I want to thank the Garden Oaks Civic Club for its support of the Garden Oaks Community Garden, a gem in our community. The volunteer gardeners appreciate you paying both the water and mowing expenses, which allows us to continue growing fresh organically grown produce for donation to local food pantries (primarily St. Rose of Lima Food Pantry). We recently received a letter of gratitude from the president of St. Vincent de Paul Society for supporting their ministry of helping those in need.

Our season has been bountiful, as shown in some recent photos of produce we donated – and some photos show happy (and sweaty) gardeners. Despite the heat, we are currently producing eggplant, cucumbers, okra, peppers, sweet potatoes, herbs, and ginger.

We have had many Boy Scout and Girl Scout troops earn badges and do educational projects in the garden throughout the years, and another Girl Scout troop will soon come to the garden to earn outdoor, eco-focused merit badges.

We are at the garden frequently in the mornings and evenings at this time of year, and we welcome you to visit or come dig in the dirt if you like.



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This is the sixth article in a series highlighting our various neighborhood pocket parks and the park captains who volunteer their time.

The Berm & The Wedge (Randall at Durham & West 30th)

It is perhaps fitting that the Berm and Wedge appear later in our series on neighborhood pocket parks. Unlike many of the neighborhood's green spaces, these two areas were created relatively recently and developed for purposes that extend beyond beautification. Located along the edges of the subdivision near the North Loop and Durham, they have played an important role in managing traffic while also enhancing the neighborhood landscape.

The Wedge, a triangular green space between West 30th Street and the North Loop access road, was created as a byproduct of the construction of the Shepherd–Durham split and the North Loop more than 50 years ago. In 2019, several property owners began advocating for its inclusion in neighborhood maintenance efforts, leading to regular mowing and litter removal.

Across the street lies the Berm, formed in the 1990s when Randall Street was closed to discourage the heavy cut-

through traffic that once sped through the neighborhood. The closure successfully redirected traffic, but over the years the Berm itself suffered repeated damage as vehicles attempted to drive across it. These incidents resulted in the loss of four mature maple trees, a neighborhood entrance sign, and the irrigation system.

Restoration efforts began in 2018 with the clearing of overgrowth and the rehabilitation of the irrigation system. Replanting followed over the next several years, guided by goals that would enhance both sustainability and the neighborhood environment. New native plantings help reduce water consumption, while fast-growing sweet-gums and a sycamore have been added to replace the lost maples. Together, these plantings create a more effective visual and sound buffer from traffic along North Shepherd and Durham.

Today, the Berm is largely restored, but a few projects remain on the community wish list. Future work may include rebuilding the split-rail fence that once separated the sidewalk from the rock-filled drainage swale, adding a climbing rose along the gravel path, and replacing several large trees lost on the Wedge. These improvements will likely be undertaken during volunteer workdays organized by park captain Sean Jez.

Together, the Berm and the Wedge demonstrate how overlooked spaces can be transformed into attractive neighborhood assets—improving both the appearance and livability of the community while serving practical purposes as well.



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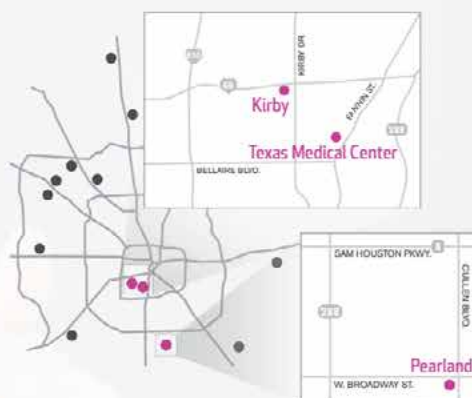

Garden Oaks Civic Club Minutes

Attendance: 24

The meeting was called to order at 7:14PM by Vice President Dillon Baker.

A motion was made by Dillon to accept the July 2026 meeting minutes as published in the August 2026 Gazette. The motion was seconded and approved.

With respect to the new residents committee, Dillon stated that there are now 6 volunteers who will be working on the committee. The committee will be headed by President Mike Stephens. If anyone else would like to be a member, contact Mike, whose contact info is in the Gazette. Dillon also announced that Fajita Pete's will be hosting a Garden Oaks spirit day (11:00AM-8:30PM) on September 7th. 15% of all sales will benefit the civic club.

Vonn Albright, the Constituent Services Director for City Council Member Joe Panzarella (District C) was present and let us know that the contact information for CM District C remains the same as it was when Abbie Kamin was in office. She also encouraged constituents to sign up for their newsletter to keep informed about news events in the area, as well as information pertaining

to emergency situations such as flooding and other severe weather events. She stated that there will be a District C "100 Days' Town Hall" on September 19th at 10:00AM at the Metropolitan "West Gray" Service Center at 1475 W. Gray.

Thomas Wheaton, Director of Communications for CM Mario Castillo's office (District H), announced that there will be a virtual meeting to discuss the benefits of historical designations for properties. Thomas pointed out that there is currently a pause on new gas station permits in order to help evaluate how all the new gas stations/convenience stores are affecting the neighborhoods. He also stated that there will be 9 Town Halls over the next year.

