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Is Your Car Road Trip Ready? *A Checklist for Peace of Mind*

With Memorial Day approaching, and summer just around the corner, a lot of us are looking forward to a well-deserved vacation. For many people this means a great American road trip!

Before hitting the open road, make sure your car is road trip ready with these tips:

- 1) Plan Your Route and Pit Stops** - Be sure your favorite spots have reopened so there are no surprises. Make sure you have current registration and insurance info in the glove box.
- 2) Perform Scheduled Maintenance** - Refer to your owner's manual to see your list of scheduled maintenance listed by age of car and/or mileage. Be sure you are up-to-date.
- 3) Top Off Fluids** - Check all fluid levels: oil, coolant, brake, and windshield-washer fluids. As applicable, also inspect the power-steering and transmission fluid levels. Be sure to get an oil change if you are due.
- 4) Check Tire Pressure & Tread for each Tire** - Be sure to check the spare too! Follow the recommended tire pressure, found on the front door jamb or in your owner's manual. Also check for signs of abnormal or uneven wear, cuts, or sidewall bulges.
- 5) Change the Air Filter and Cabin Filter** - Clean filters help the engine run better, and increase air quality. A dirty filter can increase your fuel cost by 10% and can add stress to other vehicle components.
- 6) Buy New Wiper Blades and Fill the Washer Fluid** - Windshield wipers typically last about 6 months. If they are a few months old consider replacing before a long trip.
- 7) Check Your Lights** - Be sure to check that your headlights, fog lights, taillights, brake lights, and turn signals are all working properly, and that the lenses are clean.
- 8) Check Your Battery** - Check terminals and cables for corrosion, and that the battery is securely attached to the vehicle.
- 9) Get a Road Trip Inspection** - One of the best ways to have peace of mind before a road trip is to bring your vehicle to a trusted automotive repair shop to have all systems inspected. Your technician can check the radiator, hoses, brakes, belts, suspension, A/C, and check engine light.

10) Have Fun, Drive Safe, and Enjoy Your Road Trip!

Considering your zoned school - Garden Oaks Montessori

Thank you to our Garden Oaks Families who completed the online application. You should have received an email with registration forms and document requests. Those who completed the application are offered the limited seats available. Those who wish to apply after January 29 are considered on a first come first served basis.

Please email Stephanie Acosta at SDUBROFF@houstonisd.org for more information regarding registration for Kindergarten through 5th grade.

PreKindergarten - all PK seats are by lottery ONLY. There is no zone for PK.

- PK applicants must be 3 or 4 by September 1 to apply for the PK program
- To select Garden Oaks Montessori, you must select Magnet in the application, not PK Enrollment.
- Applications are open September 19, 2020 – **April 30, 2021** - Qualified, in-district, TEA Eligible applications and tuition-based applications received by the deadline will be entered into the lottery.
- Rankings can be changed up to April 30, 2021. You must rank the most desired school as 1, descending in order.
- Notification day for all applications is **May 20, 2021**. Applications received after this date will be offered only by space available and in order of submission.
- If you qualify for the non-tuition PK program, you must upload qualifying documentation into the application no later than **May 5, 2021**. (Note, this is after the deadline of submission!)
- Tuition-based applications will be considered after **June 3, 2021**.

All PK applicants, who submit the application prior to April 30, 2021 will be notified of application status via email; lottery results are viewable online May 20, 2021 (offered or wait-listed).

As always, "Come soon, come often, and celebrate our new lease on life."



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
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How Plants and Animals Can Affect Your A/C System

While landscaping your yard this spring, consider doing it in such a way that the plants actually contribute to the cooling of your home. According to the Department of Energy, keeping the condenser (that's the A/C system's outside unit) in the shade can increase its efficiency by as much as 10 percent. Just be sure that the shrubs placed near the condenser do not obstruct air flow or impede access for repairs. Leave approximately three feet of clearance all around the equipment and at least five feet above it.

