Saranie's absence, Tonya noted the need for patrol volunteers.

Membership: Dian Austin said we have 224 paid GOCC members, up from 166 in January 2021. Plus, 14 businesses have joined under the new business membership program. Tina Rowe and her team are delivering welcome packets this month. Information

included in the new neighbor welcome packets is also available online.

Julie Maddox was the lucky recipient of a \$25 Amazon gift card at the monthly raffle. Thanks to Jan and David Garver for donating this month's prize.

Social Media: Tonya delivered John Alvar's report. We are working to provide the survey link through the official Garden Oaks social media platforms. We are also partnering with the Oak Forest social media committee on issues and events applicable to both neighborhoods. Social media will also be used to help the community garden raise funds.

Government Affairs: Tonya said that we are enjoying a good relationship with the newly elected state representatives and city council members.

Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet: Dr. Pollock, Principal of GOMM, was not present, so no report was given.

Old Business: Chris Lindsay asked about a potential fundraiser to support the community garden. A group is trying to raise funds to make that a revenue neutral program of GOCC.

New Business: Terry Jeanes mentioned the recent graffiti on the vacant Sears building. Beth Jackson is trying to track down the current owners to encourage them to utilize historic tax credits and incentives in reusing the building. Terry and Beth will work together to identify and approach the owners.

The next GOCC meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, March 2nd at 7:00 pm via the Zoom application. Guest speaker will be a representative from Councilwoman Abbie Kamin's office.

The February 2021 virtual meeting of the GOCC was adjourned at 8:13 pm.

Garden Oaks Civic Club March Minutes

March 2, 2021 via Zoom

GOCC President Tonya Knauth called the meeting to order at 7:02 pm, joined by approximately 20 participants. Tonya acknowledged the recent winter storm that affected everyone in neighborhood and residual issues many are still facing.

The February meeting minutes could not be transmitted during the storm, so they will be published in the April *Gazette* and approved at the April GOCC meeting.

Tonya introduced Houston Police Officer Butterfras with the Department's Differential Response Team. This unit, which works to reduce crime and increase quality of life, addresses diverse problems such as unkept lots, residential improprieties, apartment complex ordinance violations, environmental lawlessness, and business licensing regulations. Officer Butterfras will be our contact for these issues in the Garden Oaks area, and we are grateful to have a face and a name at HPD to contact if needed.

The guest speaker was Julia Retta, from Council Member Abbie Kamin's office. Ms. Retta serves as Chief of Staff to the Council Member, whose District C includes Garden Oaks. Council Member Kamin was expecting the birth of a child and asked her staff to participate on her behalf, including Scheduler and Public Affairs Coordinator, Ashely Campbell.

Ms. Retta shared that the District C office has been focused on emergency response and disaster relief efforts over the past few weeks. There is still a lot of need for food, water, and supplies for families, seniors, businesses, and schools. If you know of anyone in need, please contact the Council Member's office.

CoH's Public Works Department has been working on a way to provide relief for residents with high water bills due to the freeze, and they will be announcing relief details on March 3. The Council Member suggests that residents with high water bills only pay the amount of your last month's bill regardless of what your water bill is for this month. You must pay your bill, but don't feel like you have to pay the full amount if it is higher than usual. She will share details of the relief plan via the District C newsletter and social media.

The City is suspending the regular schedule for heavy waste and storm debris pick up. Contact 3-1-1 regarding storm debris removal and place it out for pick up. Please review the placement guidelines: http://bit.ly/ COHstormdebris. FEMA relief is also available for our area to help, even if you have insurance. Finally on the storm and recovery front, there is a joint City of Houston-Harris County effort to provide relief for people in need and or those who would like to donate to help others.

Despite Governor Abbott's lifting of COVID-19 mask requirements, the City of Houston will continue to require masks and social distancing at all City buildings and events. There is a great effort underway to vaccinate all, but we are still not out of the woods. The City's COVID-19 vaccine waitlist is now open to all age groups that qualify under the state's criteria for 1A and 1B people 65 and older and people 16 and older with chronic health conditions. People who meet the criteria can register for the waitlist online at HoustonEmergency.org/covid19. Registration is also available by phone to people age 60 and older through the Area Agency on Aging at 832-393-4301. People with disabilities can call the Aging and Disability Resource Center at 832-393-5500. Anyone else needing registration assistance can contact the COVID-19 call center at 832-393-4220.

Because of federal government support, NRG Park is now vaccinating 6,000 people a day, 7 days a week for the next three weeks, then pivoting to second doses. Learn about new appointment opportunities through email, text message, voice call, or mobile app push notification by registering for the HoustonRecovers subscription of AlertHouston: https://houstonemergency.org/alerts/.

Ms. Retta noted that the Garden Oaks/Shepherd Park Capital Improvement Project for Golf Drive drainage and pavement is moving forward. There is no firm timeline on construction as the contract has not yet been awarded. A public engagement meeting with construction details will be scheduled once a contract has been awarded. The same public engagement meeting will also include a separate conversation about sidewalks in Garden Oaks per the City's new walkability requirements. And finally, the District C representative reported on the progress of safety measures at crossings near our neighborhood school, Frank Black Middle School. The addition of signage and signals are in the works at the Ella and Thornton as well as the Ella and Wakefield intersections.

Treasurer's Report

Paul Vincent said that both revenue and expenses are on track with our annual budget for the first 3 months of the year, and both are trending close to revenue and expenses from 2020. Specifically for the Constable fund, we are hopeful that the Wine Walk will once again be possible later in the year, and if so, we are on track to cover the expense for the one Constable with which we are currently contracted. All financial figures are available online at GardenOaks.org.

