# President's Message

Tonya Knauth, Civic Club President

**Let's talk sidewalks again.** In Fall 2020, City Council passed a Walkable Places ordinance, with new regulations for sidewalks city-wide. In order to obtain a building permit for many types of projects, including a new home, an applicant must submit a sidewalk plan that conforms to City sidewalk specifications. Modifications or exceptions are only granted for limited reasons, after a formal modification application is filed along with the nonrefundable fee of \$1,144.00. While walkability is generally a positive direction for any neighborhood, Garden Oaks residents will have challenges complying with the ordinance. I wrote about this in the February 2021 Gazette, and will recap here. https:// www.gardenoaks.org/wp-content/uploads/2021/01/2021-02-Gazette-colorweb.pdf

I don't think anyone, including me, is against sidewalks generally; we are certainly a group of neighbors who like to walk and hope to do so safely. The issue is that Garden Oaks streets were designed and built without sidewalks, and compliance with the ordinance means that sidewalks will have to be privately built in front of one lot at a time, with no overall plan for all the streets in the neighborhood. In 2021 GOCC appealed to our City Council Member Abbie Kamin's office for a universal solution to this issue; Kamin's office recently responded that there will be no universal waivers. And so, we must discuss next steps as a neighborhood.

Ordinance

Residents and builders who have sought building permits for remodels and new homes have been advised to submit their sidewalk plan, and that an exception will not be granted simply because there are no sidewalks in front of other houses in the neighborhood. In the past, GOMO and/or GOCC has written an informal letter that the City planning department accepted and granted an exception; that will no longer apply. The following is an excerpt from my letter to Kamin's office, explaining why Garden Oaks needs a universal waiver:

**Open Ditch Drainage System.** The drainage system has proven effective through many storms to this day. The current multi-million dollar City Garden Oaks North-South drainage projects were designed and built to work with the existing ditch and swale drainage system of our East-West streets.

Not only are there no existing sidewalks in Garden Oaks, but with our current streets they will not work from an engineering perspective. The easements between the street and the ditches vary in width, and most slope downward at an angle that will not support a sidewalk between the street and the ditch. For drainage reasons, the grading cannot be

changed and the ditches cannot be covered, especially not in one-lot increments along a street. Apparently this issue was considered and recognized in the Office of City Engineer in the "Practice for Sidewalk Requirements" document dated March 17, 2014.

**Safety.** There is a real safety issue that would be created by elevation changes and patches of "sidewalks to nowhere" along our residential streets. Families walk and run in the easements, currently all the same elevation and covered with grass or gravel - it would be clearly unsafe to have periodic sidewalks along the way.

**Aesthetics and Property Value.** Although drainage and safety are most important, I cannot leave out that Garden Oaks is a historic neighborhood with a special aesthetic that includes large front lawns with ditches and swales. Tall old-growth trees give shade to homes with beautiful landscaping many property owners lovingly tend. In addition, many residents have planted new trees in the easement between the ditch and the street; trees given to them through City grants that encouraged tree planting in the easements. Periodic, interrupted sidewalks would negatively affect the beauty of our neighborhood and property values.

I have asked Council Member Kamin's office to set up an onsite meeting in Garden Oaks with representatives from the City Planning and Permitting Department; it is tentatively scheduled for the last week of January. My hope is that once onsite in our neighborhood, they will understand the challenges that builders and homeowners will face if forced to comply with the ordinance, and the overall challenges for our neighborhood of sidewalks one lot at a time. I will, of course, report back on any progress made at that meeting.

One option GOCC has begun to explore is designation as a Heritage District. We will talk about the issue at hand – the impact of the sidewalk ordinance, whether we as a neighborhood want the Civic Club to continue to advocate for waivers, and the appropriate way to do that. I look forward to a productive discussion.

