# Big Changes Coming to Heavy Trash Collection

Starting March 2nd, Houston residents will need to call 311 to schedule heavy trash collection instead of waiting for regular pickup days. There will be no routine heavy trash pickup days as in the past.

## Key Details of the New System (Starting March 2, 2026):

- \* How to Schedule: Call 311 or use the city's 311 system to request a pickup.
- \* Confirmation: Each request will be reviewed and scheduled, and residents will get confirmation of the scheduled pickup.
- \* Response Time: Trash will be collected within 5 working days of the scheduled request.
- \* Limits: Maximum of 4 collections per residential address per calendar year.
- \* Why the Change: To reduce illegal dumping and address backlogs caused by the previous, inefficient system where crews drove every street monthly, whether trash was present or not.

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# Recycling Dos and Don'ts

*Excerpted from [houstontx.gov/solidwaste/recycling](http://houstontx.gov/solidwaste/recycling)*

The city of Houston recycles:

- \* Metal and cans: aluminum cans, vegetable cans, fruit cans, coffee cans (all emptied and rinsed)
- \* Cartons: Both gable top and shelf-stable food and beverage cartons. Examples include milk cartons, juice cartons, soup cartons, soy milk/alternative milk cartons (all emptied and rinsed)
- \* Glass: Bottles, jugs and jars only (all emptied and rinsed, no lids)
- \* Paper: Newspaper, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, office paper
- \* Cardboard: Cardboard and cereal boxes (emptied of packing materials and flattened)
- \* Plastic: Bottles, tubs and jugs #1 - 5 and 7. Examples include water and soda bottles, milk jugs, yogurt cups, margarine tubs, detergent bottles, shampoo bottles. (emptied and rinsed). Do not recycle the plastic bottle caps.

Do NOT put these in the green recycling bin:

- \* Shredded paper
- \* Batteries and electronics
- \* Food/Liquids
- \* Trash and Bagged Recycling
- \* Scrap wood and metal
- \* Yard waste
- \* Pizza boxes and soiled paper plates and napkins
- \* Plastic dry cleaning bags
- \* Bottle caps

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# Garden Oaks Civic Club Minutes

Tuesday, February 3, 2026 @ Great Heights Brewing  
Attendance: 20

The meeting was called to order at 7:25pm by President Mike Stephens.

A motion was made by Mike to accept the January meeting minutes as published in the February 2026 Gazette. The motion was seconded and approved.

With Paul Vincent stepping down as the Vice President to serve as a member of the GOMO board, a special election was held to vote for his replacement. A vote was held to elect the nominee, Dillon Baker, to the Vice President position. Dillon is a section 5 resident and was a member of the GOMO board for that section. The vote was held and he was unanimously elected.

Due to the vacancy of the social chairperson position, Mike requested volunteers to lead such events as the Wakefield Shuffle, 4th of July Bike Parade, Garage Sale, Azalea Street Festival, etc. Paige Lujan has agreed to chair the upcoming

Wakefield Shuffle. Funds from the Wakefield Shuffle will help support the civic club and constable program.

Mike has promulgated that he will head up the new resident welcoming committee. The purpose of this group will be to welcome new neighbors and to educate them about all the things the civic club does, and about the current status and future plans for GOMO, and how it differs from the civic club.

There will be a special election on April 4 to fill the vacancy left behind due to Council Member Abbie Kamin's departure (District C).

Thomas Wheaton, Director of Communications for CM Mario Castillo's office, reiterated that there is a "Hot Team" which is responsible for addressing issues related to illegal dumping and uncollected heavy trash. Contact their office to report on such issues. He announced that there will be wellness clinics for pets set up at the Wabash Feed & Garden store on February 13th and 16th.

Treasurer Brian Rabe stated there are slightly fewer households that have paid their civic club and/or constable program dues. This is likely because a mailer has not been sent out yet, and that the number will likely increase after a targeted approach takes place in the very near future. He also announced that the deposit has been made on the new neighborhood signage, and that production and installation will possibly be occurring in the next few weeks.

Beautification Chair Pam Parks gave an overview of her committee. stating that there are 6-8 green spaces that they manage as far as plantings, watering, mowing, etc. The City of Houston helps offset some watering duties and costs, but not all. Each park/green space has a captain, but each captain could also use a co-captain if anyone wishes to be a co-captain. There is an undeveloped green space on the northwest corner of Durham/IH610 that the civic club could develop. Pam is open to suggestions about what to do with that space. There is a map of the parks that Garden Oaks maintains on our website, www.gardenoaks.org.

