Back in December of 2020, GOCC was notified by the City of Houston that our request for a mini-mural for the intersection at Garden Oaks Boulevard and N. Shepherd was approved. We invited the art students at Garden Oaks Montessori to help come up with a theme for the project. The civic club started the steps to get the damaged signal box repaired and the surrounding area cleared of some dense understory growth.

Ms. Tian Ding's art class at GOMM developed the designs, and in late August 2021, a favorite was selected. Caroline Truong from UP Art Studio took the design concept and extended it to include the full face of a child and a word message that mirrored the vibrant color palate in the original design.

The project was completed in late March of 2022, and we now have a colorful message at one of the gateways to Garden Oaks.

Recycling Reminder

Recycling right is just as important as recycling more. Contamination harms the program by making it hard to recover clean recyclables at the sorting center.

Most importantly, **DO NOT BAG YOUR RECYCLABLES!** Bagged recyclables are the number one contaminant and cause of tangling the recycling equipment. Keep your recyclables loose and free. Do NOT put recycling in trash bags or garbage bags into your green recycling bin!

You can safely put these into your green recycling bin, loose:

- Metals and Cans: Aluminum and tin cans, such as soup cans, coffee cans, vegetable cans
- Cartons: Emptied and rinsed milk cartons, juice cartons, soup cartons
- Glass: Emptied and rinsed bottles, jugs, and jars
- Paper: Newspaper, magazines, catalogs, junk mail. NO shredded paper!
- Cardboard: Cardboard and cereal boxes, flattened and emptied of packing materials
- Plastic: Bottles, tubs and jugs, #1 5 and #7. Examples include water and soda bottles, milk jugs, margarine tubs, detergent bottles (emptied and rinsed).



Reuse Warehouse Excerpted from the City of Houston's Reuse Warehouse site

Remodeling? Want to know what to do with all those windows, doors, cabinets, etc. that you are replacing? Take them to the nearby City Reuse Warehouse.

To help reduce waste, the City of Houston Solid Waste Management Department has developed a Reuse Warehouse. The Building Materials Reuse Warehouse benefits the community by providing space for excess building materials that would otherwise be dumped in local landfills. Construction material accounts for 38% of the waste stream in the Houston area.

The Warehouse accepts material from individuals, supply companies, and builders, and makes it freely available for reuse by any non-profit organization. The Reuse Warehouse is funded in part by a grant from the Houston Galveston Area Council.

While at this time the Reuse Warehouse is only able to pass on building materials to non-profit organizations, many of these local organizations make materials available to individuals. The Reuse Warehouse is located very close to Garden Oaks, at 9003 N. Main, just north of Crosstimbers.

The Warehouse accepts cabinets, doors, electrical fixtures and equipment fans, flooring materials, glass, gutters, lighting, lumber, metal, mirrors, pipe, plumbing, plywood, roofing materials, screens, sheetrock, sinks, showers, trim, tubs, wall coverings, and windows. They do NOT accept paint, appliances, used carpet, fluorescent lights, etc.

Committee Reports



Membership: Dian Austin reported that there are currently 215 paid Civic Club members, up from 205 last month. There are also 261 paid constable program members currently. Under the Business Membership program, we have 12 business members. The evenings' raffle prizes were won by 4 different attendees: large milkweed plants, provided by the Garden Club.

GO Gazette: Editor Christi Hartley reminded us that the deadline for the May Gazette is April 15th. Please send in your articles, advertisements, and comments by the deadline.

Social Media: John Alvar was not present. John is focused on our Instagram account, @GardenOaksHouston.

Tonya announced the creation of a new **Social Committee** for GOCC, to be chaired by Emily Stephens. New social events and ways to connect with the neighborhood are in our future. Look for more information in June 2022.

Government Affairs/CIP: Tonya passed around a sign-up sheet for questions and concerns about the sidewalk issue, including the possibility of a heritage district designation for Garden Oaks. Those attending were asked to sign up to speak and ask questions and to discuss the issues at hand at the open forum.

