President's Message

Hey neighbors! Two months have already passed in 2024: "Dry" January, followed by "I missed you Mr. Wine Bottle" February.

Speaking of annual traditions, you've hopefully seen the Garden Oaks Civic Club (GOCC) annual dues flyer. Each household should have received one in the mail during January, and the same form is in the monthly Gazette newsletter monthly.

In case you are not familiar with GOCC, it is a voluntary club to foster neighborhood unity, support communication and education, and most importantly, provide for socializing! GOCC is NOT the property owners' association for Garden Oaks and has no deed restriction enforcement authority.

So, you may be wondering, "what are the dues used for"? Good question!

One of the most expensive line items in GOCC's annual budget is labeled "beautification". And that's exactly what the largest share of the money goes to, maintaining our area pocket parks and greenspaces. Did you know that there are nine parks, green spaces and gardens spread throughout our Garden Oaks neighborhood? Did you also know that the City of Houston does not maintain these parks? Someone or some entity has to take care of mowing, weeding, watering, tree pruning, planting, mulching, and picking up trash. A lot of that work is done by neighborhood volunteers, but some of it also requires hiring outside help. The Beautification Committee is chaired by Pam Parks, and it's an understatement to say she's passionate about Beautification. You will notice that there is a separate line on the annual dues form to contribute more money to beautification. The base dues cover the basics, but additional funding helps support efforts to add plantings, and such, to take things to the next level! We appreciate all of those who offer a little extra funding to our beautification efforts.

You're currently flipping the pages of one of the other efforts that your dues payments support... the monthly Gazette newsletter. Communication with the neighborhood is a high priority for GOCC, and the Gazette is a great tool for that. The newsletter is delivered to your front door every month by volunteers. Volunteers not only deliver, but also write and produce the actual newsletter, complete with advertising. A whole cadre of volunteers are involved, including editor Christi Hartley, delivery coordinator Angela Winston, and ad director Brenda de Alba. You can also find current and previous Gazette issues online at our gardenoaks.org website. We hope you find it beneficial AND we'd love to hear your feedback, as we continue to find the best ways to stay in touch with the community in the future.

Your dues also support many other things you may not think about that are needed to keep GOCC running. These items include the cost to organize and host our annual constable fundraisers (Wakefield Shuffle and Azalea St. Wine & Beer Extravaganza, organized by Emily Stephens), neighborhood parades, coordination with other community groups, including GOKids, interacting with our local schools, and finally, paying for the storage unit required to house all the chairs, tables, signage et al needed to put on all of those events.

One thing your GOCC annual dues do not support is the Constable Program. The Constable Program is a completely separate effort, led by Terry Jeanes, and it is funded entirely by contributions from residents. We could use a lot more support. Currently we can only pay for one Constable deputy, with 40 hours per week of patrolling. Ideally, we need three Constables to cover all shifts, but that would require considerably more contributions.

I hope you realize how helpful it is to have the community pay the voluntary annual dues (\$40 for individuals, \$100 for households, or \$20 for seniors). Year-to-date 2024, we've

collected dues from 144 households, out of the 1,400+ households in our community.

I also would love to meet you at our monthly GOCC gatherings! We meet on the first Tuesday of every month, at 7p.m., in a back room that is generously donated by Great Heights Brewing at 938 Wakefield. Yes, they sell beer (and wine) during the meeting, which is why we dedicate the first 30 minutes of the meeting as social time. The monthly meetings are open to everyone whether you own or rent, and whether you are a civic club member or not. Are you interested in volunteering to help with parks or social functions or to be part of a committee? Why Pollinators Matter

