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After the Bankruptcy, Where are we as a Community?

The answer is, we are in Garden Oaks, a great neighborhood whose governing authority is in transition. What does that mean exactly? Well, in the near term, it means that decisions need to be made and your help is needed.

More specifically, our neighborhood is currently governed by an archaic set of deed restrictions written in the 1930s. These restrictions include redacted inappropriate racial restrictions, obsolete regulations, inconsistent rules, and a lack of clear definitions to interpret what the intent was when Garden Oaks was formed. These restrictions were created during a much different time; neighborhood homes didn't have the same value as they do today. Garden Oaks was a rural area, and now as our neighborhood joins the ranks of some of the most highly sought-after neighborhoods in Houston, it should have contemporary and updated deed restrictions that match the current needs of the community. Our neighbors should have the right to live in their dream homes knowing that their deed restrictions reflect the values that this neighborhood holds sacred. Homesteads and investments should be held sacred. Beautiful new homes should be celebrated, encouraged, and protected, NOT subjected to lawsuits.

Garden Oaks deserves a homeowners' association (HOA) that supports what we want collectively. During the past few years, our neighborhood conducted multiple polls which showed that an overwhelming majority of our neighbors wanted an HOA. These same polls also revealed that the same majority did not necessarily support the Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization or "GOMO," as it was then known.

GOMO is in the process of exiting bankruptcy. Soon, control will be flipped back to our neighborhood, burdened with the same formation issues and outdated deed restrictions that existed the day GOMO entered into bankruptcy. We understand GOMO no longer accurately represents our

neighborhood. Garden Oaks deserves better; we all deserve better.

Right now, we still have more questions than answers. In the coming months, as the bankruptcy comes to a close, our neighborhood will need to hold an election for the HOA. The purpose of this election would establish a new HOA board of directors. This is crucial because it will help shape the future of Garden Oaks and develop an HOA that best fits our needs. The new board will be able to use the neighborhood's left-over resources as a vehicle to achieve what Garden Oaks wants: an HOA with a revised vision and a new set of deed restrictions that make sense in today's modern world. This process will neither be quick nor easy. It will require a lot of difficult work from a lot of motivated people. It will take neighbors coming together for the greater good of our community. Healing takes time, and creating something great takes time. Being open to change and being open minded about the way to achieve that change can only help to speed up the process.

Keeping Garden Oaks as one of the premier neighborhoods in Houston must be a priority. It must stay a place where people want to live, raise families, retire, or do whatever it is that brings them here.

We are looking forward to helping Garden Oaks meet its current and future needs. Until the next update, THANK YOU for your help, your patience, and understanding during this process. If you are interested in helping reshape the HOA and getting modern deed restrictions in place, please email help@gardenoaks.org. Please be on the lookout for additional information soliciting candidates for the election soon.

Editor's Note: Garden Oaks Civic Club (GOCC) is a voluntary civic club; it is not an HOA, and it does not enforce deed restrictions. GOCC is a separate entity from Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization (GOMO).


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Montessori Moments

I am a child clinical psychologist and researcher, so I am trained to be skeptical and to seek scientific evidence before I advocate for a particular approach. When choosing a place to live, I did not drink the "Kool-Aid" regarding Montessori education (I had not really researched it), but we loved the neighborhood and moved to Garden Oaks for the older homes, mature trees, and larger lots. Shortly after moving to the neighborhood, I met my neighbor, who asked me if I was enrolling my preschoolers in GOMM. My kids had been in a sweet little daycare with a splash pad and 1000 playgrounds, so the thought of moving them to a big public school where they would have to attend after school was out of my comfort zone. Nevertheless, my neighbor extolled the virtues of Montessori education, particularly at younger ages. I remained skeptical.

In graduate school I had learned that studies examining the Montessori method were plagued with design flaws, and the purported benefits of Montessori education were perhaps too good to be true. More rigorous studies were needed to confirm these early findings. My own research veered more into health psychology, so I did not keep up with the Montessori literature after grad school. I, nevertheless, took a leap of faith and decided to enroll both of my children at GOMM. I mean it couldn't hurt, right?



And the results?

I am so thankful my kids are at GOMM! My personal experience with sending my kids to GOMM has suggested to me that there may be something to these studies demonstrating the amazing results of Montessori education on children's learning and development.

What's more?

The good news is that in the years since I left grad school, more research has been published on the effects of Montessori education. As my contribution to the Montessori moments, I hope to review some of the new studies that have been published regarding the effectiveness of Montessori education with children and even other applications such as working with patients with dementia. (I had no idea either.)

I plan to begin this journey with you with an open mind, not to confirm a preconceived notion, but so that we can explore and learn together about the potential benefits, areas for growth, and applications of Montessori education. Choosing Schools

Visit the Office of School Choice website at https://www.houstonisd.org/schoolchoice for information on the campus levels you are interested in.