# Greenspaces in Garden Oaks City Parks, Spark Park, Pocket Parks and a Community Garden

# What are all these spaces and whose job is it to take care of them?

This is the question posed by one of our property owners in response to the GOCC 2022 Survey. I recognized the owner and knew they have been with us several years and had been active in community activities. If a longtime resident asked this question, it seemed there might be a broader audience for the information. The simple answer is.... Well, it just isn't simple.

Garden Oaks is unusual in at least three ways where our greenspaces are involved.

- We have a lot of greenspaces.
- No neighborhood group or organization owns any of them.
- Volunteers and donors play key roles in maintenance of parts of them.

Ownership is spread across at least three City Departments, HISD and the State.

- State of Texas "The Durham Wedge" (N. Loop & Durham), .3 acre. Maintenance of this parcel is done by City of Houston (CoH) Public Works when they remember the arrangement.
- City of Houston (Parks Department) is responsible for:
   Graham Park (W. 34<sup>th</sup> & Lawrence) .5 acre
   Art Park (Sue Barnett & W. 43<sup>rd</sup>,) .8 acre
   American Legion Park (Golf & Judiway, adjacent to GO, not in GO per se), 5+ acres
- HISD maintains the Spark Park at Garden Oaks Montessori (Sue Barnett & W. 41<sup>St</sup>), 2.7 acres
- City of Houston (Parks Department) The following spaces, defined as "esplanades" by the City, were adopted by GOCC in the 90s and early 2000s. Adoption involved GOCC installing irrigation systems, landscaping.

and agreeing to maintain the areas in return for the City providing free water. Electrical service, available only at Gazebo Park, is paid by GOCC. We refer to these 5 as "pocket parks".

Rose Garden (Lawrence & W. 34<sup>th</sup>)
Friendship Garden (Lawrence & W. 30)
Garden Oaks Blvd. Esplanade
Gazebo Park (Sue Barnett & Lamonte/W.
42nd)

Triangle Park (Alba & Azalea)

• City of Houston (Public Works – Berm

(W. 30<sup>th</sup> & Durham & Randall) This "pocket park" differs from the other 5 because it does not qualify as an esplanade. This means that GOCC was permitted to install an irrigation system and landscape the area, but it would not be eligible for free water. It also means that CoH administers it through a different group. Water is paid by GOCC.

City of Houston (Health Department) –
 Community Garden (4412 Alba Rd), .6 acres

Our Civic Club's Beautification efforts are concentrated on the CoH Right of Way (ROW) areas within GO that we call pocket parks. The plan has been to leave maintenance of the large parks to HISD and CoH, and focus the GOCC efforts on the pocket parks and a few areas of high impact not well covered.

The list of GOCC Beautification efforts outside of these pocket parks amounts to less than 20% of the maintenance spend in most years. These include:

- Graham Park Tennis courts and tree planting projects
- Art Park tree pruning, overgrowth clearance, wildflower planting & bed maintenance
- Spark Park Buildout and more recently assistance with managing flooding in front of the school.
   Neighborhood volunteers operating on their own have provided considerable additional support to the Spark Park in the form of mowing and clearing the ditches.
- Wedge (TX DOT ROW along Durham) mowing and trash pick-up
- Community Garden twice monthly mowing of the ROW and twice annual overgrowth clearance in addition to paying for water used on the garden.

Pocket Park Maintenance is the focus of the GOCC Beautification efforts. Twice monthly mowing, trash pickup, weeding, mulching, replanting, irrigation system repairs, and tree pruning for the 6 parks runs in the range of \$10-15K most years. The independent Garden Club provides additional financial support and a cadre of volunteers who do non-mowing support for Friendship Garden. The Garden Club support predates WWII.



This map does not include the undeveloped Harris County Storm Water Easements which lie unused along the north and west sides of Garden Oaks.

## Beautification

2021 ended with an expanding list of things to do along with a new long list of volunteers interested in helping.

The cool months give us time to spend in our parks clearing beds, mulching, cutting back and removing plants that have become overgrown. The Community Garden, Gazebo Park, Art Park, Triangle Park and the Berm have all gotten a bit of attention with more to come February through April. Watch for the red and white "Workday Saturday" signs. All are welcome to come lend a hand.

