Whose Grass is it Anyway?

Most of us in Garden Oaks have a drainage swale out front near the street. And most of us use that area for off-street parking. Most of us also think about that area as being part of our yards.

Driving through the neighborhood, I have seen several homes where residents have put rocks or sometimes bigger boulders on the grassy area out by the street in front of their homes in order to keep people from parking there. Other property owners use cones or sticks for the same reason. Most of the time this is due to construction in the area, and numerous sub-contractors constantly parking up and down the street. Homeowners are concerned about the parking in their yards, which can often cause big ruts, and sometimes there's trash that spills out as well.

The question came up at a recent Civic Club meeting about who owns this grassy area anyway? I did some research and talked to several people at the City and here's what I found:

- 1. The City of Houston owns that area between the front swale and the street. It is the City's Right of Way (ROW). Most of us think that we own that area, but we don't
- 2. Putting rocks, sticks, cones, etc. in the City ROW to keep people from parking on it is called an encroachment. The Office of the City Engineer (OCE) can at any time remove unpermitted items from the City's ROW.
- 3. Anything you put in the City's ROW is done at your own peril. You could be at fault if someone happens to run into those rocks or boulders and is injured. You don't own the area to encroach on it.

Having dealt with an eternal new construction project near my home, I get it. I know it can be disturbing to constantly find trucks parked in front of your house day in and day out. But maybe the thing to do is to remove the encroachments once the projects are finished, so we can all go back to being neighborly and having our off street parking areas unencumbered.

The Civic Club intends to send these emails only monthly, so your inbox won't be overflowing. We do not sell or publish these email lists.




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

The June GOCC meeting was held at Great Heights Brewing Company at 7:00 pm. President Tonya Knauth called the meeting to order at 7:15 pm. She thanked the personnel from GHBC for allowing the meeting to be held in their "Barrel Room".

Treasurer's report

Treasurer Paul Vincent was not in attendance but sent financial reports and the Treasurer's Report via Knauth. She reports that all is well financially. GOCC is on target with budget and ahead of 2021 with the profit and loss statements. Current Civic Club finances are available for neighbors to review by contacting treasurer@gardenoaks.org

Committee Reports

Constable Program: Chairperson Terry Jeanes announced that she has new constable helpers- Craig and M'lissa Dilley. She said that the thermometer signs should be ready and back up soon.

The question was asked about how many constables are supported by the Civic Club. Jeanes said that there is support for one shift right now, but if funds could be raised we could contract for more shifts. The current constable fundraisers are the Wine Walk in the fall and The Wakefield Shuffle in the spring. She also stated that neighbors should use the vacation watch portion of the Constable Program. Citizen Patrol: Knauth announced that Mark Saranie has resigned as chair of the program. The citizen's group is very small, so there was discussion about letting the program go. Knauth is looking into any negative effects of suspending the program.

Membership: Chairperson Dian Austin was not in attendance. Knauth announced that there are 235 paid members and 282 Constable Supporters. There are 12 business members. Member Brenda d'Alba conducted the monthly raffle. Cathy Wahren won a Garden Oaks Cookbook.

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How to Prevent a Clogged A/C Drain Line

Your central A/C system has an outside drain line that drips water near the A/C's outside unit. As your A/C dehumidifies the indoor air, the resulting condensation (water) drains from the inside air handler/evaporator coil to the outside via the drain line. If this line gets clogged, it can cause serious water damage and potential mold.

How to prevent a clog from occurring

In the attic, there's a drip pan beneath your air handler/ evaporator coil which collects possible condensate overflow. Connected to the drip pan is a pipe which needs to be clean and free of algae, so water flows easily.

To keep this line clean, pour about one-quarter cup of bleach into the pipe once a month. You can use vinegar and water instead.

How do I know if there is a problem?

If the drip pan in the attic is filled with water, you know you have a problem. Because of soaring attic temperatures during our summers, we don't normally hang out in attics. This prevents seeing the problem.

Usually, the secondary drain line can be seen at your home's eave above a bedroom window or above the sink in a bathroom. When this line begins to drip, it means that the primary drain line is clogged. Get this handled quickly by calling a licensed technician.

Also, the secondary line may be improperly installed or capped off or you just might not notice it dripping. In any case, when that dripping stops is when the problems really begin. This allows the drain pan to fill up and eventually overflow, causing water stains on the ceiling and costly repairs.

A yearly check-up is the best prevention

I recommend having a check-up on your system at least once a year. The expense is minimal compared to the cost of repair once a problem has occurred.