The Golf Dr. construction project is proceeding as planned. Kevin David, GOCC VP, reported that there have been concerns about people driving the wrong way on one-way streets within the construction footprint. Signage is being disrupted which makes directions difficult to decipher.

The timeline projects 4-6 weeks per block moving north on Golf from Wakefield to 43rd St; the projected completion date is September 2022. The City of Houston hopes to have the Wakefield construction completed by June 2022.

Old Business

Discussion topics: the City of Houston sidewalk ordinance and possible heritage district designation. Tonya called for a discussion limited to 3 minutes per person for those signed up to speak. There was to be no motion or resolution on the issue at the April meeting.

Shane Davis voiced his concern that the whole neighborhood be included in the decision to apply for heritage district or not. Tonya responded that GOCC will maintain an open dialogue and that members will be included in any decision.

Reagan Cracknell asked if a heritage district would protect trees and green spaces in our neighborhood? The answer is yes on public property and in the rights of way.

Cathy Warren noted that the sole sidewalk on 42nd street is a trip hazard for pedestrians and contributes to the mud retention near the street. She referenced a 2013 article on best management practices for low-impact development which she contributed to the Garden Oaks Gazette. Tonya suggested we publish an updated version of Cathy's article in a future edition.

Another resident voiced her concerns that her section is made up of primarily new homes that have been built before the sidewalk ordinance was in place. If the few original houses left are razed, then the new homes being built would be required to have sidewalks, yet those sidewalks wouldn't connect anywhere, being sidewalks to nowhere. She was also concerned about traffic around GOMM and on nearby streets, specifically the 800 block of W. 41st.

Tonya said that she, Beth Jackson, Pam Parks and James Elmore met with a City of Houston planning department representative to review the City's sidewalk ordinance implications in Garden Oaks. For our neighborhood, the required sidewalks for new construction would not contribute to the City's objective of increasing walkability, as most of the sidewalks would not be connected to anything. While the City's Planning group considers potential revisions to the sidewalk ordinance, builders should submit a Modification Application that will exempt them for now while changes to the ordinance are being considered. Top 10 A/C Mistakes to Avoid - Part One

10. Going with the cheapest contractor

As with most things, you get what you pay for. Whether choosing an A/C contractor for a simple repair or a full installation, it is tempting to go with the cheapest price. This can be a huge mistake because the lowest priced contractor will invariably use the lowest quality equipment and poorly trained staff. Choose a highly reputable company, especially one recommended by friends or family. It will be much better in the long run because your high quality A/C system will be properly installed and maintained by experienced, reliable technicians.

9. Trying to hide your outdoor unit

Your outside unit, the condenser, isn't the most attractive lawn ornament you have. However, it really needs its own space to function properly. Some homeowners try to obscure the condenser by planting trees, shrubbery and flowers around it, blocking the airflow which makes it more difficult for the A/C system to cool your home. Leave approximately three feet of clearance all around and at least five feet above it.

8. Blocking or closing your air vents

Some homeowners think that by closing vents in unused rooms in their homes, they can save energy by not cooling those areas.

This is not an effective energy-saving strategy, and it can actually lead to problems in comfort, efficiency and performance.

7. Having appliances near the thermostat

If you place lamps or other heat-producing appliances near your thermostat, it can cause your thermostat to sense your home is warmer than it actually is. This keeps your A/C unit running longer than it needs to which can waste energy.

6. Cranking down the thermostat

The lower you set your thermostat, the faster your home will cool down, right? Not really. Your home cools down at the same rate no matter where your thermostat is set. Besides, the lower you set the thermostat, the harder the A/C system will have to work. Ease the load on both your air conditioner and wallet by setting the thermostat to the highest temperature at which you are comfortable. Also, use other devices such as ceiling fans and programmable thermostats to help keep you cool.