Coby Johnston, District Liaison for Texas State Representative Penny Morales Shaw, stated that there are 3 command centers set up in the area to assist residents (and pets!) in the case of emergency events, like flooding, hurricanes, or other disasters.

Amanda LaBrie introduced herself as a candidate for Texas House of Representatives District 148.

This month's guest speaker was Philippa Johnstone, a Gulf Coast regional expert in ecology, natural resources, and wildlife habitat. Her presentation focused on supporting local wildlife through gardening, specifically by attracting pollinators through planting

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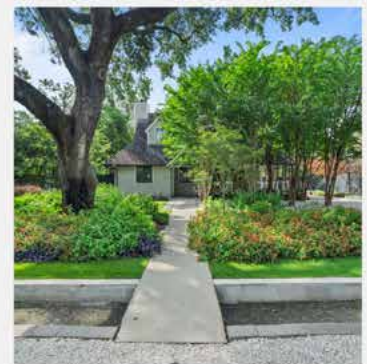

native, non-invasive plants. One key goal in native plant gardening is to try to ensure your garden contains at least 70% native plants. She can be reached by email at gulfcoastecodesigns@gmail.com or visit her website at www.gulfcoastecologicaldesigns.com

Oak Forest resident Adrien Moschenberg provided information about the upcoming renovations that will take place at the American Legion Park. Through the Let's Play Houston program, the park has been earmarked to receive \$2.4 million for park upgrades, which will include new playground equipment, ballpark improvements, and a walking trail. Work will begin in late 2027.

Beautification Chair Pam Parks noted that there is repair work being done to the irrigation system at the rose garden.

Constable Chair Terry Jeanes stated that the new deputy for our constable patrol is Deputy Pennie, and he will likely attend next month's civic club meeting. She also declared the urgency for a committee chair to head up the Azalea Street Festival, which raises approximately \$30,000 each year that goes toward the yearly fee for the constable program. The yearly cost of next year's constable patrol increased to \$108,320, which reflects an 8.8% increase over the prior year.

James Elmore, GOMO President, stated that the annual GOMO

meeting will be on October 12th (place and time TBD). GOMO board member elections will be taking place at this meeting. He also informed the group that much progress has been made in revising the by-laws, and they hope to be approved very soon.

Garden Club President Chris Lindsay notified attendees that the upcoming meeting will be next Thursday at the Kroger community room. Plans for updating the Friendship Garden are currently underway.

Dillon announced that the next meeting will be on Tuesday, September 1st. The guest speaker at this meeting will be Tom Shaughnessy, a Texas Master Naturalist, beekeeper, and Certified Interpretive Guide, amongst many other things. All are encouraged to attend this sure to be sensational event. Also, newly elected District C City Council Member Joe Panzarella will be attending.

A motion was made to acknowledge the excellent job Dillon did in conducting this night's meeting. The motion was enthusiastically seconded and approved.

The meeting was adjourned by Dillon at 8:34PM.

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GOMO Update

The GOMO Board of Directors and I want to thank you for taking the time to read the Gazette and being an active member of our community.

It is again time to announce the GOMO Annual Meeting of the Members. The meeting will be held at St. Matthews United Methodist Church at the corner of N. Shepherd and W 43rd at 7:00 pm on October 12, 2026.

The primary functions of the meeting are as follows:

Inform the Members as to Board activity and plans

We are pleased to announce that we have hired Heather Cook with Randle Law Office Ltd., L.L.P as our new Attorney to help GOMO re-establish itself as a Property Owners Association under Section 204 under the Texas Property Code. An outline of steps which conforms to State requirements to accomplish this is as follows:

1. Amend current Bylaws to Support the Current Legal Status
2. File Notice of Formation of Petition Committee.
3. Collect Required Owner Signatures.
4. Close the Petition Period.
5. Circulate Funding Amendment (Amendment B).
6. Survey Owners on Potential Deed Restriction Amendments.

7. Evaluate Owner Feedback and Determine Need For Further Amendments
8. Amend DRs
9. Amend Bylaws to reflect new Status as a POA.

Election of Board Directors for expired terms and vacancies

Per our Bylaws, member Sections 1, 2, 3, & 5 are to have three elected Board Directors to represent their section. These positions are for 3-year staggered terms. The four terms noted below as (2026) are expiring this year. There are two additional positions that are currently vacant to be filled that expire in 2028. These positions are elected by members of their respective Sections. Here is a recap of current Directors with expiring and vacant positions that will be voted on by members of each separate section.

Vote on actions that require approval of the Membership

GOMO came into existence as a mandatory POA in 2003 through an amendment to the deed restrictions. In 2018 The courts ruled that GOMO was not correctly procedurally created. The short version is that GOMO still exists, has approximately \$300,000, but cannot operate fully as a POA and fulfill its mission statement. More details surrounding this history are available on the GOMO website.

The first step to properly reestablish GOMO as a fully operational Property Owners Association is to adopt Bylaws that are consistent with current state laws and GOMO's current legal status. With frequent changes by the Texas Legislature, bylaws should be reviewed and possibly amended every several years. Our current bylaws date from 2014.