In turn, the condenser can benefit your landscaping. One of the tasks your A/C performs is to de-humidify the air from within your home. It collects and pumps the humidity outside as condensation. While not a lot, water from the drain line can provide moisture to keep the surrounding plants healthy.

Pet damage can happen

While we can train our pets to mind their manners indoors and relieve themselves outdoors, the condenser is especially vulnerable to damage done by pet urine. Urine contains chemicals that can eat away at metals, especially aluminum. Unfortunately, condenser fins and coils are made of aluminum, and in time, fins become encrusted with dust, and coils begin to leak.

A leak in the condenser coil means that your A/C is no longer a properly closed system. The freon will leak out, and the system can be emptied completely. When this happens, you run the

risk of burning out the condenser and having to replace it prematurely.

A clean condenser is a happy condenser

When your A/C runs, air is drawn into the condenser through its coil. Outdoor contaminants such as dust and plant matter (grass clippings, cottonwood seeds, small leaves, and mulch) can get caught in the coil. You can include pet hair and urine too. As debris accumulates, airflow through the coil is reduced that causes your system to run harder and harder. It is not uncommon for a condenser coil to be clogged completely in just one season of operation. As a homeowner, one thing you can do is take your garden hose and spray thoroughly about six inches from the condenser's fins to clear them of dust and leaves. This simple action will go a long way in keeping your condenser running efficiently.

Routine maintenance is so important. The higher temperatures generated by a filthy coil will cause premature failure of the capacitors, fan motor, and eventually the compressor within the condenser. A thorough cleaning of the condenser coil can prevent this. Not only will keeping the coil clean improve the efficiency and capacity of your entire system, it will also extend the life of your entire A/C system.

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Beautification

Work continues to fine tune the irrigation systems and to put in a few more plantings before the hot weather sets in. Most of the frost damage has been shuttled off to the dump. The longer days and warmer weather are hinting that it is getting to be too late for planting most things.

Our efforts to solve the street flooding in front of GOMM and the Spark Park remain largely untested. Two big loads of leaves have been collected from the swale and donated to the Community Garden. It will take a big rain to tell if shifting some leaves will cure this longstanding problem. GOCC clearing drainage swales is not a long-term solution but it may be the most expedient solution until the drainage project planned for Sue Barnett properly cures the problem.

Late April and May will be the time for weeding and mulching. Watch for Work Day signs and plan to come out and join us. This should be light work, clearing a few weeds and shifting a few yards of mulch.

And finally, my thoughts are turning to our volunteer pipeline for beautification. That pipeline really is not what it should be, and it has me thinking about how best to improve things. Pocket parks differ a good deal from a typical yard and many of our volunteers are a bit nervous to take one on. There is a pretty long list of best practices, and many "new ideas" are immediately met with the reasons not to do it. It is a hard sell to recruit a Park Captain. So what to do? I have some ideas, and plan to share them next month.

Park by Park Updates:

Rose Garden - The rain garden project has been delayed by personnel changes. Ella Sailors plans to carry through with the project later this year.

Friendship Garden has a new set of valves on its irrigation system. That sounds like a simple matter, but it involved considerable learning, trial and error, and not a few unkind words leveled at PVC and glue. Never mind the difficulty of gathering plumbing supplies in February and March! I will never take irrigation plumbing repairs for granted again.

Triangle Park and Gazebo Park were cleared quickly after the freeze and have seen minimal effort since. We had hoped to get in some plantings this spring but fear we have run out of time. Between now and the next "cool" window, the efforts will shift to improving the walkways, edging on beds, and slope stabilization.

Art Park - Come check out the wildflower plantings at Art Park. We have installed flagging and a few small signs to protect the planting from mowers and trampling. So far, so good. In April we added six more crepe myrtles along the north side of the park for a total of eight. All eight trees were donated by residents.

