Real friends who know each other well.

The buffet dinner was catered by Mickey Morales, and desserts were provided by Angela Winston’s Liberation Gluten Free Bakery.



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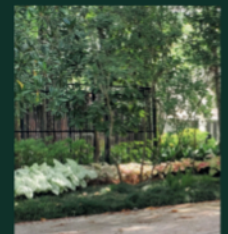

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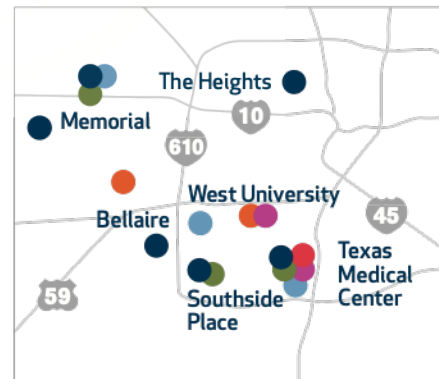
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Mickey's Minute

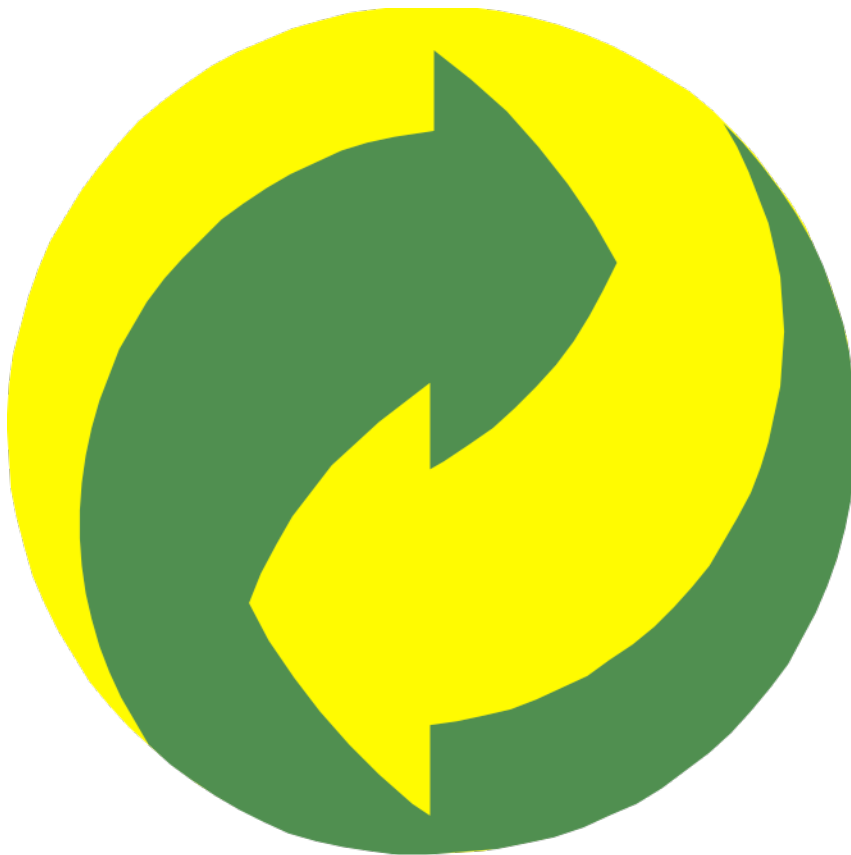
Recycling Reminder

Recycling right is just as important as recycling more. Contamination harms the program by making it hard to recover clean recyclables at the sorting center.

Most importantly, **DO NOT BAG YOUR RECYCLABLES!** Bagged recyclables are the number one contaminant and cause of tangling the recycling equipment. Keep your recyclables loose and free. Do NOT put recycling in trash bags or garbage bags into your green recycling bin!