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Adoption of these Bylaw changes requires voter approval by the Membership. 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Are you Helping or Harming MONARCH BUTTERFLIES?

What's wrong with tropical milkweed you ask? Let us count the ways.

The collective scientific research on TROPICAL MILKWEED - *Asclepias curassavica* is telling us one thing - it's bad for Monarchs. 1) It leads to less-optimal wing development for long-distance flight; 2) it makes monarchs want to become reproductive, even if they are migrants; 3) it increases local and migratory population levels of *Ophryocystis elektroscirrha* (OE), which we already know hinders migration potential; and 4) it reduces their flying ability!

*Tropical milkweed leads to extremely high OE levels in areas where it persists year-round, and there is evidence that this happens even if the milkweed is cut back periodically. OE is a single-celled organism known as a protozoan. It must live within a host to grow and multiply. When not inside a host, OE survives in the environment as spores, which are resistant to extreme conditions. These spores get attached to the Monarch's abdomen when it is feeding on the plant and thus gets spread.

*OE infected monarch larvae that feed on tropical milkweed tend to live longer as (infected) adults, thereby spreading the infection longer.

*Tropical Milkweed increases reproductivity in Monarchs, causing hyperbreeding in cesspools of OE infection overwintering sites. This causes OE infected populations to breed more extensively thus increasing spreading of OE.

*Monarch larvae that feed on tropical milkweed are less likely to develop into adults in the migratory state of reproductive diapause (they tend to develop into breeders).

*Fall migrating monarchs that encounter tropical milkweed are more likely to be in reproductive condition (eggs and mating, etc.), suggesting the tropical milkweed is luring these migrants out of the fall journey to Mexico and turning them into breeders.

*Migrating female monarchs that encounter tropical milkweed are more likely to begin developing eggs internally (getting ready for reproduction).

*Monarchs that feed on tropical milkweed have paler orange pigment, which is a known sign of poor migration potential.

*Monarchs that feed on tropical milkweed have less-elongated forewings, which is not optimal for migration (successful migrants have elongated wings).

*Monarchs that feed on tropical milkweed have thinner wings, which would be more prone to damage during migration (any damage during migration is fatal).

*Monarchs that feed on tropical milkweed don't fly as far as those that host on native milkweeds.

*Monarchs that feed on tropical milkweed have higher metabolic rates, which is not conducive for long-distance migration.

Monarch OE infection rates have exploded since NGOs (Non-Governmental Organizations) promoted the discussion of Monarchs being threatened and recommended people get involved by planting milkweed (Tropical Milkweed) and captive rearing. The explosion in infection rates correlates to the beginning of these public campaigns and has worsened with greater public awareness and involvement.

What can you do to help the Monarch?

If you have tropical milkweed in your garden, REMOVE IT, NOW! The Eastern monarch butterflies migrating south to Mexico will be coming through Texas and the Houston area in mid-September through October.

Plant nectar plants for the Monarch butterflies, such as: Mistflower, Gregg's Blue Mistflower, Mexican sunflower and Asters.

Plant native milkweed plants that are suited to our Houston climate such as: Aquatic Milkweed (*Asclepias perennis*); Green Milkweed (*Asclepias viridis*); Butterfly Weed (*Asclepias tuberosa*). These species of milkweed can be found at Houston Audubon Native Nursery, Joshua's Native Plants and Buchanan's Native Plants.

Why Does My Furnace Smell Like...?

You turn on your furnace for the first time and, like every year, you wonder, "What's that smell coming out of my furnace?" Let's focus on those various smells.

BURNT DUST - What you smell is exactly what it is, and it's completely normal. Remember, your furnace has been unused for nearly a year, and dust will naturally build up on the different components. When you turn on your furnace for the first time, dust accumulated on the heat exchanger burns off. Then that temporary burning smell flows through your ducts. While it isn't the most attractive scent while you settle in for your first cozy autumn evening, there's no need to be alarmed. It should last only a little while.

If you'd like to avoid this smell altogether, schedule a tune-up so that your A/C system - which includes your furnace - will be cleaned prior to its use.

BURNING METALLIC SMELL - There are different reasons why your furnace might experience problems. In particular, your blower motor can overheat and begin to give off a burning metallic smell. If you become aware of this odor coming from your furnace, contact your A/C service technician so he can inspect your system and fix the problem.

If your furnace continues to give off smells Unless you're using your furnace for the first time, it should not produce any strange smells. Here are two other actions you can do to alleviate unwanted odors.

Change your air filter

Once the inside of your heater has been cleaned, the next possible cause of unwanted smells could be a dirty air filter. Locate the filter in the return air vent to see if it's dirty. The dust and debris collected on it will pass through the ducts and exit through the vents. To eliminate that, simply replace the dirty filter with a clean one and you're set. You are replacing your filter every month, right?

Check the ducts

Lastly, if your heater is clean and the filter has been replaced, check your duct system for any dust and debris that has settled in them. A simple vacuum by a professional duct-cleaning company will take care of any excess dust and leave your system ready for the fall and winter.