Committee Reports

Constable Program: Tonya gave the report for Chairperson Terry Jeanes, asking all residents to please pay the Constable program supporter dues of \$250 for the year. It has been reasonably quiet in neighborhood this past month. Ms. Jeanes is looking for members to add to her team. Some ideas being floated around are neighborhood spirit nights benefitting the constable program. As the Wine Walk has raised \$30,000 for the Constable program in past years, we are very hopeful that we can host that event in 2021.

Beautification: Pam Parks reported that a high school student and neighbor Ella Sailors has made a proposal to create a rain garden in the Rose Garden Section 1. The Sailors family are long term members of the Garden Oaks community, and they are committed to maintain the rain garden. We were mid-project on a complete rebuild of

Tree work in the Rose Garden and Friendship Park is complete. Pam and her committee will be reaching out to those who volunteered via the GO survey to schedule spring clean-up days. We are shifting our landscape crew to clean out the swale in front of GOMM's Spark Park.

GardenOaks.org: The annual GO survey window has closed and Pam Parks hopes to get results out in late March. The attorney for GOMO shared 125 legal documents, and several of the most germane have been added to the website under the Bankruptcy tab. There are also updates on the Capital Improvement Project scheduled for Sue Barnett on the website.

GO Citizens Patrol: Mark Saranie had no report this month. If anyone is interested in participating, please contact Mr. Saranie.

Membership: Tonya gave Dian Austin's report to include that GOCC membership currently stands at 246 paid members, with 259 paid Constable supporters. Our newest business member is Common Bond, located at 34th and Shepherd. Tonya acknowledged and thanked all of our business members, highlighting those in attendance. We have had a good response to that new program.

GO Gazette: Joe Muscara noted that the deadline for inclusion in the April *Gazette* is Monday, March 15th. Please send submissions to gazette@GardenOaks.org.

Social Media: John Alvar reported on lots of online activity and offers of help during the recent winter storm. He is working to make the official Houston Garden Oaks Facebook page to operate as the primary GO Facebook page (vs the other one). Mr. Alvar and his committee are also working with the Oak Forest Facebook page and social media sites to cross post and share pertinent information for our neighborhoods. He wants to highlight business memberships on our GO Instagram page in the coming months. Finally, he has a new recruit to help with Instagram posts and content at events and neighborhood activities.

Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School: Per Dr. Pollock, 814 students are enrolled currently, about 50%

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attending in person. No major damage was noted at school from the freeze. Comments about over enrollment are not correct. Middle school grades 7 and 8 are below capacity. GOMM is at max in all other grade levels. Enrollment was at 890 in August, but with some parents opted for homeschooling, other families moving out of the neighborhood, and some families electing private school enrollment instead, our current enrollment is down. We anticipate many of those families will be back in fall 2021 as restrictions lessen.

Old Business: Tonya reported from the City of Houston that the current plans for the Sue Barnett CIP project do include a 5' sidewalk through Gazebo Park. GOCC will be submitting a modification application to contest the plan for sidewalks on both sides of the street on Sue Barnett from 43rd Street to 38th Street. Pam Parks made a motion to include an alternative proposal in the modification application for a permeable surface through Gazebo Park to protect the established trees on the western edge of the park IF the City denies the request to eliminate the sidewalk on the east side of Sue Barnett. Chris Lindsay seconded the motion, and with no questions and little discussion, the motion passed unanimously. New Business: Tonya announced an informational webinar will be held on March 4 via Zoom regarding the proposed multi-family housing development at 909 Fisher Street, just beyond the GO neighborhood boundaries. This will be a public event featuring City and State officials and representatives from the developer SBP. Questions will be taken from participants. GOCC does not have a position on the matter at this stage. Our goal is to collect information and disseminate it to our neighbors.

The April 2021 general meeting of the Garden Oaks Civic Club is scheduled for Tuesday, April 6th, at 7pm via Zoom. Robert Glaze, volunteer for the community garden north of 43rd Street on Alba will be the featured guest speaker.

The meeting adjourned at 8:15 pm.



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
International Dark Sky Week 2021

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
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Mickey's Minute Mickey Morales

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Common Reasons Your A/C Could Quit Mitch Weigand

In a few months, summer will officially be here. This is the time of year that your A/C system works the hardest and has the greatest chance for failure.

The most common issues we see include:

1. Lack of proper routine maintenance. Keeping your A/C system well-maintained is absolutely critical if you want to avoid a breakdown. The first step is to have a spring check-up to inspect the entire system. A well-maintained A/C unit uses less energy to cool your house; lower energy usage can mean big savings on your monthly utility bill.


2. Not replacing your filter when it's dirty. Changing the air filter is the most important task a homeowner can perform. Make sure you replace the filter once a month. I cannot emphasize this enough.

3. Leaks that allow freon to escape. Freon (refrigerant) is the lifeblood of your A/C system. Operating properly, it does not lose freon. The only time you will need to have freon added is if there's a leak or your system was undercharged to begin with. Did you know if your system is short just one pound of freon (that's about 10% overall), your electrical bill can increase nearly \$50 per month?

4. The A/C system gets overworked. With 100 degree days and 90-plus percent humidity, there's no doubt your system will have to work extremely hard. It can lead to problems like tripped circuit breakers, blown capacitors, and more. Help ease your system's workload by raising the temperature in your home to 80 degrees while at work, keeping curtains closed to avoid sunlight heating up the indoor air, and having realistic expectations regarding your indoor temperature. Don't expect your home to be 65 degrees inside while it's 95 degrees outside.

5. The system is old and past its prime. Most home A/C systems in Houston last about 10 years, and summer puts tremendous strains on them. If your system is old, consider installing a brand-new system before it fails. This will prevent breakdowns at the most critical time of the year, and make your home more comfortable and very likely lower your monthly electric bill.