All HISD magnet schools are represented at each fair. This is a great way to explore schools when deciding which would be a good fit for your child and which you would like to tour.

Kindergarten-12 Grade APPLICATION PHASES:

- Phase 1 (September 17, 2021 November 12, 2021) All qualified applications submitted during Phase I will be entered either in a lottery or will be eligible for auditions at secondary fine arts programs. **Rankings, as well as deleting or adding schools, can be changed until November 11, 2021. Notification of Lottery Status is January 27, 2022.
 - Phase 2 (November 13, 2021 March 10, 2022)

All qualified in-district applicants will be considered on a space-available and will be placed on the offered list after Phase II closes. These applications are not considered in the lottery. The applications will be re-ordered by time/date stamp and added to the end of the Phase 1 waitlist if space is available. If you apply in Phase 1, you do not need to reapply for Phase 2.

Phase 3 (March 11, 2022 - Onward)

All qualified applicants that are currently NOT in HISD or out of district will be considered on a space-available and first-come-first-served basis. If you apply in Phase 1 or 2, you do not need to reapply for Phase 3.

<u>PreKindergarten - all PK seats are by lottery ONLY.</u>

- Applications for PK are open September 13, 2021 –
 March 10, 2022 In-district, TEA Eligible applications
 and tuition-based applications received will be
 entered into the lottery. Applications received after
 this date will be offered in order of submission, only
 if space is available.
- Rankings can be changed, schools deleted or added, until March 10, 2022
- Notification day for all PK applications is March 31, 2022.

 Tuition-based applications will be considered after April 15, 2022, and after all "eligible" applications have been offered seats, and if space is available.

Zoned Kinder-5th grade families_

If you are considering Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet (GOMM) for your K-5th grade child, please submit the online application at https://hisdchoice.com
Completing the application reserves your seat. Zoned applications will not be considered in our campus lottery. Once the notifications for the lottery are sent, you will receive an email from our campus with important steps to complete registration. Zoned families must confirm they are living withing the school zone by providing 3 of the following proofs of address: current utility bill (water, gas or electric), HCAD statement stating "Homestead Exemption" or current lease. Due to limited space, any applications after February 10, 2022, may be put on a grade level waitlist in order of submission.

Students who are 5 years old on or by September 1 are eligible for Kindergarten.

Non-Zoned families

Please apply at https://hisdchoice.com **Grades 3-8 must have Montessori experience to be considered in our lottery.

ALL PK Families:

PK families must complete the online application. (Please choose "Magnet/Vanguard", not "PK enrollment" for our program). There is no zone for PK in HISD. You must apply to any PK program in the district prior to the deadline to be included in the lottery.

Students who are 3 or 4 by September 1, 2022, are eligible for PK.

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Recycling Reminder

Recycling right is just as important as recycling more. Contamination harms the program by making it hard to recover clean recyclables at the sorting center.

Most importantly, **DO NOT BAG YOUR RECYCLABLES!**Bagged recyclables are the number one contaminant and cause of tangling the recycling equipment. Keep your recyclables loose and free. Do NOT put recycling in trash bags or garbage bags into your green recycling bin!

And....shredded paper doesn't belong in the recycling bin either; it clogs the machines. Put shredded paper into the black garbage bin, not recycling.

How to Beat the Final Days of Heat and Humidity – Part 2

Your A/C system is still having to deal with the high temperature and humidity. Problems not fixed now can require costly repairs later. Last month, we discussed restricted air flow and low freon. Here's the rest of the story:

Frozen coils

Frozen evaporator coils are a common A/C problem even in the heat. One way your A/C system cools your home is by dehumidifying the indoor air. The moisture pulled from the air creates condensation on the evaporator coils. When your A/C works correctly, this condensation drips away. When there's an underlying problem, that condensation can build an ice layer on the evaporator coils.

Several common problems can lead to frozen coils: clogged air filters, low freon levels, leaks in the ducting system, blocked A/C registers or vents, and dirty evaporator coils. Now is an ideal time to have your entire A/C system inspected and get any problems corrected.

Blown capacitors

One of the most common problems arising in late summer is a blown capacitor. A capacitor is an electronic device that stores an electrical charge. In A/C systems, they are used to turn fan motors and compressors the correct direction. Pretty much any motor that uses electricity to function has a capacitor or two built into it.

After a brutal summer, capacitors become weak and struggle to keep the motor and compressor supplied with sufficient electricity. Worst case, they fail completely, and your A/C system stops functioning. Also, because capacitors involve electricity, they are susceptible to power surges which can occur with summer thunderstorms. Some are built with a pressure sensitive interrupter, which allows them to fail before internal pressure causes serious damage to your A/C system.

A blown capacitor is an easy fix for your A/C service technician. However, please do not attempt to replace a capacitor or any interior A/C components yourself. Leave that to a trained professional.