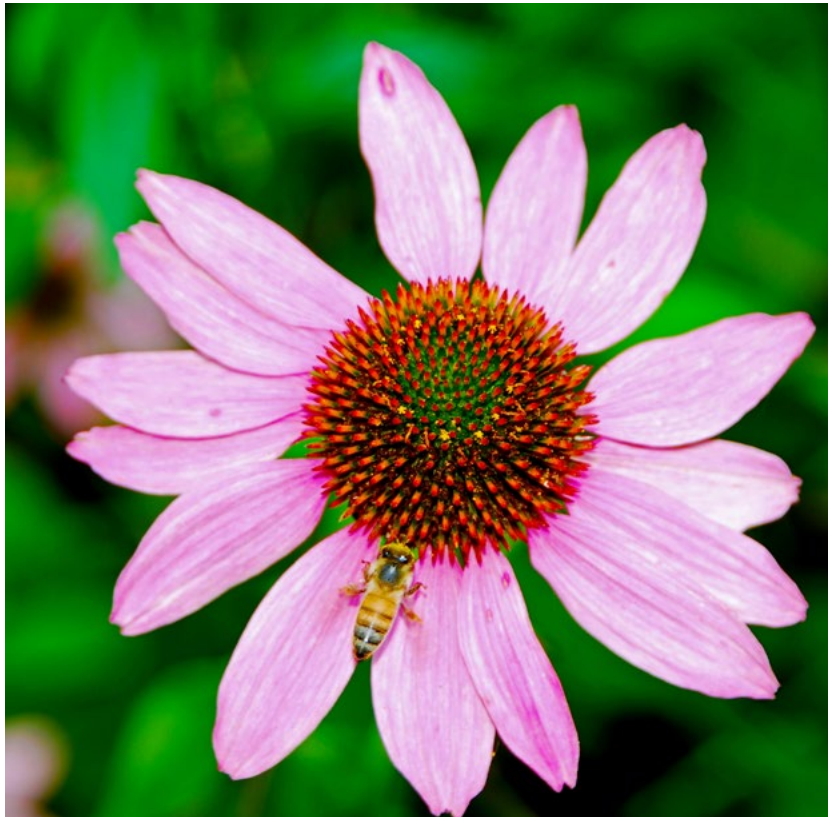
Bees, butterflies, hummingbirds, and other pollinating insects play a crucial role in the reproduction of many flowering plants, fruits, vegetables, and wildflowers. Without them, our food supply and ecosystems would be greatly compromised.

How to Attract Pollinators

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Neighborhood Restaurants Build Community in Garden Oaks

A recent Wall Street Journal article explains “Why Neighborhood Restaurants Are Where We Want to Eat Now,” citing hospitality expert opinions “that the renewed popularity of neighborhood restaurants is a reaction to how we ate during the deep pandemic” and marks a return to normalcy after that era’s ubiquitous plastic takeout boxes and isolated dining experiences. More and more, people are turning to neighborhood restaurants because they want to support community values and preserve local culture while also fulfilling their desire for interaction, familiarity, comfort, and delicious food and drink.

Garden Oaks (and the surrounding area) has its fair share of independent neighborhood restaurants, a list that has grown significantly in recent years. Though longstanding neighborhood favorites like Doyle’s and Petrol Station may no longer be with us, they are part of our history, while newer restaurants continue to pop up across the area with the goal of serving the neighborhood. Those local establishments that have endured have done so only with the support of the community. I’ve been the chef at Plonk! Bistro and Wine Cellar for nearly a decade, and the restaurant itself opened in 2008 and is celebrating over fifteen years of operation. We count the neighborhood itself as one of the reasons for our longevity. Familiarity and a sense of community are at the heart of our wine-friendly neighborhood restaurant, and I’ve often heard owner Scott Miller explain, “We have guests who started coming here in their twenties who are now entering their forties. We’ve celebrated births and weddings and mourned losses together. Connections made at Plonk! have resulted in marriages, lasting friendships, and countless neighborly connections.” This tie to the community comes naturally to Plonk! – both Scott and I are ourselves longtime residents of the neighborhood.

