## Make a Difference! Tony Padon, Section 3 resident

As you approach the Graham Park tennis court fro 34th street, there is a sign that says "Adopt a Tennis Court". About 15 years ago, I took that suggestion to heart. Being a life-long tennis player and tennis supporter, I decided to take care of this court in Section 1. The first thing it needed was a bench to sit on that had some shade from our brutal summer sun. So, in 2008 I built a bench and shade cover.

Then, a few years ago, I added another bench on the west side of the court for those summer afternoons when the west sun is too much for the shaded bench on the east side. Recently I noticed that the shade covering was just plain worn out so I rebuilt the shade cover and added a few coats of paint to the bench. Voila! It's like new again! And every time I go to the court, I take my blower and clear the court. The trees nearby provide wonderful shade but also lots of leaves and pine needles. I also prompted HPARD (Houston Parks and Recreation Department) to rebuild the backboard, and now it has one of the nicest tennis back-

boards in the city.

I've recently decided that it's time for a repair and resurfacing of the court. I contacted Zina Garrison, former top 4 WTA professional tennis player and now HPARD Youth Sports Manager/Tennis. I met with Zina and Deputy Director, Tom Angelos, and explained to them that I wanted to help with getting the court resurfaced. I met on the court with both Tom Angelos and Michael Evans, HPARD Deputy Director of Facilities Management and Development. All CoH park improvements must go through his department.

They have agreed to have their preferred contractor provide a bid for the repairs and resurfacing, which is expected to cost between \$14,000 and \$18,000. Tom also recommended a call to District C Council member Abbie Kamin, as she is an enthusiastic supporter of park improvements and more Pickleball courts. We will ensure that both sides of the court have Pickleball court lines.

GOKids is excited to host our first ever Mardi Gras Parade on Saturday, February 10 on LaMonte between Golf and Alba at 4 PM.



## Mickey's Minute

While writing this post, it's 28 degrees outside. Farmer Cathy sold out of eggs in record time on Saturday and was told that HEB was sold out already. I am reminded of winter storm Uri just shy of three years ago and the mayhem that surrounded it: loss of power for hours at a time, and then loss of water due to broken pipes, etc. I was hunkered down at my place in relative comfort considering it never got above 50 degrees. I had prepared for the event and what follows is a primer on how to provide for such an occurrence.

Pretend you're going on a camping trip, and what would you need? You'll need shelter, water and food, along with a way to cook it, pretty much in that order. I once heard a couple of survival experts speak of the rule of sevens. You can die of hypothermia in seven hours, without water in seven days and without food in seven weeks. Your shelter is your home; I enhanced my chances by bringing home a sleeping bag. I had stocked over ten gallons of filtered water for drinking and cooking, and because of my business, my pantry was already well stocked.

By the time y'all read this, we will be well past our current situation, but not out of the woods yet. If you are fortunate enough to have a gas stove, you can still cook on the stove top using a stick lighter. And if you have a gas water heater with a pilot, you'll have hot water for washing and bathing.

There are solutions to these problems. For cooking without gas, you can purchase a cartridge burner similar to the ones that caterers use. They can be purchased with extra fuel at most asian markets for less than thirty dollars. You can power your gas home heater by using a small car battery and an appropriately sized dc to ac converter.

There are plenty of other hacks that can be employed. Just remember before the front arrives, fill your vehicles full of gas, as they make great warming shelters, just not in the garage with the door closed. Fill five gallon buckets full of water placed in the tub for flushing toilets and washing dishes.

As always, "Come soon, come often and feel free to pick my brain."

Reminder: The Constable Program is paid only by residents' contributions. There is no mandatory fee collected.





## Furnace Replacement: The Sooner, the Better

January is one of our coldest months, and your furnace works hard to keep you warm and comfortable. But how efficiently is it functioning and at what cost? Is it making you sick by leaking carbon monoxide? Should you consider replacing it?

The two most common furnace repairs are a blown circuit board and burnt-up fan motor. At \$800-\$1,000 each, both are expensive to fix. That's a lot of money, considering a typical brand-new furnace runs \$2,500-3,500 installed.

More importantly, does your aging furnace have cracks in its heat exchanger? These can leak deadly carbon monoxide. Carbon monoxide poisoning is the leading cause of accidental poisoning in the United States.

#### Improved efficiency, comfort, and savings

Including the furnace, all of the components in your home's heating and cooling system should have the highest possible energy efficiency ratings. The higher the rating, the more efficient the product and lower your energy bills will

be.

I strongly recommend replacing your furnace if it's more than 10 years old. In the last decade, the heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) industry has made amazing advances in technology. A modern furnace typically uses only half the gas to heat your home as a model built in 2003, plus does it much more efficiently, in about half the time.

More importantly, the new furnace's blower motor uses only onetenth the electricity as the one in a decade-old furnace. During the summer, this blower motor is also used by your AC system to distribute cool air throughout your home. Its greater efficiency means greater savings throughout the year.

Your new furnace will create comfortable heating throughout your home, improved humidity balance and reduced sound level while it operates. The cost savings will be impressive too.