Randall Berm and the Esplanade on W 43rd near Ella also have plantings of wildflowers that are showing good color. A work day at the Berm cleared out a considerable amount of frost damage and started work on the thicket across W. 30th on the wedge property along Durham. Last year's plantings of duranta, plumbago, esperanza, fountain grass, lantana, and firecrackers took a real hit from the freeze. A few of the plants are showing new growth, and we are hopeful that most will come back. Plans are to turn on irrigation for these new plants in May.

Garden Oaks Blvd Esplanade - We have seen the first of several anticipated mini-mural designs from the Art students at GOMM.

Entrance Signs - Work on the entrance signs has taken a back seat to planting and getting the irrigation systems tuned up. In the meantime, some thought is being given to investing in a complete rework of our branding which might entail much more than paint and replacing a bit of wood rot.

Happy Mother’s Day to all. I hope your gatherings and celebrations are filled with happy memory-making moments. Moms rock!

Driving through my section recently, I saw a vehicle up on jacks and no tires. I wondered if this neighbor’s tires

were merely being changed out and not stolen. Usually what I see in these cases is the vehicle up on inexpensive cement blocks, not pricey equipment. In any event, please report crimes committed against your property or even if you see any suspicious activity. Better safe than sorry.

We are always in need of volunteers. If interested, send me an email at gocop@gardenoaks.org, and I will connect you to the officer who manages the Citizen Patrol program. To qualify, you must reside in Garden Oaks, be at least 18 years old, and pass a background check.

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Garden Oaks Civic Club Meeting Minutes

April 6, 2021 via Zoom

The April virtual GOCC meeting was called to order at 7:05 pm by President Tonya Knauth, with the evening's agenda posted on the screen.

A motion was made by John Bartos, seconded by Chris Lindsay, to accept the February and March minutes as written. The motion passed.

The guest speaker was Robert Glaze with the Garden Oaks Community Garden. Caroline Stender, a community garden volunteer, was also present on the call. The joint community garden was founded over 30 years ago with a focus on organic gardening. The one-half acre garden is located on Alba between the Shepherd Park Plaza and Garden Oaks neighborhoods.

The garden was one of the first Urban Harvest Gardens in Houston. It features raised beds for vegetables, herbs, and pollinator plants. Several compost bins are maintained on the site as well. The garden serves the community by donating produce to the St. Rose of Lima food bank. In the midst of the pandemic, we saw how close food insecurity is for many Houstonians, and it is even more important to be able to give back right now.

There is room for growth on the lot and in the existing beds. The garden can do more with more volunteers — the only limitation is labor. There is plenty of expertise in the existing volunteer pool, so it is a great place to visit with experts and learn. The core volunteers generally meet on Wednesday mornings from 8-9:30 am, but the garden can be open other times for those interested. Contact Caroline Stender, 713.818.5420, to volunteer.

GOCC contributes financially to the mowing and maintenance of the community garden lot, as well as paying the monthly water bills. GOCC will begin fundraising for the community garden as we have for all neighborhood parks in the hopes of making it a revenue neutral line item.

Treasurer's Report

Paul Vincent delivered the Treasurer's Report. The Constable account has about \$113,000 in funds, and the GOCC general account has about \$90,000. Funds are trending close to the previous year thus far. Constable support is up over 2020, and the Garden Oaks Gazette is showing a small profit. Expenses are tracking as expected. Per our 2021 budget projections we currently stand with a net income-to-date of about \$6,200. Full financial reports are available by contacting treasurer@gardenoaks.org.

Committee Reports

Constable Program: Terry Jeanes reported that we have 279 paid constable supporters to date, an addition of 20 new members over last month, and with a goal of 400 supporters. Updating neighborhood supporter signs and stickers is ongoing. Three of the four thermometer signs are up and will be updated this week. The red on the thermometers is rising from \$50K to \$75K this spring. One patrol deputy costs \$85,000 per year, so we are close to having raised that amount. With additional supporters, we could add a second deputy.