Chris Lindsay, Garden Club president, heralded that the biennial Pollinator in the Park event will take place on April 19

from Noon-2:00PM at the Art Park (at the corner of 43rd and Sue Barnett). The event is very family friendly, and provides education and activities related to our friendly pollinators, such as bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds. There will also be free plants and seed packets to be distributed. She also shared that anyone can be a member of the Garden Club, which meets monthly. Dues for the Garden Club are only \$20/year.

Constable Chair Terry Jeanes encouraged attendees to spread the word about joining the constable program for \$300/year. She proclaimed that a repeat-offender porch pirate has been apprehended by a neighborhood constable, with assistance from neighbors' inputs and footage from several security cameras.

The announcement from GOMO stated that the following officers have been selected to their leadership team: James Elmore will be the President, Stuart Arouty will be the Vice President, and Pam Parks will be the Treasurer. GOMO meets on the 2nd Monday of each month at the Trees for Houston building on 34th Street at 6:30PM.

The meeting was adjourned by Mike Stephens at 8:18 PM.

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
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


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# Pollinators in the Park Event

Why do pollinators matter? Bees, butterflies, hummingbirds, and other pollinating insects play a crucial role in the reproduction of many flowering plants, fruits, vegetables, and wildflowers. Without them, our food supply and ecosystems would be greatly compromised.


How to Attract Pollinators? One of the best ways to support pollinators is by creating a welcoming habitat in your garden. Here are some tips on how to do just that:

1. Choose Native Plants: Natives are adapted to our local climate and provide the most nutritious pollen and nectar for pollinators. Consider incorporating native wildflowers, grasses, and shrubs into your garden.
2. Plant a Variety of Flowers: Aim for a diverse array that blooms at different times. This ensures a continuous food source for pollinators from spring to fall.
3. Include Flowering Herbs: Herbs such as lavender, rosemary, and sage are not only aromatic but also attractive to bees and butterflies. Plant them in sunny spots throughout your garden.
4. Avoid Pesticides: Minimize or eliminate the use of pesticides and herbicides in your garden, as they can harm pollinators and disrupt their natural behaviors.

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# PSA:

## Common Reasons Your A/C Could Quit

While landscaping your yard, consider doing it in such a way that the plants actually contribute to the cooling of your home. According to the Department of Energy, keeping the condenser (that's the A/C system's outside unit) in the shade can increase its efficiency by as much as 10 percent. Just be sure that the shrubs placed near the condenser do not obstruct air flow or impede access for repairs. Leave approximately three feet of clearance all around the equipment and at least five feet above it.

In turn, the condenser can benefit your landscaping. One of the tasks your A/C performs is to de-humidify the air from within your home. It collects and pumps the humidity outside as condensation. While not a lot, water from the drain line can provide moisture to keep the surrounding plants healthy.

### Pet damage can happen

When we consider our furry family members and the damage they can cause, we often think of gnawed furniture or stains on the carpet. The AC condenser is especially vulnerable to damage done by pet urine. Urine contains chemicals that are very good at eating away metals, especially aluminum. Unfortunately, condenser fins and coils are made of aluminum, and in time, fins become encrusted and coils begin to leak.

A leak in the condenser coil means that your A/C is no longer a properly closed system. The freon will leak out, and in a matter of

hours, days or months, the system can be emptied completely. You then run the risk of burning out the condenser.

### A clean condenser is a happy condenser

When your A/C runs, air is drawn into the condenser through its coil. Outdoor contaminants such as dust and plant matter (grass clippings, small leaves and mulch, etc.) can get caught in the coil. You can include pet hair and urine too. As debris accumulates, airflow is reduced which causes your system to run harder. It is not uncommon for a condenser coil to be clogged completely in just one season of operation. One thing you can do is take your garden hose and spray thoroughly about six inches from the condenser's fins to clear them of dust and leaves. This simple action will go a long way in keeping your condenser running efficiently.

This is why routine maintenance is so important. The higher temperatures generated by a filthy coil will cause premature failure of the capacitors, fan motor and eventually the compressor within the condenser. A thorough cleaning of the condenser coil can prevent this. Not only will keeping the coil clean improve the efficiency and capacity of your entire system, but it will also extend the life of your entire A/C system.