Other local restaurants have experienced neighborhood support in a very direct and visible way. Local institution Mytiburger, which is known for classic burgers and other casual fare, saw the power of community in a big way when they made an appeal for help on social media just last year, during a time when sales were slow. The community support was instant and resounding, as evidenced by the crowds of neighbors who poured into the small red-white-and-blue building. In fact, the response to Mytiburger’s request for help was so striking that the story gained traction on national news. Unwilling to let Mytiburger’s legacy in the community fade, neighbors came together to preserve a piece of what makes Garden Oaks and the surrounding area unique.

Now more than ever, it’s important to support local independently owned restaurants in and around Garden Oaks. These small businesses serve as community hubs, employ people in our neighborhood, and are a significant part of the culture and history of the G.O.O.F.

Kala Dunn is a longtime Garden Oaks resident and has been the Executive Chef at Plonk! Bistro since 2015. Before joining Plonk!, she was a Lecturer at the University of Houston, where she taught writing for the English and Engineering departments.

Tuesday, February 6, 2024 @ Great Heights Brewing

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 pm by President Mike Stephens.

A motion to accept the minutes from the January 2024 meeting was made, seconded, and approved.

Mike brought up the topic of dues and how it was important to help educate people about both Civic Club and Constable dues to help improve participation. The other topic was the importance of raising GOCC awareness for additional participation. Ideas such as resurrecting the tradition of welcome packages for new residents were discussed.

Treasurer Brian Rabe then summarized the January report and said that better projections would be available after a few months of history.

Terry Jeanes provided a report from the constable that no major crimes were reported. She also reported that they have been behind on the 2024 Constable Supporter sign

updates but will catch up soon with the help of new volunteers. The wine stroll funds were a critical help in being able to meet the constable contract obligation.

Mike summarized the GOMO January meeting as being very positive overall, with 9 of the 12 board seats filled, including at least one resident from each of the Garden Oaks Sections that are members of GOMO. Some board members were present at the club meeting, including James Elmore from Section 1, who discussed some of the next possible steps for GOMO. One of them was to finalize a mission statement and it was discussed that having one for GOCC would also help clarify the distinction, and the purpose, for residents.

Rebranding was the next item on the agenda, and the committee needs to meet at least once more to finalize the logo usage as well as the plans for signage updates.

Sara Mathias presented GoKids' purpose and that they are working on building an online presence. She also mentioned the group's typical monthly activities such as the

upcoming Mardi Gras parade. For other examples see the February '24 Gazette article.

Mike then briefly mentioned there had been a good meeting with CenterPoint to raise our concern about local power outages seem to be increasing. Some residents provided specific examples to help support the case. CenterPoint promised to follow up on this issue and we hope to have a representative from CenterPoint speak more about the issues at an upcoming GOCC meeting.

Representatives from City Council members Abbie Kamin's and Mario Castillo's offices introduced themselves. Some of the concerns and requests they are focused on include: speeding, pedestrian crossing safety, recycling and water bills. To reach them for any concerns or water bill disputes, the emails are districtc@houstontx.gov and districth@houstontx.gov, respectively. Council Member Castillo has started holding Town Halls throughout the district and highly encourages participation.

Lastly, Garden Club Vice President Chris Lindsay mentioned upcoming presentations from the Coastal Prairie Conservancy and also a Pollinator event on April 14th at the Sue Barnett Art Park. More details will be in the Gazette.

Mike opened the floor for discussion and mentioned an upcoming meeting about visions for the new year.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:30 PM.