The Berm located on the west side of Randall/W. 30th & Durham saw one of the year's largest workday turnouts, led by its new Captain, Sean Jez. Over a dozen neighbors showed up in December to replant shrubs lost in last year's Valentine's Day freeze. The shrubs were selected for their drought tolerance, pollinator friendliness, and suitability for creating a visual and sound barrier for nearby homes from the traffic along Durham. Species selected were cape honeysuckle, esperanza, duranta, and hamilia.

In addition to the shrubs, four new trees were planted along the sidewalk. These four trees replace trees lost to car collisions over the past 20 years. The plan is to replace lost trees along this busy street with low-cost, fast-growing species like maple and sweet gum. Next up for the Berm will be the completion of edging and mulching around the crest of the Berm where we plan to continue with wildflower plantings while our screening shrubbery gets established.

The other good news at year end was that 17 residents/property owners expressed an interest in donating to and/or volunteering for Beautification projects. Among the list were some of "the usual suspects", but a majority were new names. We will be in touch!

# Valentine's Day Greetings

In addition to the United States, Valentine's Day is celebrated in Canada, Mexico, the United Kingdom, France

and Australia. In Great Britain, Valentine's Day began to be popularly celebrated around the 17th century. By the middle of the 18th, it was common for friends and lovers of all social classes to exchange small tokens of affection or handwritten notes, and by 1900 printed cards began to replace written letters due to improvements in printing technology. Readymade cards were an easy way for people to express their emotions in a time when direct expression of one's feelings was discouraged. Cheaper postage rates also contributed to an increase in the popularity of sending Valentine's Day greetings.

Americans probably began exchanging hand-made valentines in the early 1700s. In the 1840s, Esther A.

Howland began selling the first massproduced valentines in America. Howland, known as the "Mother of the Valentine," made elaborate creations with real lace, ribbons and colorful pictures known as "scrap." Today, according to the Greeting Card Association, an estimated 1 billion Valentine's Day cards are sent each year, making Valentine's Day the second largest card-sending holiday of the year. (An estimated 2.6 billion cards are sent for Christmas.) Women purchase approximately 85 percent of all valentines.

# Garden Oaks Civic Club Meeting Minutes

January 4, 2022 via Zoom online application.

President Tonya Knauth called the meeting to order at 7:05pm. Tonight's meeting was originally scheduled to be in person but was changed to online format given the surging Omicron virus. Stay tuned to the Gazette, website, and FB for details on subsequent meetings.

Tonight's presentation shared early information and responses to the recent neighborhood survey so that GOCC leadership can work on key items and be responsive.

The 114 responses (8% of GO households) were fewer than received last year; 64% of respondents were paid civic club members. The same priorities from previous years ranked highest in the 2022 survey: security, beautification and communication. There is strong support for these priorities going forward. Comments ranged from those who would like to see more GOCC outreach to deed restriction challenges and changes.

GOCC will begin communicating directly with members on issues and need-to-know items via routine direct email. There was also an interest in social activities and opportunities to meet neighbors. Please make sure your email address is on file with GOCC. Register at gardenoaks.org.

The survey asked respondents if and what role GOCC should play in the absence of an active homeowners' association (HOA). Activities, including updating deed restrictions, specifically removing the racial language in the deed restrictions, plan review, and assistance in forming a new HOA were ranked by respondents. Full survey results will be posted soon on the website.

#### **Treasurer's Report**

Treasurer Paul Vincent gave an end of year financial report. GOCC has about \$87,000 in a general operating account and approximately \$88,000 in the Constable contract account. GOCC keeps the two accounts separate. Annual revenue comes into the Constable account and is paid directly to the contract for security and patrol.

For the general account, the Treasurer reported annual income of \$34,000 during 2021, which fell short of projections by \$3,000. Expenses for the year fell below budgeted amounts, however. The account has a sizable surplus due to judicious spending and several successful fundraising years in the past.