You can safely put these into your green recycling bin, loose:

- Metals and Cans: Aluminum and tin cans, such as soup cans, coffee cans, vegetable cans
- Cartons: Emptied and rinsed milk cartons, juice cartons, soup cartons
- Glass: Emptied and rinsed bottles, jugs, and jars
- Paper: Newspaper, magazines, catalogs, junk mail. NO shredded paper!
- Cardboard: Cardboard and cereal boxes, flattened and emptied of packing materials
- Plastic: Bottles, tubs and jugs, #1 – 5 and #7. Examples include water and soda bottles, milk jugs, margarine tubs, detergent bottles (emptied and rinsed).

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Garden Line - Year-round

January

1. This is a good time to test your lawn and garden soil for its pH level. Soil samples can be sent to Texas A&M for analysis. Go to <http://soiltesting.tamu.edu> for details.
2. Compost piles should be turned at least once during the month. Leaves are abundant and should be shredded before being added to the pile. Add animal manure or clippings from winter rye for a source of nitrogen. The pile should be at least 3 cubic feet in volume to hold in the heat generated by decomposition. Check the pile for moisture level. It should be neither too wet nor too dry. Add water if it is dry; add more coarse, dry matter if it is too wet.
3. Start seeds indoors now for planting in late winter and early spring: broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, collards, kale, lettuce, parsley, petunias and begonias. Tomato, pepper and eggplant seed should be started in January for transplanting in late February to early March. Use a commercial peat-light soil mix in a clean flat. Place in a warm, bright spot. Cover the tray with a clear piece of glass or plastic or saran wrap until the seeds have sprouted. Then, place in very bright light to keep the seedlings from stretching.
4. January and February are the months to prune fruit trees. Annual pruning keeps the harvest within reach and thins crowded branches, allowing more light to penetrate developing fruit, and stimulates new growth for next year's crop. Peaches, plums and apricots need this annual pruning.
5. The dormant season of winter is also the time to do any needed pruning of shade trees to clean out dead wood, remove lower limbs and crowded branches to allow more light to reach the ground, and remove hazardous branches which threaten property.

Why Does My Furnace Blow Cold Air?

The winter months can bring some pretty cold temperatures. So the last thing you want is cold air blowing from the A/C registers in your home. While some issues can be solved easily, other problems require the help of your A/C technician.

Check the thermostat. Make sure that your thermostat is set on "AUTO," not "ON." If your thermostat is set to "ON," the furnace blower will run nonstop even when your furnace isn't heating the air. When you switch it to "AUTO," the fan will only blow air while the furnace is running.

Check the ductwork. Check your air ducts in the attic. Air ducts are the large flexible tubing that move the heated air from the furnace to the registers. Wear and tear from accidental damage, fluctuating temperatures and advanced age can cause significant tears to develop. If these are large enough, the frigid air within the attic can be sucked into the ducts and blown throughout your home.

Check the pilot light. If your older gas furnace blows cold air, the pilot light may have gone out. If you feel comfortable with doing this, just follow the manufacturer's instructions and re-light it. If the pilot light won't stay lit, it may need some routine maintenance by

your A/C technician. Also, sometimes the flame sensor needs to be cleaned or a malfunctioning circuit board or faulty igniter needs to be replaced.

Check the furnace air filter. What if the furnace blows hot air, then cold air but then stops blowing air altogether? It's possible that your furnace has overheated. Its safety device, called a limit switch, turned the furnace burners off. The blower keeps blowing to cool the furnace down to a safe level.

So what causes the furnace to overheat? Most likely it's a dirty furnace air filter. A dirty filter blocks airflow and causes the furnace to run so long while trying to heat your home that it overheats. Simply change the air filter to remedy the problem. Don't ignore this issue; repeated overheating can damage the furnace's heat exchanger, which is expensive to replace.

Usually it's only a matter of time. Just as it takes a few seconds for hot water to arrive when you turn on your faucet, it's completely normal to experience a few moments of cold air before you feel any warmth coming out of the registers. Just give it time to work.