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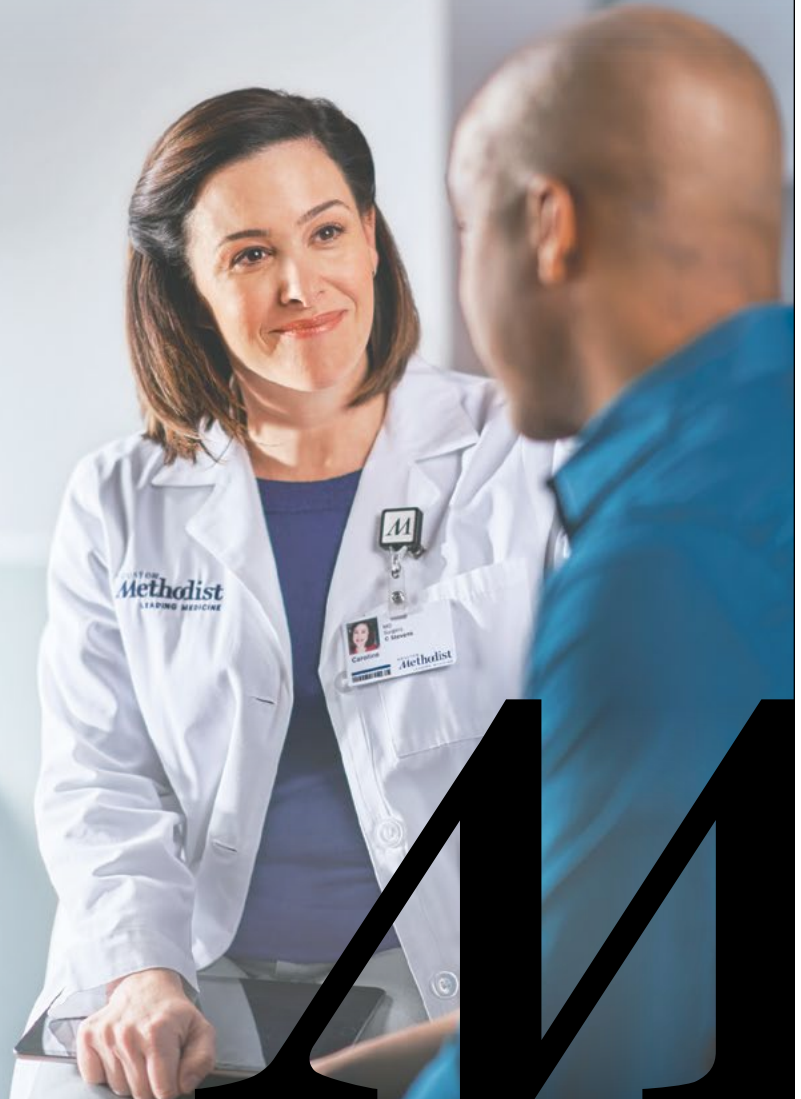

Why Indoor Air Quality is Important - Part One

In Houston, we spend 90% or more of our daily hours inside our homes and places of work. Unfortunately, indoor air can be many times more polluted than the air outside.

Sources of indoor air pollution gases are cooking, off-gassing from carpet and furnishings, household cleaning chemicals, dry cleaning chemicals in clothes, pest extermination and more. Particulates include dust, mites, pollen, mold spores, fungi, bacteria, smoke and grease from cooking, pet hair and dander, and tobacco smoke. The task of air filtration is to remove unwanted gases and particles from the air. This, along with ventilation and humidity control, makes indoor air safe and comfortable.

Persons most susceptible to indoor air pollution include infants and toddlers, the elderly and individuals suffering from chronic illnesses.

The ways air filters work

Your central air conditioning system is considered a "whole house" air filtration system. Its main purpose is to correct air filtration and flow, and to eliminate undesirable gases and

particles.

The most basic mechanical function of the air filter is to remove airborne particles that would otherwise clog or damage the system's coils. While doing so, the filter must allow the required minimum volume of air to pass through to prevent the coils from freezing or the heat exchangers overheating. Failing to maintain the correct flow, either from using the wrong type of air filter or a dirty, clogged filter, will lose efficiency, increase your utility bills, and eventually shorten the life of the system.

However, by using the correct filter and replacing it monthly, the A/C system can condition your home's air at optimum efficiency, removing undesirable gases and particles. Your family will experience improved quality in the air you breathe.