Beautification: Pam Parks shared that there will be many work days this month to remove frost damage from the February winter blast. Leaf litter has been removed from swales in front of GOMM and taken to the Garden Oaks Community Garden for their use. Irrigation work continues at Friendship Park, not related to the freeze.

GardenOaks.org: Pam Parks reported that the website requires almost no maintenance these days. She is looking for a new assistant webmaster with the departure of Joe Muscara from Garden Oaks. Please reach out to Pam to volunteer.

GO Citizens Patrol: Tonya delivered the report for Mark Saranie. If interested in participating in the neighborhood patrol, please contact Mark to volunteer.

Membership: Dian Austin noted that we currently have 261 paid GOCC members, up from 246 last month. Business memberships stand at 15 and growing under this new program launched in 2021. Welcome packets for new residents are delivered quarterly and will go out soon. The evening's raffle prize, a \$25 certificate to Eagle

Car Wash, went to Paul Vincent.

GO Gazette: Joe Muscara noted that the deadline for the May *Gazette* is Thursday, April 15th. Submissions go to gazette@GardenOaks.org. A block captain for the 700 block of Sue Barnett is needed.

Joe and Lori Kennedy will be moving from Garden Oaks soon, so we will be looking for a new *Gazette* editor, delivery coordinator, and block captain in their absence. Please contact Joe or Lori respectively if interested in volunteering. Tonya acknowledged Joe and Lori for their many contributions to the Garden Oaks neighborhood over the years. We'll miss you both!

Social Media: Chairperson John Alvar was absent, so Tonya delivered his report. Plans are to continue to nurture the official Garden Oaks Instagram footprint so that GO Instagram is considered an influencer. We will still have an active presence on Facebook as well. John has a new Facebook moderator to help check facts and point people to resources as available.

Government Affairs: Tonya recognized Hannah Cobb from Houston City Councilmember At-Large Sally Alcorn's office who joined this month's meeting. Councilmember Alcorn just opened an annual budget survey to allow residents to provide feedback on budget priorities. She hopes to encourage increased public engagement in the City's budgeting process. Councilmember Alcorn is also looking at noise ordinances, working with BARC on animal welfare issues, and of course, COVID-related items.

Tonya continued her report by noting that she, Pam Parks, and Vic Seghers completed a modification application for the proposed Sue Barnett infrastructure and drainage project in March. The City has not made a decision on the application yet. The application did include an alternative request as approved by GOCC that if the request for no sidewalk on the east side of Sue Barnett is denied, that the sidewalk through the Gazebo Park be a permeable surface to better protect the mature trees and landscape of the park.

GOCC also hosted a public forum on the proposed multi-

family housing development at 909 Fisher Street. The virtual forum featured eight panelists from the City, the Kinder Institute for Urban Studies, the State of Texas, the proposed developer, and others. An application has been submitted to the State of Texas, and a decision on the proposed development is pending.

Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School

Principal Lindsey Pollock is retiring from public school education after 13 years at GOMM. She said she will miss the Garden Oaks community — her friends and neighbors and supporters of GOMM over the years. Dr. Pollock will begin working for the nonprofit TEACH in the Houston area this summer.

Tonya expressed our deepest appreciation to Dr. Pollock for her commitment to GOMM and the Garden Oaks community. Thursday, April 8th will be the first of several opportunities for public input into Dr. Pollock's replacement for the new principal at GOMM.

Old Business

No old business was discussed.

New Business

No new business was brought forth.

The next Garden Oaks Civic Club meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, May 4th. There is currently no guest speaker lined up, so stay tuned for updates.

The tentative goal is to resume in-person GOCC meetings with appropriate safety measures in the fall of 2021 at local establishments. We want to focus on ideas for how we can come back together safely in person. Suggestions are welcomed.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:13 pm.