GOCC leadership budgeted to spend additional money from these reserves in 2022 to engage neighbors and encourage involvement in GOCC this year and in the future.

**Beautification:** Pam Parks reported that the wildflower seeds have been planted in the Art Park on 43rd @ Sue Barnett. The committee has a surplus of sweet gum and loblolly pine trees left over from the tree giveaway in November. The December 2021 workday on the Randall berm included the installation of several large, native shrubs to provide sound and visual barriers for residents in Section 1-A.

#### **Old Business**

There is currently no waiver of the requirement that all new construction and significant remodeling in Garden Oaks must include sidewalks in the City of Houston. According to City Council member Abbie Kamin, there will be no general waiver to the new city ordinance requiring sidewalks for new construction and remodels. This is causing plenty of confusion for neighbors and new construction. GOCC will continue to monitor and share information as it is available.

#### **New Business**

Mike Stephens, who chaired the successful Wakefield Shuffle fundraiser with his wife Emily, suggested the creation of a Social Committee to undertake additional events and activities to promote neighborhood cohesion. Tonya agreed to create a GOCC Social Committee as an ad hoc committee for now as afforded under the organization's bylaws.

The February meeting will feature a presentation and discussion of the new City of Houston Heritage District designation with City Preservation Officer, Roman McAllen on Tuesday, February 1st at 7:00 pm.

With no further business raised, the January GOCC meeting was adjourned at 8:10 pm.





# Recycling Reminder

Recycling right is just as important as recycling more. Contamination harms the program by making it hard to recover clean recyclables at the sorting center.

#### Most importantly, DO NOT BAG YOUR

**RECYCLABLES!** Bagged recyclables are the number one contaminant and cause of tangling the recycling equipment. Keep your recyclables loose and free. Do NOT put recycling in trash bags or garbage bags into your green recycling bin!

# You can safely put these into your green recycling bin, loose:

- Metals and Cans: Aluminum and tin cans, such as soup cans, coffee cans, vegetable cans
- Cartons: Emptied and rinsed milk cartons, juice cartons, soup cartons
- Glass: Emptied and rinsed bottles, jugs, and jars

- Paper: Newspaper, magazines, catalogs, junk mail. NO shredded paper!
- Cardboard: Cardboard and cereal boxes, flattened and emptied of packing materials
- Plastic: Bottles, tubs and jugs, #1 5 and #7.
   Examples include water and soda bottles, milk jugs, margarine tubs, detergent bottles (emptied and rinsed).

# Strategies For Saving Energy in 2022

Here are some simple strategies to help you save energy and make sure your home's heating system is running efficiently.

#### Take advantage of the sun's warmth

Open the curtains on the south and west-facing windows during the day to allow sunlight to naturally heat your home. Close them at night to reduce the chill.

#### Keep dust to a minimum

Dust, pet hair, and other air-borne particles eventually collect on the air filter. A simple and cost-effective means of dusting is to dampen an old towel and run it over your furniture. Any particles will be trapped on the towel, and you can throw it in the washer.

#### Replace your air filter every month

This is one of the most overlooked home maintenance tasks.. Make it easy on yourself by having them always on hand.

#### Reduce heat loss from your fireplace

Keep your fireplace damper closed unless a fire is burning. Install tempered glass doors and a heat-air exchange system that blows warmed air back into the room.

An open damper is like having an open window in the winter. Since hot air rises, this allows expensive, heated air to escape up the chimney. But do this only when you are <u>not</u> burning a fire. If you never use your fireplace, consider sealing the chimney flue.

#### Lower the temperature on your thermostat

When cooking your evening meal, your oven will help keep the house warm. Your ceiling fan will pull warm air upward and distribute it throughout the room. When you leave the house or go to bed, turn your thermostat down five degrees. You will save on heating bills. A programmable thermostat can do this automatically for you.
